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## ALUMNI SET ANNUAL FUND GOAL

Early on Homecoming morning your executive committee met with College Trustees and Administrators at a communications breakfast. During this informal time, there was a free-flowing exchange of ideas, questions and answers.

As a result of this meeting and previous meetings with Mr. Lee Turner, Director of Development, the Alumni Association has instituted a goal-oriented fund drive. It is the opinion of your Association leaders that the Annual Fund Drive would be measurably more effective if it is goal directed.

The goal selected was chosen from a list of priorities consistent with the College's long-range plan. This assures that the Fund Drive will not be misdirected, but will be of maximum benefit to your Alma Mater and the student body it now serves.

The giving goal for the coming year is to raise \$50,000 for the completion of the lower level of the new science center. The alumni annex of the new science center will house biological sciences consisting of three labs, a classroom and an individual study lab. Thus, allowing the old science building to be converted into regular classrooms needed to relieve the classroom crush created by the record enrollment of 1,009 students.

## HOMECOMING '73— A DEFINITE DIFFERENCE FOR ALUMNI!

Homecoming '73 had several new features in which alumni played an important role. For most alumni, Homecoming is a weekend affair; but this year brought a notable exception to several others.

The week preceding Homecoming found the students' attention turning toward alumni as they attended chapel each day and listened to five different alumni bring challenging thoughts


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## ALUMNI ANNEX

Once a building is ready for use, there is a tendency for people to forget about any further financial need which still exists. However, the Executive Committee feels that the Association has reached the size and stature needed to accept a difficult challenge. To make it even more interesting, the College Trustees and Administrators have agreed to name this phase of the building after the Alumni if just \$50,000 of the remaining \$130,000 needed is raised by Alumni in the Annual Fund Drive.


