REV. E. A. LOCKERBIE JOINS CEDARVILLE COLLEGE STAFF

On October 1st, Rev. E. A. Lockerbie, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Buffalo, New York, will become the field representative of the college. He will be conducting Bible conferences and evangelistic campaigns in the churches, presenting the objectives and future plans of the college and counseling young people and their parents regarding the possibilities of a Christian education at Cedarville.

Pastor Lockerbie served as a home missionary in northern Canada from 1935 through 1937 and was ordained to the Gospel ministry in May of 1938. He has held pastorates in Ontario, Michigan, and New York.

His ministry has been particularly blessed among young people. There are many on the mission field or in pastorates because of his faithful ministry. The churches which he has served have shown a definite increase in missionary interest. One congregation increased its missionary giving from \$3,000 to \$16,000 annually over a five-year period of his ministry. Another church which he served raised its missionary giving from \$5,000 to \$12,000 in annual gifts to missions.

Brother Lockerbie spent several years in deputation work for the Leprosy Mission. In this responsibility he planned, organized, and conducted week-long missionary conferences.

He also taught church history and missions in the Buffalo Bible Institute while he was serving as the pastor of the First Baptist Church.

Mr. Lockerbie has already scheduled a number of meetings in the churches. Our readers are urged to pray for him

FINISHING AND FURNISHING THE NEW DORM

In the last bulletin we presented a plan for the building and furnishing of our new dormitory. We are very thankful for the response which has been shown already by churches and individuals.

We pointed out that churches, Bible classes, missionary societies, young peoples groups, and individuals could be of vital help to the college in making this new building available to our students.

As you can see from the pictures in

this issue of the BULLETIN, we are making progress toward the completion of this building. It will cost approximately \$800 a room to build this structure. Perhaps you or your church will accept the challenge to help Cedarville College pay for this building.

rooms at a better price than that announced in the previous BULLETIN. The furniture has been ordered, and now we are assured of the exact cost. For your information, we list furniture which must be provided for each of the 31 rooms in the dorm:

Soon after classes were dismissed last June, foundations were laid for the new dormitory. When this work was done, two buildings were moved some 12 to 15 miles from Wright Patterson Air Base to our campus. These government housing units served as a "shell" for our new building. We have heard that some folks who saw the beginning of this project were disappointed at what they observed. Things are different now since they see the transformation being wrought on these buildings.

If this project had been let out to a contractor the new dormitory would have cost much more than the estimated \$25,000 which we have planned to put into it. All the credit for the building of this fine dormitory should go to the crew of men whose pictures appear above the "Cedarville College Construction Company." All but four of these men are or have been students in the college.

Dear Friends:

College classes for the fall semester began Wednesday, September 11, at 8 a.m. This year we have 120 students enrolled. These young people come to us from twelve states and two foreign countries. The new students will find college work quite different from high school, and I am sure that they will appreciate your prayers as they begin training away from home.

This year, for the first time since we took over the operation of the college, a "homecoming" program has been arranged. The students will prepare a float for the annual Cedarville parade on Friday, October 25. On Saturday afternoon, the 26th, a football game will be played with a team from another school. The English department of the college is preparing a three-act play for Saturday night. On Sunday morning, a visiting speaker from the alumni will be preaching in Grace Baptist Church. We welcome all our friends to Cedarville College for this special occasion.

We are grateful to God for the way He has met our spiritual and financial needs during the past months. This year will be one of real testing because of the increase in faculty salaries, which will total \$52,000 for the year. It has been necessary for us to add faculty members in order to offer the courses which our young people demand and need.

Time after time we have been led to II Corinthians 9:8 for encouragement in the work at Cedarville. "God is able to make all grace abound toward you; that ye, always having all sufficiency in all things, may abound to every good work," With that promise to rest upon, what more could we ask?
