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The President's Letter

Dear Friends of Cedarville College:

National leaders are expressing great concern about the shortage of scientists and engineers in our country. One editorial states, "There is now a shortage of twenty thousand scientists" in the United States.

Khrushchev, the Communist Party leader, has boasted: "The capitalists always regard our people as being backward, but today we have more engineers and more supporting engineering technical personnel than any capitalist country."

All of us are concerned that our nation excel in everything that will mean protection for its citizens and advancement for the cause of freedom. There is another "shortage," however, which should bring alarm to Christian people of our times. This is of a spiritual nature and can be corrected only as the Lord's people are willing to face their individual responsibilities and actually pay the price of doing something about it. We refer to a shortage of soul-winners. The Lord Jesus referred to this when he said, "The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few" (Luke 10:2).

Both the United States and Russia now have about a million scientists and engineers. There seems to be an indication that Russia is going ahead of our nation in the training of these technical workers. As one writer puts it, "It's the trend that is alarming." Spiritually, too, it is the trend that is alarming. There seems to be an indifference on the part of so many toward this most important ministry. One of the tragedies of our times is the inference that soul-winning is a responsibility left only to the preacher and missionary. The Bible makes no distinction between "laity" and "clergy"; so it would seem that the responsibility is ours as individuals.

Increasingly, soul winning must be done outside the regular services of the church, if we are to see decisions for Christ in the church. This means that Christian businessmen, teachers, scientists, laborers, and office workers must live for Christ and witness for Him in season and out of season.

The Christian liberal arts college can have a definite place in the training of our young people for a life work and a soul-winning ministry, too.

grees, assisted by Dr. C. R. Maddox, Dean of the college. Awards will be given for music proficiency and scholarship, and the President's Trophy will be awarded to the student who has shown outstanding ability in various fields during the past year. The college will award one Bachelor of Theology degree and seventeen Bachelor of Arts degrees and will graduate eight who have completed the Master Bible Course.

One to teach social science and the other biology. We will appreciate your prayers that the Lord may lead in the selecting of teachers in Bible, modern languages, and physical education.

As you can see from another report in this BULLETIN, we are urgently in need of increased financial support. We do not enjoy a constant reference to money, but we believe our friends should know something of the problem which we face. It takes approximately \$5,000 per month to pay salaries alone. Two-thirds of this money must come from churches or individuals.

On January 26 we started on the last half of our season by upsetting favored Rio Grande College. With a little experience under our belts, the victories started coming closer together; and in the last eight games we were able to salvage four, taking three of the last four for an overall eight-win and fifteen-loss record.

Although not an overpowering record, it was a successful season in many ways. Coach Underwood is to be commended for his excellent handling of such a young ball club, which included three Freshmen on the first five.

Particular attention and praise should be given to Junior Lane Moody and Freshman Pete Reese. These two fellows were selected by the coaches of the league to be placed on the all Mid-Ohio League team. Lane was a fine playmaker, and his two years of experience were a steadying influence on the team. Pete showed rare form at times, as he put that ball through the hoop at every angle. He set a new individual scoring record for the team with thirty-nine points against Roberts Wesleyan College.

At the basketball banquet varsity letters were awarded to Dick Wentzel, Lane Moody, John Entner, Pete Reese, Bob Humphreys, and Jerry Thornton. Also presented at this banquet was the Most Valuable Player award. John Entner, by vote of the team, received the award.
