ANNUAL FUND PROFILE

In an "off year" between capital campaigns to raise funds for new campus buildings, the 1978-1979 annual alumni fund almost matched the previous year's total. Final statistics concerning giving to Cedarville College directly from alumni between July 1, 1978, and June 30, 1979, indicate a total of \$65,328.87.

At least 757 alumni donors, or approximately 16% of the association, participated directly in the fiscal drive.

The success of the phonothon, conducted as a joint venture by alumni personnel and men from Alpha Chi, helped strengthen this year's results. Part of the \$14,000 from 509 pledges has already arrived, with approximately half yet to come.

This year's annual fund included a new feature—an automatic contribution to the Alumni Scholarship and Grant Endowment Fund.

In addition to specified gifts, in the amount of \$3,115 for this fund, 5% of the 1978-1979 undesignated alumni giving (or \$1,546) has been added to last year's balance of \$540. As of June 30, the total endowment stands at \$5,361, and the \$160 interest will be used for a scholarship.

The Alumni Council is thankful for your prayer support and your financial assistance. As the Association faces the challenge of the 92nd annual fund, please consider what God would have you do to support Christian higher education.

NATIONAL DIRECT STUDENT LOANS

Recently, Cedarville College received a letter of commendation from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare for its low default rate on National Direct Student Loans.

With a default rate of 5.83 percent, Cedarville was one of 1025 colleges receiving letters for meeting HEW's percent guideline. Approximately 275 schools have rates over 50 percent, with another 250 in the 41-50 percent bracket. Nationwide the default rate is 17.4 percent.

The Springfield (Ohio) Sun recently cited Cedarville as the only college in the area meeting the guideline. Some had rates of nearly 70 percent. Schools which exceed the 10 percent limit face a funds cut-off for 1980-81.

Since the June report, Cedarville has reduced its default rate to 2.8 percent, according to David L. Gidley, director of financial aid. The college ranks among the lowest of all colleges in Ohio for defaults on the loans.

"I am very pleased to note that the default rate for students in your institution is not only substantially less than the national average of 17.36 percent but also falls below the 10 percent rate set as a target for all participating schools," HEW wrote the college.

President Paul Dixon commended the alumni for this excellent rate of loan repayment and commented that this is a strong testimony of the Christian's responsibility to fulfill his obligations.

ATHLETIC SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

This fall marks the second sports season for the Yellow Jacket Club, a group comprised of men and women interested in the promotion of the athletic scholarship program at Cedarville. Membership in the club is open to all who wish to support the program with a gift of \$25 or more. In addition to providing financial support, the members also serve as an unofficial scouting bureau, looking for possible athletic prospects in their area and then placing them in contact with the coaches at Cedarville.

According to Athletic Director Don Callan, the Club has been a help to the athletic program. "We have really appreciated their interest and support of our athletes. They reinforce our determination to use athletics as a tool of building Christian principles into the athlete's life, and they certainly broaden our recruiting potential."

The club is looking for new members, as they seek to expand their contribution to the scholarship fund. Dr. Callan said that membership in the club included free admission to all regularly scheduled athletic contests, as well as receiving the quarterly publication of the athletic department, *The Sting*. In addition, a sweatshirt will be given to those contributing \$25, and a jacket will be given for \$50 contributions.

Those interested in membership should write to the Athletic Office, Cedarville College, Cedarville, Ohio 45324. Contributions can be designated to a particular sport, or can be given to a general scholarship fund.

WATCH FOR IT!

For those of you who have assisted the alumni office by sending in the alumni questionnaire, your long-awaited expectation of receiving a directory of Cedarville College alumni will soon become a reality.

The directory will include three listings: 1) a biographical section in alphabetical order, containing the 5400 alumni with approximately 1800 maiden name cross references; 2) a geographical listing of alumni by state and cities within the state; and 3) a listing by class year.

