COLLEGE TO OBSERVE SEVENTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY IN CONJUNCTION WITH HOMECOMING FESTIVITIES

At Duaneburgh, New York, in May of 1879, the General Synod of the Reformed Presbyterian Church decided to establish a liberal arts college. By the will of William Gibson, an elder in the First Presbyterian Church, Cincinnati, a bequest of \$25,000 was left in 1886 to found the college at Cedarville, Greene County, Ohio. At the meeting of the General Synod held in Coulterville, Illinois, in May, 1894, the Synod, upon recommendation of the board of trustees, elected Dr. McKinney first President of Cedarville College. The board chose a faculty, and on Wednesday, September 19, 1894, the college was formally opened for instruction to thirty-six students in the fine old mansion formerly occupied by Dr. Hugh McMillan's Academy. This was the beginning of our college. Through the past seventy-five years, since the granting of the charter, Cedarville College has progressed through the administrations of Dr. David McKinney, Dr. Wilbur McChesney, Rev. Walter Kilpatrick, Mr. Ira D. Vayhinger, and the present administration of Dr. James T. Jeremiah. The observance of the diamond anniversary is to be held the weekend of November 16-18.

Saturday, November 17, is the date of the annual Homecoming festivities. A full day of activities has been planned for the enjoyment of all those in attendance. The day will be concluded with a pageant depicting the history and growth of Cedarville College through the years.

It is the desire of the Administration that the Alumni make a special effort to attend this anniversary observance. The number of Alumni attending homecoming has increased each year. We hope that this trend will continue.

Please note that a special business meeting has been called for the afternoon of the 17th. Important constitutional changes are to be discussed.

Additional material will be in the hands of Alumni shortly.

CAMPUS CHANGES

Progress necessitates change. In keeping with this proposition several changes are apparent on the campus. With the expected soon completion of the new gymnasium-student center, changes are being made in two other buildings. Old Alford Memorial Gymnasium is being converted to a chapel-auditorium. A stage is being constructed at the east end of the building, the bleachers are to be removed and theater type seats installed. This is to be completed by Homecoming.

Milner Chapel is being used as a large lecture room at present. Plans to change it into a regular classroom building will be realized in the near future.
