ALUMNI PLEDGE OVER \$6,000 IN PASSING THE TORCH

Twelve weeks ago (November 1, 1972) 30,000 friends of the college were contacted to mark the beginning of the "Passing the Torch" general fund campaign. The goal is to get 800 people to pledge \$10 a month for one year, providing almost a \$100,000 increase to the general fund.

Over 2,000 alumni were asked to participate in reaching this goal. As of February 1, 1973, forty-seven alumni families have responded with pledges totaling over \$6,000. The majority have pledged \$10 per month with some more and some less.

Each person who pledges will receive a beautiful white Italian marble paperweight with the torch seal engraved on an emblem. This displayed token will help each donor pray more effectively. Also, each donor will, quarterly, receive a letter from a student sharing his college experiences. Remember how hard it was to write home? Presently there are 242 units of \$10 pledges supporting the program. Each participant will receive a separate letter from a student.

Perhaps more important to each student is the fact that the cost of their education will be reduced as a direct result of the support alumni and friends give. The student who is a freshman or sophomore will likely see within their residency here on campus full accreditation by the North Central Association. In March of 1972, full candidacy was granted. The success of the "Passing the Torch" program will mean a great deal in achieving the full recognition. It is important that academic excellence as well as spiritual commitment be encouraged.

STUDENT BODY LOAN AND GRANT FUND INCREASES POTENTIAL

In the spring of 1972, the Class of '72 initiated with a \$1,000 class gift the beginning of a special fund that will have an increasing effect on students in need of financial help. The student body through the excellent efforts of the Walk-a-thon contributed \$1,000 and student Council transferred their Student Council Loan Fund proceeds of \$2,100 to this new endeavor. A faculty gift and a \$500 alumnus gift has swelled the total for the grant fund to over \$6,500.

Presently there are seventeen students borrowing at 6% various amounts of this fund up to \$1,000 to cover the costs of their education. Since over 50% of all students must borrow money from some source this new source was quickly depleted to \$0. All loans are payable one year after graduation or when a person leaves.

Perhaps the most significant point is that each student body member has donated each quarter 25% of his class dues toward helping his fellow students. Almost \$1,000 will be raised through this effort each quarter, or \$3,000 per year.

Mr. Dave Gidley, '73, Director of Financial Aid and administrator of the fund, states that the purpose for this new resource of loans and grants is to develop a self-perpetuating source of financial aid to administered to those who qualify and desire such assistance.

Two of the recipients comment on the program:

Mr. Ron Wita, senior majoring in Business Administration and Psychology, writes, "Many times, Satan will use the area of financial instability as a trap to retard the spiritual growth of a believer and cause the believer to stum-

ble in his faith. But as the Apostle Paul instructs the church at Corinth, 'Watch ye, stand fast in the faith, quit you like

men, be strong.' The question of making deadline payments can stifle the growth of a student, but the Lord provided for me through the love and concern of generous alumni."



Mrs. Sally Eagleston Lemaster, senior majoring in Elementary Education, says, "My God shall supply all your need..." How thankful I am that God has supplied my financial needs in many ways. One way was with a 90-day

loan with very little interest. I praise the Lord for it."

There is a need for more "generous alumni" --- perhaps you were blessed through the efforts of some financial aid plan. You may want to help some student like Sally or Ron realize the benefits you enjoyed. You may designate your tax deductible gift to the Student Body Loan and Grant Fund.

AT CEDARVILLE

20 years ago......

On Saturday, April 4, 1953, the ownership of Cedarville College was transferred into the hands of the Trustees of the Baptist Bible Institute of Cleveland, beginning what was to become two decades of progress.

In 1953, nine buildings constituted the campus of Cedarville College. Among them were Alford Gymnasium, Harriman Hall, the science building, Old Main and the Library and Student Lounge.

Speaker for the first Bible Conference held under the new administration was Dr. Robert Ketcham.

10 years ago......

Three dormitories were remodeled or built during 1963. Patterson Hall was remodeled for use as the Health Center and a men's residence hall and was officially named for Mr. William Patterson, a trustee from Parma, Ohio. Ambassador Hall was purchased and transformed into the center for music on the campus. Williams Hall was named for college professor Dr. Arthur Williams.

Plans for the first summer school sessions were announced by the Office

of the Academic Dean.

A self-study of the college began for later presentation to the North Central Association upon completion.

The Gym-Student Center was completed at a cost of \$200,000 and was opened for first use during 1963. The gym seating capacity was planned for 2,000.

During the 1962-63 school year, the college purchased the 80 acres of the Roy Waddle farm north of the existing campus for future dormitory additions and athletic fields.
