PHONOTHON

On Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday evenings from mid-April to mid-May, members of Alpha Chi and other volunteers took over the office phones on the second floor of the Administration Building, occasionally "whooping" with excitement as they conducted a phonothon to contact alumni who had not yet given toward this year's annual fund goal of \$80,000. According to Gary Kuhn, Alumni Coordinator, 509 alumni pledged gifts totaled \$14,026.50 in this particular endeavor, by far the most successful phonothon of the several conducted by the Alumni office.

The 509 pledged donors almost doubled the March 1 total of 551 alumni contributors for this fiscal year, bringing the percentage of contributing alumni this year to 20.4%, or approximately the national average. The average pledged during the phonothon amounted to \$27.50, and many alumni committed themselves to the Torch Club in which they will budget a gift of \$10 per month for a year. Follow-up letters to remind alumni of their pledges and to thank them for participating in the phonothon left Mr. Kuhn's office within a few days of the calls. He also sent information to alumni whom the volunteers could not reach at the listed number or who chose not to contribute at this time.

The infectious quality of the enthusiasm and momentum generated by this year's project was evident in both callers and donors alike as callers gained confidence in themselves and their goals, and as many alumni expressed surprised pleasure at being reached "from where?!!"

The September issue of AVISO will provide a profile and analysis of the giving toward the 1978-79 Annual Fund.

The Phonothon proved to be a successful tool, increasing the number of alumni supporters while also increasing the dollar amount toward the July 1, 1978-June 30, 1979 Annual Fund.

The 1979-80 Annual Fund will begin this July.

199 SENIORS BECOME ALUMNI

One hundred ninety-nine seniors received diplomas from Cedarville College at the June 2 commencement in the James T. Jeremiah Chapel. President Paul Dixon, D.D., addressed the first class to graduate since he became president of the school last September. Lyle Anderson, Ph.D., directed the performance of the College Chorale. The trustees of the college presented Rev. Joseph M. Stowell, retiring national representative of the General Association of Regular Baptist Churches, with an honorary Doctor of Humanities degree.

Exclusive of "double majors," graduates and their majors included 12 in speech, 13 in comprehensive Bible, 20 in Pre-seminary Bible, 28 in business, 29 in elementary education, 16 in health and physical education, 17 in English, 1 in music, 3 in music education, 2 in church music, 8 in behavioral science, 12 in psy-chology, 15 in biology, 5 in chemistry, 6 in mathematics, 3 in history, 1 in political science, 4 in social science comprehensive, and 4 in broadcasting. The class gift, presented by class president John Potter, was a row of ten London Plane shade tree saplings lining the walk between the library and the chapel.

President Dixon also announced at the commencement that the trustees had authorized construction of a classroom annex for the library and the installation of a computer large and sophisticated enough to accommodate a wide range of administrative and educational needs at Cedarville.

DR. MARYALYCE JEREMIAH — COACH AND AUTHOR

It wasn't until the fall of 1978, after 9 years of teaching and coaching at Cedarville, that her dream was fulfilled. She became the women's head basketball coach at the University of Dayton. She explains her new job this way: "Most of my time is spent in coaching and training, of course. In the offseason I am busy recruiting and handling the dissemination of women's sports information."

To pull up roots that have grown deep into Cedarville for 13 years would be traumatic to some. But not Dr. Jeremiah. "It wasn't a big adjustment to make, which I guess proves the point that when you do what the Lord wants, it's not hard."

It hasn't been a bed of roses, though, as she quickly pointed out with a smile. "It was a little hairy when I first came. I had to build up a trust level, to let them know that I cared for them and that the various programs I was putting them through would make them good. I really do care for them and they came to know that."

Their record attests to the success of the coach's efforts, finishing the season with a 33-3 record. "We averaged over 79 points a game, our opponents averaged 51 points a game." After winning the State Championship they went to Nationals. They finished second in the nation in the women's small college division, losing the final game by only 5 points.

LAWLOR-PRINTY HALLS

Cedarville College named its newest men's dormitory at the Honor's Day ceremonies on May 4. The dormitory was named "Lawlor Hall" in honor of Dr. George Lawlor. Dr. Paul Dixon presented a special award to Dr. Lawlor, who will be leaving the college this year. He has taught Greek at Cedarville for the past 20 years. A plaque was presented to him in recognition of his years of faithful service.

