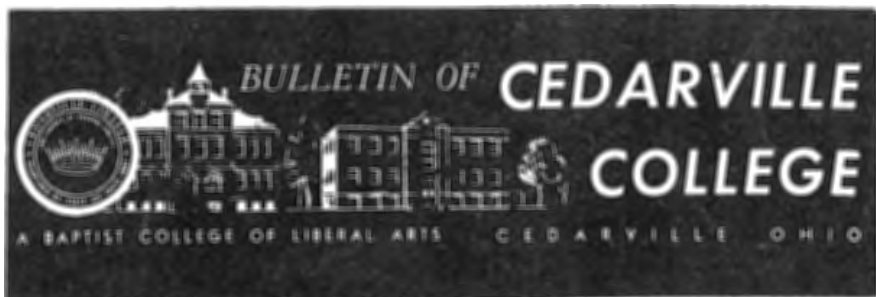

Ketcham, National Consultant of the General Association of Regular Baptist Churches will deliver the commencement address. The baccalaureate service will be held on Thursday evening, May 25, at 7:30 o'clock. Rev. J. L. Patten, President of the Omaha Baptist Bible College will be the speaker. Both the commencement and baccalaureate will be held in the Alford Memorial Gymnasium and the public is invited.

MISSIONARY CONFERENCE



During last November, a missionary conference committee composed of the Fellowship of World Missions president, secretary, two other students, and Pastor Moffat began to plan for a missionary conference in April. The conference was to be jointly sponsored by FWM and the Grace Baptist Church of Cedarville. Missionaries were contacted to speak, and the program was carefully planned.

From April 5-9 we enjoyed the Second Annual Missionary Conference at Cedarville College. The theme was "To the Ends of the Earth" and an appropriate theme chorus was used. Three chapel services, four evening services, and services all day Sunday were addressed by missionary speakers. Slides of the various fields represented were shown in the evening services. Curious from different lands were displayed, and descriptive literature was available to all. In each service there was special music provided by members of the student body.

Missionaries for the conference were as follows: Rev. William Fusco of Italy, Miss Ruth Hege from Belgian Congo, Rev. and Mrs. Donald Hare from Brazil, Dr. Gerald Fisher from Central African Republic, Rev. Alan Metcalf from the Hebrew Christian Society of Cleveland, Rev. and Mrs. Karl Luyben of Liberia, Miss Ruth Nephew of Africa, and Mrs. Dale Davis of Alaska.

The purpose of the conference was not only to challenge students for mission-

ary service, but to encourage prayer in behalf of missionaries, and to encourage all the students to present themselves to Christ, that in whatever field He chooses for them, they would obediently follow.

Each of the missionaries ably presented their fields of service. Rev. Fusco gave a clear picture of the conditions in Italy and the cost of being true to Christ amidst heavy opposition. Rev. Hare showed the field of Brazil to be a challenging one. Miss Hege gave a stirring account of the missionaries as they left the Congo recently. We were impressed with her many years of service both in Venezuela and the Congo. Rev. Metcalf challenged us regarding the intricate work of Jewish missions. The work of a medical missionary was presented well by Dr. Fisher, who showed how effective it is to not only minister to the spiritual needs of natives, but to their physical needs, which opens a way for an effective witness for Christ. On Saturday evening a missionary symposium was held. The missionaries and former missionaries were asked questions concerning missions by the student body. Rev. Luyben, who is presently a student at the school, preached in the Sunday worship service. Missionaries, and missionary wives spoke in the Sunday School classes and the youth groups of the church.

It is difficult to estimate the results of the conference. It would also be difficult to say which service was the best. On the final Sunday evening service, after a challenging message by Rev. Hare, stu-

dents who were called to missionary service previously and as a result of this conference came forward and then the greater majority of the students rose to publicly proclaim their intention to follow the leading of the Lord in their lives, in whatever capacity and place He would have them serve.

We praise the Lord for His blessing on this second conference and we are looking forward to continuing a similar conference here at Cedarville College every year.

PROGRESS REPORT

In recent issues of the college bulletin we have announced plans for the erection of a new student center. A number of churches are planning special Cedarville College services in which they plan to take a special offering for this project. We are grateful for this interest in the building project.

Our students are endeavoring to raise money for the new building. A number of them have already raised the \$100, which they indicated would be their goal. A few weeks ago 180 of our young people volunteered to raise a total of \$18,000 for the project.

At the present time we have \$7,339.11 in the Student Center Fund. The trustees have voted to begin this new building when we have sufficient funds to complete the Student Center section of it. The gymnasium area will require additional funds. The total financial requirement for the completed project has been estimated at \$150,000.

Though we are encouraged by the response to our appeal for this building, we do not see the possibility of beginning it this summer unless a substantial amount of money is received before June 1. Since bonds may be retired by dormitory income we can sell bonds for this purpose but a Student Center produces very little income and therefore it does not seem wise to finance this building by the bond method. We must have the funds before we can build.

The need for this new unit will be quite evident when we announce that applications for the fall semester now total 170.

It will not be possible to accept many more of our young people who are looking to Cedarville for a Christian education, unless the new student center becomes a reality.
