## ADMINISTRATION TO APPROACH STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

It has for some time been the desire of the administration of Cedarville College to regain the privilege to certify teachers for the State of Ohio, a privilege which was revoked by the State at the close of the 1952-53 school year just prior to the administration change. Cedarville College was one of the chief centers for supply of teachers for Greene County and surrounding territory prior to this time. Since the change of administration, even though not certified to train teachers, the College has graduated many who have taken positions in the field of education. The certification of these, however, usually depended upon the pursuance of work beyond that obtained here or upon work taken in conjunction with Central State College. Naturally the most desirable position is that the College be allowed to certify its own graduates.

Cedarville College does not desire to be solely a teacher training institution, but according to Dr. Clifford Johnson, Registrar, more than 25% of our students are expecting to become teachers. At least seventy-five students will be taking some work at Central State College this next semester. Because of this demonstrated interest the development of the teacher training program is highly desirable.

One of the requirements for state certification is a working minimum endowment of \$500,000, or a guaranteed income amounting to at least the interest (5%) on this amount. The administration has asked each church regularly supporting the College to indicate in writing its proposed yearly support. To date 157 churches have indicated a total annual support of \$41,373 or an amount equal to the interest (5%) on approximately \$850,000. This figure does not include any special gifts or other income sources. The administration wishes to present this figure to the State Board of Education with the request that it be accepted in lieu of endowment.

It is expected that all materials will be submitted to the proper authorities on or before February 1, 1963 and a decision as to the acceptability of this financial status is expected by February 15 according to Dr. Johnson. If this is acceptable, the College will then be in a position to seek inspection by the State.

This is an important step in the program of our College. It is not only our duty, but our privilege as Alumni, to pray for the success of this program. There is a dire need for Christian teachers today. May God grant that Cedarville College will be granted the right to swell the number in this pivotal profession.

MID-OHIO CONFERENCE TITLE IN SIGHT?

The 1962-63 Yellowjacket's basketball team, coached by Don Callan, has shown to date the greatest display of power of any of our teams in the last ten years. Many of the coaches in the Mid-Ohio Conference consider Cedarville the team to beat this year. To date (January 15) the team record is 8-1 including victories over Taylor, Rio Grande, Indiana Tech., Oakland City (Ind.), Grace, Ashland, Berea (Ky.), and Bluffton. Their only loss was a five point defeat at the hands of the Wilmington Quakers at Wilmington when the Quakers shot a phenomenal 68% from the floor.

Since opening the new field house, the team has won all three home games. Paced by a well-rounded scoring attack and a domination of the boards, due mainly to the height of Gary Walthall, 6' 8" and Dozier Carter, 6' 5", prospects were never greater for the championship to be brought to Cedarville.
