



The new gymnasium is on the way! At the present time there are special gifts in the building fund totaling \$27,101. \$75,000 is available through the sale of bonds but at least another \$75,000 must be received through designated gifts before the building can be finished.

October 6, 1938 in a little country school house God spoke to my heart with the words "it is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgment" (Heb. 9:27). Your Record Counts

Recently, while talking with Dr. Williams during a weekend visit to my alma mater, Ihappened to make a statement something like this: "I'm convinced from my personal experience that most graduate schools do not worry about what school you attended, but rather, what kind of a record of performance you have compiled."

Being unable to speak, other than from personal experience, I went on to add that at least this was my case at the University of Wisconsin. After graduating from Cedarville in 1960, I felt the Lord would have me continue my schooling while still relatively young and accustomed to the pressures of college life. I was accepted at the University of Wisconsin provisionally on the basis of my personal under-graduate record, meaning simply that my subsequent performance must give evidence of my caliber as a graduate student. Indeed, students entering graduate school at the University of Wisconsin from any institution, including the University itself, are accepted under the same stipulations, the minimum grade point average being 2.75 on a 4.0 scale and the course requirements being dependent on the field of study to be entered. I have found that my training at Cedarville prepared me more than adequately for the University of Wisconsin graduate school of Education.

Presently, Cedarville College is seeking to build up its faculty, facilities and resources with the ultimate aims of teacher certification and accreditation. As important as these two objectives are, an even more important consideration for each individual student is his own excellence academically as well as spiritually. Neither God nor man places a premium on mediocrity. We are living in a highly competitive society and although a Christian should not seek excellence as an end in itself, I believe the Scriptures teach very definitely the importance of optimal development. Proverbs warns again and again against being a sluggard, (6:6, 18:9, 24:30-34). The essence of Paul's admonition in Romans 12:4-8 is "it's not what you have, but what you do with what you have that counts." God is more concerned with our actions than our ability; our production than our potential; our talent yielded than our talent possessed. I would encourage all young people to "give of your best to the Master."

The Cedarville College graduate will find God's place in this world for him, not because Cedarville is accredited or unaccredited, but because he is striving to live up to the highest possible standards of excellence for him as an individual in the strength of his Savior.
