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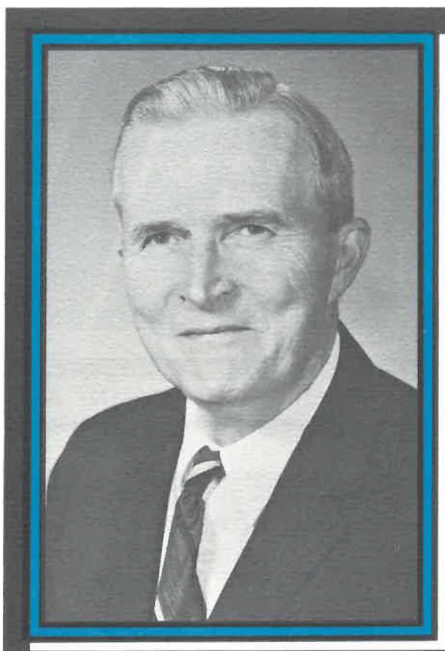

ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR AWARD

The Alumnus of the Year Award for 1974 has been presented to **Dr. James L. Entner** ('61).

Dr. Entner, a past Cedarville College Student Body President, was graduated from the Indiana University School of Medicine in 1965, and has completed his first term as a Medical Missionary in the Philippine Islands. For four years, Jim has been involved in the operation of out-patient clinics in seventeen locations throughout the Philippines, all of which were without medical facilities and some of which had never before been reached by any type of missions program.

He has recently been asked to conduct a feasibility study in regard to a Medical Mission program for the Upper Amazon Field Council of A.B.W.E. in Brazil. When this has been completed, the Entners will be returning to the Islands, this time to begin the construction of a hospital in the city of Roxas.

As a well-qualified physician and as a dedicated disciple of the Lord, Jim Entner has been a source of challenge and encouragement for students whose desire it is to enter the field of medicine as well as other areas that have been difficult for Cedarville graduates to attain. He has demonstrated himself to be a most useable tool in the hands of the Great Physician.

HONORARY ALUMNUS

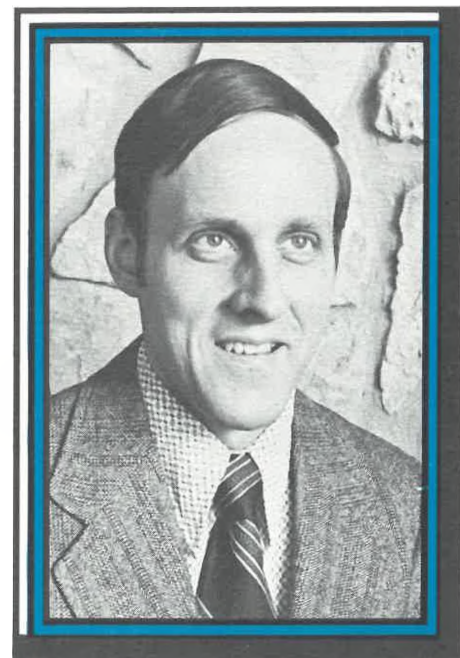
The "Honorary Alumnus" Award for 1974 has been presented to a gentleman who has had a long and close relationship with Cedarville College.

Rev. Earl V. Willetts, Pastor Emeritus of Berea Baptist Church in Berea, Ohio and former faculty member of the Baptist Bible Institute of Cleveland, was with the carload of Trustees that "motored to Cedarville to look the College over" in 1953. He was then a member of the original Board of Trustees of the Cedarville Baptist College and Bible Institute and has continued as a Trustee to the present time.

As a reflection of Rev. Willetts' faithfulness and dedication, it is significant to note that his ministry in Berea has not only supported the growth of Cedarville, but has furnished the College with its most important ingredient—people. The first cook under the Baptist Administration, Mrs. Jessie Shirley, was from Berea, as were two of the earliest faculty member, Dr. Donald Waite and Dr. Bruce Turnbull, and an early, but well-known staff member Rev. Bob Rogers. In addition, over forty-five students have been channelled into the student body of Cedarville College.