Dr. Lawlor holds a Teacher's Diploma from Ithaca College, a B.A. from Burton College, a B.D., Grace Theological Seminary, Th.M., Grace Seminary, Special Language study, Winona Lake School of Theology. He was pastor for 15 years, and has since taught at Allentown, Pennsylvania Bible Institute, Faith Bible Institute of Indiana, Pennsylvania, Greensburg Bible Institute in Greensburg, Pennsylvania, and Cedarville College.

On May 15 during the Cedarville College Chapel service, the newest women's dormitory was named in honor of Mrs. Beatrice, "Ma" Printy, Resident Advisor of Maddox Hall. Dr. Paul Dixon presented "Ma" with a plaque for eight years of faithful service. Present for the ceremony were her four sons, who flew in from various parts of the country. Following the presentation, Mr. David Printy, her son, delivered the sermon. He is the Commissioner of Economic Development for the State of Minnesota.

Mrs. Printy became a widow in 1970. She also lost a son in Vietnam in 1971. She then came to Cedarville in the fall of 1971 as Resident Advisor. She was also acting Dean of Women for two years.

Kathy Ann Burkhard (74) and Rev. Richard W. Thomas were united in marriage May 12, 1979.


The wedding day for **Ester Calvin** (75) and George Travers was July 8, 1978. They reside in Ashland, Maine.

"How do I account for our success? I don't feel that I did it. It's the Lord. He's good to me, and I've got some really good talent. It's been a total effort from all."

There's a price to be paid for success, however. "It's a real challenge working with kids who need so much. Something is constantly being demanded of me—it's really tiring!"

But apart from the successful season, the change and the challenge have been positive. "My Christian life has grown from being here, because of the pressure I think. My total motivation in coaching is to honor and glorify God. I think that I communicate my Christianity when I talk about the things that make a good basketball player: self-control, attitudes, selflessness. The conversations come up all the time. I don't even plan them!"

Dr. Jeremiah's expertise in basketball has brought her the title of "author" as well as "full-time coach." She has recently completed a book, after a year and a half in the making, to be used as a textbook in college coaching classes. Though it has only been out since December, the new author reported "sales have been good. Several large schools have already called to say they'll be using it next year. I'll know more in the fall, but I am really pleased."

The drive and determination that have been characteristic of Dr. Jeremiah in all her endeavors have brought her success, and yet success is not an end in itself. "The world doesn't look at losers, but don't win at any cost," she said. "Do it God's way. We as Christians need to be the best we can be for God's glory, whether at Cedarville or at the University of Dayton."

You can join other alumni in the luxurious facilities of the Country Squire Motel complete with swimming pools, health spa and delicious food.



A portion of land owned by the college, located north of the campus on the east side of Route 72, has been sectioned into lots which are for sale. Construction of the first two homes is nearly completed.

The Student Senate In-forum was held in April with Psychology and Counseling as the theme. Featured speakers were Stanley Ballard, Jay Adams, Gary Collins and Lawrence Crabb.

The Financial Aid Office reports that 60% of Cedarville's student body received some type of financial aid through grants, loans, or employment during the 1978-79 academic year. Most of the funds came from outside the college.

JOGATHON-WALKATHON—the 1979 Student Body Project held May 15 received over \$30,000 toward the purchase of a new ambulance for the Rescue Squad and for the partial renovation of Alford Auditorium.

Four new professors will be joining the faculty: Keith Clark, Asst. Professor of Health and Physical Education; Dr. Charles Dolph, Asst. Professor of Psychology; Mark Larson, Asst. Professor of Spanish; and John Silvius, Asst. Professor of Biological Science.

The annual Junior-Senior Banquet was held Friday, May 18, at the Netherland-Hilton Hotel in Cincinnati. This year's theme was "In the Glory of His Image" and entertainment was provided by Steve and Maria Gardner.

Two-hundred fifty residents of Cedarville, including many college students, faculty and staff, are participating in a skin patch product test given by Proctor and Gamble. For their participation the village will receive \$5,000 toward the purchase of a new ambulance for the fire department.

