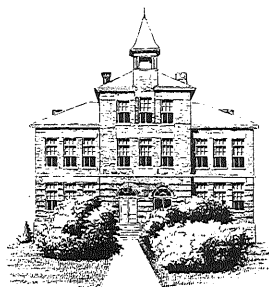

We were facing a \$30,000 debt which would hinder our college in planning for the future. The debt is by no means entirely eliminated but we believe we are making progress toward its liquidation. Since many of our readers have faithfully and sacrificially given to help remove this burden, we believe they will be interested in a "progress report" as we head down what we hope is the "home stretch" in this program for a debt free college.

THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Dear Friends:

Will you please accept this as a personal invitation to attend our graduation exercises? Rev. Wilbur Rooke, Pastor of the Central Baptist Church of Gary, Indiana, will bring the Baccalaureate message at three o'clock, Sunday afternoon, June 3rd. The service will be held in Milner Chapel. The graduation address will be given on Monday morning at 10:00 A.M. by Rev. J. Edward Hakes, President of the Grand Rapids Baptist Theological Seminary. Fifteen seniors will graduate this year.

We are happy to announce the addition of two new faculty members. Dr. C. R. Maddox of Harvey, Illinois, will be coming with us next fall as our Academic Dean. For a number of years Dr. Maddox has been a deacon in the First Baptist Church of Harvey and has been loyal to the convictions held by Bible-believing Baptists. He has a B. S. Degree from Georgetown College and an M. A. and Ph.D. Degree from the University of Chicago. From 1926 to the present time, he has been the supervisor and the assistant superintendent of the Thornton Township High School and Junior College at Harvey.

Mr. Warren Loraine Webber has been added to our faculty and will teach Music beginning with the fall semester. He has B.A. and B.M.E. Degrees from Central College in Pella, Iowa, and the M.M.E. Degree from Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa. Since 1949 Brother Webber has been teaching Music in the Iowa public schools. At the present time he is the church organist and choir director of the First Baptist Church in Monroe, Iowa, where he is a member. We understand that through the preaching of missionary, Joe Macaba, Mr. and Mrs. Webber heard the call of the Lord of Christian service. Pray for these Christian teachers as they join our faculty.

As you observe the financial report on page four you will discover that gifts to the General Fund were less than they have been during the preceding months. This may be due to the appeal which we are making for the Debt Retire-

ment Fund, but it gives us cause for great concern. The summer months are very difficult from a financial standpoint. It isn't easy to think about supporting a school when everybody knows "school is out." We would remind you, however, that we must pay our faculty and staff even though the students have gone home. We will need your gift more in June than we did in January. Pray with us about this immediate need. After you have presented the matter to the Lord, present it to your church and friends. We want to avoid another financial drought similar to that which we experienced last summer. As we "commit" our way unto the Lord and "trust" Him, we know He shall bring His purposes to pass in our lives.

The annual Alumni Spring Conference is set for Friday and Saturday, June 1st and 2nd.

The first session will be the Alumni Banquet at 6:30 p.m. on Friday, followed by a program and speaker. Saturday morning at 9:00, various alumni will relate the Lord's blessing in their particular fields; and at 10:30 a.m., we're planning another feast about God's Word with our guest speaker. Immediately following lunch, at 1:00 there will be the annual business meeting. All these activities will take place on the campus.

Rev. R. L. Matthews, of Emmanuel Baptist Church in Toledo, will be the guest speaker. Special music will be furnished by the Rogers Brothers, Ward Weaver, Cedarville College Quartet and Girl's Trio, and others.

Cost for the entire conference, including meals and lodging and the banquet, will be \$3.00. This takes from Friday at 6:30 p.m. to Saturday at noon. Reservations should be made early, and should be sent to Bernice Mick, care Cedarville College. The school urges that, if possible, each alumnus make plans to stay over until Monday, thus taking in both Baccalaureate and Com-

mencement. An additional fee of \$3.00 will cover that expense.

The past year the Alumni Association has endeavored to help the school in its need for debt retirement. We presented a gift in November of \$150.00. That need is still existent, and any funds sent to the school for that purpose will be greatly appreciated. A second project is still in effect: that of purchasing a card file for the school's library. It is hoped enough funds will be donated by the alumni to buy the file at the time of the Spring Conference.
