

Work Begins On New Girls' Dormitory At Cedarville College



This is a drawing of the new Cedarville College girls' dormitory by Architect Roland V. Stout of Columbus. Construction of the 33-room masonry and frame dwelling is expected to be completed by Sept. 1, when incoming students arrive for the autumn term. The dormitory, which will house 62 students, will include a lobby (center) and two rooms for a housemother.

Cedarville College, which has just finished its fourth year under Baptist administration, already is having growing pains.

Milner Chapel, a tennis court and new sidewalks have been completed, and construction has started on a new girls' dormitory and an addition to the

college gymnasium.

Work on the dormitory, to house 62 women students, began May 29 and is expected to be completed by Sept. 1, when former students return for the

autumn term and new students begin their studies.

The one-story building will be of block and frame construction. It will include a lobby and two rooms for the housemother. The former girls' dormitory will be used as a boys' dormitory in the future, college officials said Saturday.

Estimated cost of the new dormitory is \$25,000, a figure which is hard to believe in these days of costly con-

Working Together With God

Periodically we receive letters from various individuals asking for information about a Cedarville College project which they may undertake. On this page of our BULLETIN we are presenting projects which may be acceptable to almost anyone who is interested in the college.

Churches, Bible classes, missionary societies, young people's groups, and individuals can be of vital help to the erection of this new building by subscribing to one of the dormitory projects listed below.

It has been estimated by the architect that it will cost approximately \$25,000 to build this housing unit for our girls. The building will care for sixty-two girls, provide an apartment for the housemother, and furnish a lounge for those who live in this building. It will, therefore, cost us approximately \$800 per room to pay for the

construction. It other \$400 to purchase furniture and drapes for each room.

This financial obligation could easily be met if a number of churches, Sunday school classes, or other groups in the churches would be willing, for example, to undertake the payment for a room over a

period of two years.

Individuals or church groups may wish to purchase one of the rooms as a memorial to a loved one or friend.

The college will provide a plaque for the door of each room indicating whether the room is a gift or memorial and indicating the name of the individual or group giving the money to build this room.

Undoubtedly there are groups or individuals who will be willing to help our young people by purchasing equipment for the individual rooms. Listed below are the articles of furniture

New Faculty Members

When college classes begin on September 11, four new faculty members will join our staff. These individuals have been added to our faculty in accordance with the plans of the board of trustees for a larger and better Cedarville College.

Rev. Cleveland McDonald, pastor of the Swissvale Baptist Church in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and former missionary to Brazil under the Association of Baptists for World Evangelism, will be teaching social studies this next semester. Mr. McDonald is a graduate of the Moody Bible Institute of Chicago. He has a B.A. degree from James Millikin University in Decatur, Illinois, and a M.Litt. degree from the University of Pittsburgh. He has also completed a number of hours work toward his doctor's degree. He plans to continue his work toward this goal at Ohio State University.

Mr. Dale Thomson, a graduate of Cedarville College in the class of 1956, will teach courses in the biological sciences at Cedarville while he works for his master's degree at Ohio State. Mr. Thomson also attended Fenn College in Cleveland, and for the past year has taught at the Miami Christian School in Miami, Florida.

Mr. Sherwin Bowser joins our faculty as an instructor in physical education. He will have charge of our athletic teams, coaching basketball and baseball. He will replace Mr. Robert Underwood, who has been employed as the registrar of the college. Mr. Bowser will be our first full-time physical education instructor, devoting all his time to the athletic department of the college. He has a B.S. degree in physical education from The King's College and has completed his work for the Master of Arts degree in physical education at Columbia Teachers College.

Mr. Glenn Wittig will be teaching courses in English and speech. He has a B.A. degree from Tennessee Temple College and has completed his residence requirements for the master's degree at Baylor University.

struction. But the reason can be found on the Cedarville campus, where even the college president, James T. Jeremiah, may be seen driving a truck, making concrete blocks, or pouring cement.

Student and faculty volunteer labor has made possible many Cedarville College projects, and a concrete blockmaking machine donated by friends of the college saves on material on construction jobs.

Students will be employed on the dormitory project during the summer months under the supervision of Gerald Marshall, building superintendent.

Fifteen states and three foreign countries were represented in the 1956-57 student body, and increased enrollment is expected in the ensuing years, creating a need for new dormitories. Thirty new students already have been accepted for the coming year with more expected to enroll during July and August, officials said.

At a meeting of the college board of trustees during the school term a recommendation was adopted whereby the academic offerings of Cedarville College would be substantially implemented. The action assured that the college would be able to adequately train young people in six basic major fields—Bib'e and philosophy; communications (English, languages, speech and literature); music; social studies; psychology and education and science.

President Jeremiah writes the following in the Bulletin of Cedarville Collgee, "We are very much determined that Cedarville College shall never deny the Lord who so miraculously established the school. Since confidence in and dependence upon men have been the ruination of many institutions, we desire to say with the writer of Proverbs: "Give me neither poverty nor riches . . . lest I . . . deny thee."
