The President's Letter

Dear Friends of Cedarville College:

Last Saturday some of our trustees visited the campus for special committee meetings. In going over our financial picture, we had many reasons to thank God for His abundant blessings. We regret to report, however, that the chairman of our board of trustees, Mr. George S. Milner, fell and broke his ankle while he was with us. We ask our readers to remember him in prayer during these days when he is at home.

It has been suggested that the Lord has been pleased to keep us poor that we might constantly trust Him. We have been thinking about a verse in Proverbs 30 which seems to indicate the Lord's purposes in so dealing with His children: "Remove far from me vanity and lies: give me neither poverty nor riches; feed me with food convenient for me; lest I be full, and deny thee, and say, Who is the Lord? or lest I be poor, and steal, and take the name of my God in vain." Proverbs 30:8,9.

We are very much determined that Cedarville College shall never deny the Lord who so miraculously established the school. C. C. Senior Claims Interscholastic Honor

Cedarville College is proud of senior Roy Shelpman who won first place in radio announcing at the annual interscholastic speech contest held at Marietta College, Marietta, Ohio, Saturday, February 2.

Ohio State University, Ohio Wesleyan, Wooster College, and other colleges and universities entered contestants in this annual event



The contest consisted of a five-minute prepared newscast, three minutes of sight reading, and one minute of ad lib. Participants were judged on timing, comprehension of material, voice, sense of communication, and general radio ability.

In recognition of his honor of achieving first place, Roy Shelpman was presented a bronze medal by Dr. Wm. B. Irvine, president of Marietta College.

Roy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Shelpman, Sr. of Van Dyke, Michigan. He is an English major and plans to continue his education with seminary work upon graduation from Cedarville College this spring. He has worked a few months with radio station WBLY in Springfield. Roy has many interests and is active in extra-curricular activities in the college.

Cedarville College Librarian Leaves

Cedarville College regrets losing the head librarian, Martha Hall, who resigned last week after three and one-half years of effective and dedicated service. Miss Hall has reorganized the College Library system, and she has classified the books properly, making them more accessible to the students.

Assistant Librarian, Miss Williamson, and student assistants, Ruth Smelser and Alberta Graham, stated that they have enjoyed very much working with Miss Hall and that they regret her leaving.

The students, faculty, and staff of Cedarville College have benefited by the kindly help which they have received from Miss Hall. With her supervision the library has been conducive to study; and with her ready assistance, students and faculty have been able to work more efficiently. We will miss Miss Hall, but we pray that God may use her abundantly wherever He leads her in the future.

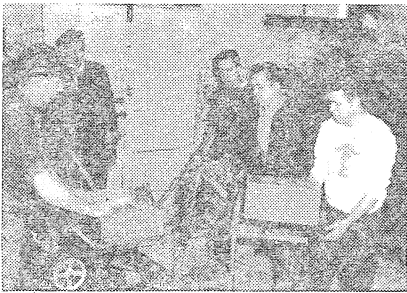

Cement — And See Miracles

The Lord has enabled us to add equipment and make many improvements on our campus during the past two years. As we earnestly try to strengthen our college we never seem to come to an end of the things which we desire to do to give our young people the advantages which they deserve.

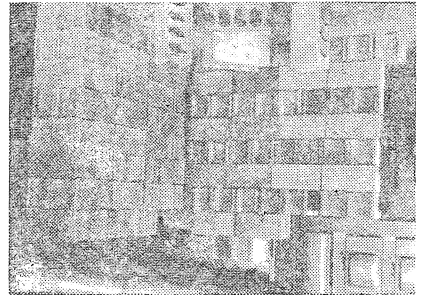
Our students will agree that right now we need a new dormitory. We must add some space to our gymnasium building to provide rest rooms. A sidewalk from the administration building to the dining hall must be constructed. Since we have a tennis team with no tennis courts, we must make this necessary athletic equipment. All of this building will take cement—a lot of cement! We have discovered a source which will supply this needed commodity for \$1.03 per sack, provided we buy a minimum of 500 sacks in a truck-load.



In order to do any building we must have cement blocks. To buy them on the market is financially prohibitive. Some of our students and staff have indicated their willingness to help make our own concrete blocks. Through the gifts of our friends, concrete-block equipment has been purchased. The pictures on this page will indicate that it has been put into operation under the direction of our maintenance man, Mr. Marshall.

Here are some "cement block" facts for our readers to consider: four sacks of cement plus one ton of ground limestone will make 80 blocks. Cement — \$4.32 — limestone—\$2.15— totals—\$6.47 for 80 concrete blocks—

approximately \$.08 per block — for materials. If we add \$.02 per block for water and electricity, these building units can be made by our "volunteers" for \$.10 each.



Each month we mail more than 10,000 college BULLETINS. If each BULLETIN will influence one person to give ten cents for a concrete block, it is easy to see how rapidly we can make enough blocks to erect our necessary buildings! Whatever you give through your church or directly to the college for this purpose should be designated for "BLOCKS." We have had requests from Sunday school classes and young people's groups asking for a Cedarville College project — here is one project which should appeal to the smallest as well as the largest group in your church.

By your gifts you can purchase "Cement—and See Miracles," as all of us, with the blessing of God, work together to accomplish a task impossible to only a few.

Money Returns From Higher Education

The Kiplinger Washington Letter gives some interesting statistics on lifetime earnings. "Is it worth what it costs? The average elementary school grad in a lifetime will earn \$116,000. The average graduate of a high school in a lifetime will earn \$165,000. The average graduate of a college in a lifetime will earn \$263,000. A college education on the average costs \$9000 . . . compare it with returns. If some young people ask you, show them these figures."