Gary Kuhn, alumni coordinator, mentioned he receives as many as 10% to 15% address changes per year. He encourages alumni, when relocating, to send their new addresses to the alumni office. It will help to keep future directories up-to-date and save on postage for mail returned.

Mr. Kuhn also said the alumni office had \$3000 budgeted for this project and he felt this directory provided the most information for the limited resources. The cost is approximately one dollar per directory. If you are interested in helping to offset the cost of printing this directory, you may do so by mailing a gift to the alumni office. The directories are expected to be available for pickup during Homecoming weekend with the remainder to be mailed before November.

CEDARVILLE COLLEGE GETS COMPUTER

A new computer system is being installed this fall in Collins Hall. The system is a package of equipment and programs provided by Management Decisions Development Corporation, Fairfield, Ohio. The equipment includes a General Automation 16/460 Processor with 256K bytes of main memory, a Control Data Corporation 96 megabyte disk drive, two 300 line per minute Printronix printers, a Qume word processing terminal, and a number of Hazeltine 1510 video display terminals.

The system will provide computer processing for the business office, student records, admissions, financial aid, alumni, and development.

Cost of the system and remodeled facilities is estimated to be \$150,000.

William Riter, chairman of business department, has been coordinating the installation of the equipment.

Fall Bible Conference

Alfred B. Smith, founder of **Singspiration**, and evangelist **Bill Compton** participated in **Cedarville College's Fall Bible Conference** Sept. 24-28.

Some of **Smith's** early compositions have become "standards" in the realm of gospel music. Library Addition



To help alleviate the current classroom need, a 4000 square foot addition to the college library is being constructed. Completion date for the project is January 1, 1980.

The addition will contain four fully-carpeted and air-conditioned classrooms with facilities for audio-visual use. Projected cost for the project is \$175,000. The addition will eventually be converted to library use and will house an Instructional Media Center.

This center will consolidate all present media operations maintained in the library. Facilities will then be provided for a larger Media

Production Center, an additional tiered classroom, expanded listening and viewing of audio-visual materials, offices and workrooms for audio-visual personnel and needed storage and shelving space for audio-visual materials and equipment.

These operations are now located in various areas of the present building, which was not designed to handle the level of audio-visual operations currently being performed. Projected occupancy date of the addition for library operations has not yet been determined.

TURNER RETURNS TO PASTORATE

After 15 years of faithful service as Director of Development at Cedarville College, Lee Turner has decided to return to the pastorate.

Mr. Turner first came to the college with a background of both business and theological training. This combination of skills allowed him to help direct the growth of the college through important, formative years. He has seen his department grow from a one-man job to a staff of 12 people responsible for public relations, stewardship, student recruitment and long-range planning for the college.

During his term as Director of Development, the college has expanded its facilities to include a number of new dorms, the library, science center, and chapel. But with this growth has come increased administrative responsibilities which Mr. Turner says have taken him further and further away from contact with people in the supporting churches. That's something difficult for a man who says, "I'm a preacher at heart. I love the Word. I love people."

Although he has been offered several positions at other schools and Christian organizations since announcing his decision, he is waiting for the Lord to open up a church for him. He is currently candidating while continuing to direct the Development Department.

Besides his duties at the college, Mr. Turner presently serves as president of the Association of Institutional Development Officers, a professional organization for development officers from Christian colleges.

He is a graduate of Grace College and Grace Theological Seminary, Winona Lake, Ind., and served as Youth Director and Pastor of a church in Indiana before coming to Cedarville.





ATHLETES FOR CHRIST

A group of eight students and two alumni traveled to the Philippine Islands representing Cedarville College as Athletes for Christ.

Roy Carr (63), supervisor and coach, stated that he was overwhelmed by the Filipino people's hunger for the Word of God. Sophomore Drew Baker, the only varsity basketball player on this summer ministry team, summarized this opportunity by saying, "It is so valuable, so rich an experience, I'm still feeling the impact on my life.
