LIBRARY

The Cedarville College Library actively aids the College in fulfilling its spiritual, social, and practical objectives. By accumulating and organizing books, periodicals, newspapers, phonorecords, phonotapes, slides, films, filmstrips and other materials, the library conserves knowledge and ideas, and becomes an active force in the teaching, research, and extension programs of the College.

The library is beneficial to the students in many ways. In the spiritual realm the library offers Bible Commentaries, Bible versions, systematic theologies, and other books which are used extensively by students for devotional and inspirational purposes, for independent research, for assigned readings, and for aid in preparing and presenting Bible messages. There are nearly four thousand books available in this field.

Academically, materials are available which support or enrich the curriculum, and current newspapers and periodicals keep the students informed regarding recent national and international trends. The library also seeks to be of service to the various campus organizations, and to individuals in their development as members of society.

Practically, the library offers employment to the students, thus aiding them materially to acquire a college education. Experience may be gained in book repair, binding, indexing, and reference, circulation, or bibliographic services.

The college faculty as well as local pastors and community residents avail themselves of the services of the library. There are now approximately 14,000 books in the library, not including periodicals, newspapers, and pamphlets. This is an increase of 50% during the past ten years.

Even though a great deal has been done to improve our library it is still far from adequate. We should have at least three times the number of books now on the library shelves.

This goal cannot be reached without funds designated for the purchase of books. Accreditation will be impossible until our library meets the minimum standard.