Christine Wyrtzen performed a sacred vocal concert on May 25 in the James T. Jeremiah Chapel.

Three new academic programs will begin next fall: (1) a one-year Bible program resulting in a certificate; (2) a secretarial science program, one and two-year certificates or a four-year degree; and (3) Computer Science, in its beginning stages.

Cedar Day weekend took place on campus May 4-6. Alpha Chi planned three days of activities designed to benefit and entertain the college family, residents of the Cedarville community and area alumni and friends.

The trustees approved at their June meeting an addition to the Library that will supply four much needed classrooms.

Dr. James McGoldrick, Professor of History, has released his first book entitled "Luther's English Connection," published by Northwestern Publishing House. The cost is \$5.95 and is available in the college bookstore.

During the 48th Annual Conference of the General Association of Regular Baptist Churches, Cedarville College presented "Picnic in the Park," an afternoon of picnicing, music, and tours of the campus.

HONORS DAY

Friday, May 4, was Honors Day and over 200 students were honored for having been named to the Dean's Honor List. Several other undergraduate awards were also presented.

During the ceremonies, President Dixon presented a special award to Dr. George Lawlor. Dr. Lawlor, who will be leaving Cedarville this year, has taught Greek at the school for 20 years. He was presented with a plaque in recognition of his years of faithful service. It was also announced that the new men's dormitory, located at the north end of the campus, would be named Lawlor Hall in his honor.

Dr. Lawlor holds a Teacher's Diploma from Ithaca College, a B.A. from Burton College, a B.D., Grace Theological Seminary, Th.M., Grace Seminary, and Special Language study, Winona Lake School of Theology. He was a pastor for 15 years and has since taught at Allentown, Pennsylvania Bible Institute, Faith Bible Institute of Indiana, Pennsylvania, Greensburg Bible Institute in Greensburg, Pennsylvania, and Cedarville College.

Sports Update

SPRING SPORTS WRAP-UP

Under Coach Tom Hopewell (75), the baseball team recorded a 16-14 season, placing 2nd in the Mid-Ohio Conference and earning a playoff berth in the N.A.I.A. District 22 Tournament. Senior Fred Greetham (stolen-base record of 34) batted .433 in leading the team to a .304 average.

The 1979 track team climaxed the season with a thirdplace finish in the National Christian College Athletic Association meet held at Cedarville. Mark Bubel, Dale Shaw, Dave Rogers, and Mark Peters received citations as All-Americans from the NCCAA.

Dr. Al Monroe's golf team compiled a 12-4 record and won the N.A.I.A. District tournament in Lima, Ohio. Placing 5th in the 15-team Kenyon Invitational, 2nd in the 10-team Malone Invitational, Cedarville also defeated Wittenberg for the first time in golfing competition between the two. Tim Birk, Mark Womack, Keith Rice, and Jim Baldwin each posted more than ten season victories. Cedarville defeated Walsh by 3 strokes in the 10-team district tournament. Birk's statistics were 13-2-1 with an overall average of 75.9.

Dr. June Kearney and Jo Ellen Priola (78) directed their softball team to a 16-8 record during a spring of windy, rainy, even snowy April weather which affected all the spring sports. As a consequence of a strong performance against the University of Dayton, the girls won the Ohio Valley League title. Brenda Hobar (most home runs, most RBI's, highest batting average, and MVP), Vicki Butler (best defensive player), and Laurie Butler (most improved player) earned top honors.

The women's tennis team, starting slowly with a young team (one senior) finished the season 11th (the highest ever) out of a field of twenty teams in the state small college tourney held at Oberlin College. Cathy Boyd, Brenda Neally, Landa Penquite, Janelle Decker, and Shawn Taylor achieved top honors on the team coached by Dr. Pam Diehl and Becky (Delancey 78) Trittipoe.

Cedarville's men's tennis team, under Dr. Murray Murdock, again entered N.A.I.A. National competition after compiling a 16-2 record. Cedarville won both the Mid-Ohio Conference and the District 22 title for the 8th consecutive year and for the 11th time in the past 12 years. Gary Gallian and Jaques Poole won individual honors in district competition as singles champion and runner-up, respectively.