Rev. Earl Willetts has sacrificially contributed a large part of his life to Cedarville College and has had a profound influence upon our lives.

It is an honor to officially count him as "one of us" in the Alumni Association.



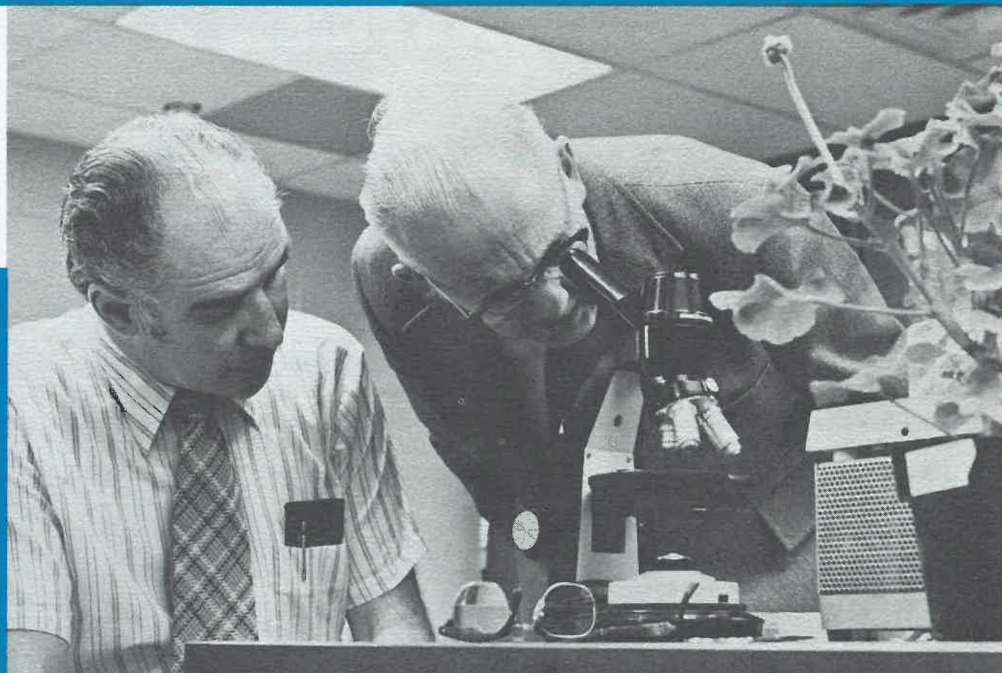

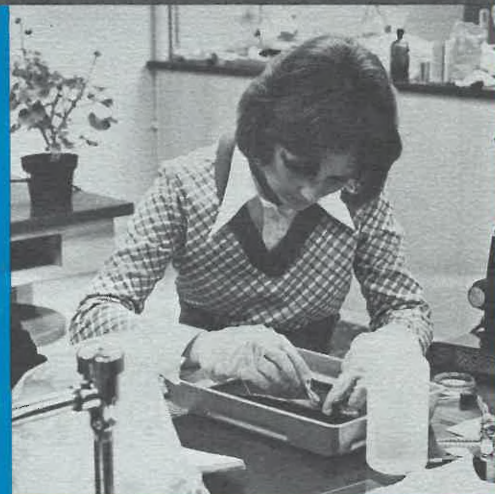
ALUMNI ANNEX

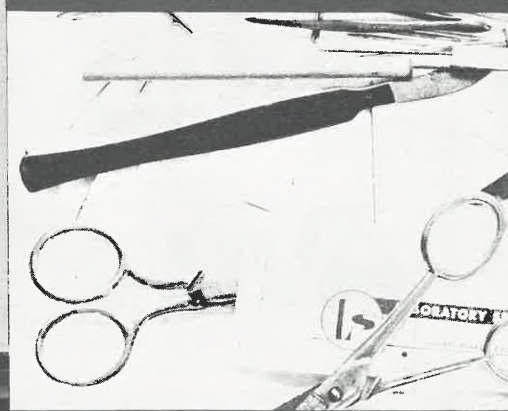

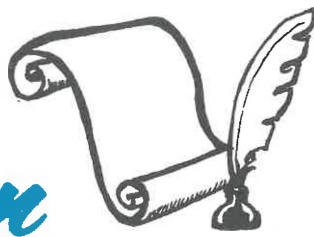

Prolific Penmen



There are few important teachings of the Scripture that have been as frequently neglected as has the doctrine of the virgin birth of Christ.

Until now, with the publication of **The Virgin Birth of Christ: Doctrine of Diety**, the trained student investigating this topic has had to rely upon the classic but "heavy" 1930's defense by J. Gersham Machen or brief treatments to be found in volumes dealing primarily with other related doctrines. The task has been even more difficult for the interested layman in search of a concise yet complete presentation of this frequently questioned theme.

As a result, this new examination by Dr. Gromacki meets a real need by filling a gap in doctrinal studies.

The Virgin Birth is unusually easy to read in spite of its full content and technical completeness providing a refreshing study of this seasonally pertinent subject.

To All My New Testament Students Past, Present, and Future

Thus reads the dedication inscription from the recently released text **New Testament Survey** by Robert G. Gromacki.

Dr. Gromacki honors the Alumni by succeeding in his attempt to provide a thorough introduction to and survey of the New Testament text without getting bogged down in the minute detail that would characterize a more technical introduction.

