SO YOU WANT AN ACCREDITED EDUCATION!

In this day and age of accredited standards, approval of various trade articles, guarantees, etc. many people are asking the question, "Is Cedarville College accredited?" This is a very broad and relative question because one needs to define what is meant by "accredited". Therefore, I shall try to acquaint you with the standing that we enjoy here at Cedarville.

At the present time Cedarville College students are able to gain training that is recognized throughout the country, not only in undergraduate colleges and universities, but also by graduate schools with respect to working for a postgraduate degree. In the present report for 1956 of the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers, Cedarville College is listed as having up to and including, fours years of college work acceptable as transfer credit, and that our graduates with the appropriate baccalaureate degree are able to present credits to enable them to continue work in a graduate school towards Master's and Doctor's Degrees. This work is validated by satisfactory work in the school for a period of one semester. This means that Cedarville College has a standing comparable to other colleges and that if any of our students do satisfactory work here and elsewhere their credits are good throughout the country.


The trustees of the college are currently working in conjunction with the Ohio State Depart-

ment of Education to obtain recognition for teacher certification. We are hopeful that soon we will be able to certify teachers in the elementary and secondary fields. At the present we are offering majors in Bible, Education, English and Literature, Music, Social Science and General Science. In addition the college also offers teaching fields working toward school teaching certification in General Science, History, Languages, and Physical Education.

With a crying need not only for school teachers but even more so, Christian school teachers and an educated Christian constituency, Cedarville College offers a unique opportunity academically and spiritually for any young person desirous of a fine competent Christian education.



THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Dear Friends:

This is the day after graduation! As we look back over the years' activities we praise the Lord for His goodness to us. We have seen His hand working in our behalf as He has guided us, supplied our needs and helped us face insurmountable difficulties. "The Lord hath done great things for us whereof we are glad."

This will be our last bulletin for the summer months. It is prepared especially for young people who are looking forward to college next fall. The inside pages of this issue are given over entirely to pictures which tell the story of Cedarville College better than two pages of words could ever tell it. Registrar John R. Stoll's article briefly describes the courses offered and states the recognition enjoyed by Cedarville College. At the present time we have more students enrolled for the fall semester than at any other time in our history at this season of the year. Since our dormitory facilities are limited we urge prospective students to make application now if they are interested in beginning college training next September. Classes begin Wednesday, September 12 at 8 A.M.

I want to thank each one of you for your part in helping to reduce our debt. The friends of our college have sacrificially given to make Cedarville College a debt free institution. At

graduation time we needed \$3106.21 to be free of a \$30,000 debt which faced us last year. I am quite sure that this debt would have been entirely eliminated if you had received your envelope a week or so earlier. We regret that the printing company did not deliver the envelopes on the scheduled date so we were unable to mail them on time. Because of this hinderance the two friends who have promised the \$9,000 have agreed to extend the offer until July 15th. If you have not used the envelope received through the mail a few days ago, will you consider this need and mail your gift today. If you have lost the envelope, place your gift in an ordinary envelope mark it "debt retirement" and mail it to the college. Remember July 15th is the deadline!

Many of our faculty members will be going to summer school to prepare for a more efficient ministry in the classroom. As you know our faculty and staff will be paid during the summer months as though school were still in session. In order to pay these salaries up to date we must have a regular income in the form of gifts from churches and individuals. During the summer we have no income from student fees and tuition. In May 1955 we received \$3,022,29 in gifts; in May 1956 gifts for the general fund totaled \$3,111.14 but over \$4,000 in additional gifts came into the college office for the debt retirement fund. We faced real financial problems last summer due to the fact that the June gifts totaled only \$2,482.23. It was necessary at that time to make a special appeal so in July our friends came to the rescue and sent gifts totaling \$6,183.73. We do not enjoy making special appeals and with your help during June, July and August we will not find it necessary to write a special letter about the need for money.

It is our prayer that you will have a good vacation time. We hope some of you will visit our campus during the summer. The administraton building will be open each week, Monday thru Friday from 9 A.M. to 5 P.M. and someone on our staff will be here to answer any questions and give you a "guided tour" of the campus.