The book combines necessary background material and valuable introductory data with a unique paragraph by paragraph summary commentary. The result is a useful tool for achieving greater understanding of the New Testament and its content in Sunday School classes and teacher training programs as well as in personal and group Bible study.

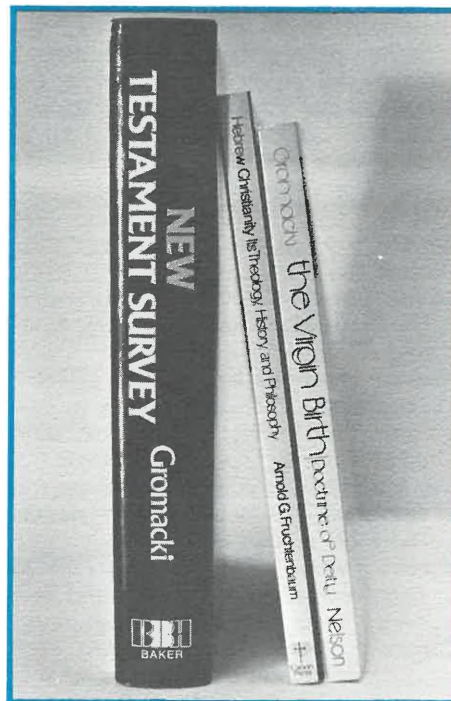
This newest addition to the rapidly increasing list of Cedarville College faculty publications is highly recommended to all serious students of the Scriptures as an extremely helpful study aid and text.

Hebrew Christianity, Its Theology, History, and Philosophy, by 1966 graduate Arnold Fruchtenbaum, is one of the clearest explanations and undoubtedly the most scripturally oriented exposition yet written dealing with this important Biblical distinctive and its contemporary significance.

Arnold, who is the Editor and Director of Publications for the American Board of Missions to the Jews, has done an excellent job of defining, explaining, and even applying many of the terms, issues, and problems of Hebrew Christianity.

Written from a very cultural perspective, the book wrestles with a wide range of both theological and practical matters that are involved when a Jew accepts Jesus as Christ and seeks membership and fellowship in a local church, yet rightly desires to maintain the community and national identities which have always been a part of his life.

Though not without controversy, **Hebrew Christianity** is a sensitive scholarly treatment of an issue which deserves your attention.
