Ty Bryant and Stan Seevers are two Cedarville College grads excited about serving the Lord through their own business. They are partners in a young, dynamic company, New Life Media, geared to the promotion of Christian organizations through professional audio-visual and graphic arts services.

Stan explains, "Our first love was audio-visual, and we were thrilled about the potential of this business within the Christian framework. It allowed us the freedom to use all of our creative abilities to serve the Lord in this unique ministry."

Ty and Stan were close friends at Cedarville (class of '64) where they engineered the most successful senior sneak in the history of the college. On the first day of the fall quarter, they collected suitcases and three weeks later 51 out of 81 seniors sneaked away to Chattanooga, Tennessee, for three days.

After graduation they worked in different areas, but eventually the Lord called both of them back to the college to work in the Development Department. Ty was Director of Alumni and Public Relations in the late 60's through 1971. Stan worked from 1970-75 as a field representative in recruitment and planned giving and later as an Assistant Director of Development.

Today they continue to serve the college through the capacities of New Life Media. LEADING THE WAY, a customized slide dissolve show, is being used this year by the college for student recruitment. It has also been formatted on filmstrip and made available to churches. In addition, they designed a college viewbook and have been involved frequently in photography. Joining the New Life staff in 1978, Cedarville grad Barbara (Beikert 77) Keller does the major part of the graphics work for the audio-visuals and follow-up brochures. Barb is also involved in Cedarville's TORCH magazine which is graphically designed and produced through the creative efforts of the New Life Media staff.

Missionary Conference

It was a meeting of veterans—a Baptist mission agency president, a Bible translator, a nurse and recipient of the French Legion of Honor award, a skilled surgeon. Their pulsebeat: the command to be "witnesses . . . unto the uttermost." Drawing from years of field experience, Dr. Allan Lewis, Rev. Gordon Wimer, Dr. Margaret Laird, and Dr. Quentin Kenoyer addressed the student body at Cedarville's 21st annual Missionary Conference, January 6-11, 1980. All four serve under Baptist Mid-Missions.

Dr. Lewis, BMM President for 18 years, has bureaucratic responsibility for 1100 missionaries in 35 countries. Son of missionary parents, he graduated from Moody Bible Institute and Northern Baptist Seminary, and received his honorary doctorate degree from Grand Rapids Theological Seminary.

Rev. Gordon Wimer and his wife, Alice, are 25-year missionaries and foreign language students. For 20 years they studied the Sao Dialect in combination with evangelism, camp work, and church planting in the Chad Republic. The taxing pursuit of translating the Kaowulu Language in the Ivory Coast has occupied the past five years. Wimer, who graduated from Practical Bible Training School, and Cedarville College in 1955, has two children, also alumni of CC. A '75 graduate, Karen looks forward to returning with her husband, Douglas Weaver '76, to Chad as a missionary. Kenneth and Mary Griffeth Wimer (both '76 grads) are preparing to serve in mission work in the Ivory Coast.

Dr. Margaret Laird, nurse, missionary, and teacher of over 40 years, began her service in Africa in 1922 following graduation from Moody Bible Institute. The French government has honored her with their highest award, the Legion of Honor; the African government, with the Legion of Merit award.

Dr. Quentin Kenoyer has treated over one-half million patients, performed more than 10,000 major surgeries, and helped build a 150-bed Baptist Mid-Missions hospital—all this in Assam, India, where he served. The hospital in Assam employs 200 workers and 87 students in medical evangelism. Dr. Kenoyer has an M.D. degree from Indiana Medical School.

At the conference, Dr. Kenoyer presented the need for medicine and medical supplies in Chad, where civil war has destroyed provisions and made further purchasing very costly. The student body voted to adopt this need as their Student Missionary Project which is sponsored annually by Student Senate. In total, \$2,404.06 was raised (\$1.204.06 from offerings, \$1,200 from Food Service when the whole student body skipped one meal). The gift will be sent to Dr. and Mrs. David Seymour and Drs. Ron and Martha Snearly in Chad.

Faculty Adopt Policy Changes

The Cedarville College faculty voted to adopt a plus-minus grading system effective winter quarter 1980.

Under the plus-minus system, a numerical equivalent of a .3 plus or minus would be reflected on the four-point scale. Therefore, C+ would be 2.3, C would be 2.0 and C- would be 1.7.

The major advantage is the additional flexibility faculty members will experience in grading to more nearly indicate students' accomplishments. Academic Dean Clifford Johnson stated that the overall college grade-point average might decline slightly under the system but that there would be no significant change. The current college GPA is 2.8.

The faculty approved another academic policy change for 1979-80 concerning freshmen who earn a D or F in a class. If the student repeats the class before the end of the sophomore year, the college will recompute his grade point average, deleting the D or F. Dr. Johnson noted that this policy change was adopted because many freshmen experience difficulty in adjusting to the college academic life.

After his graduation from Cedarville, Jack became a grade school teacher in the Brunswick School District, Brunswick, Ohio. He spent the next few years as a classroom teacher, principal, and assistant superintendent before becoming, at age 35, the youngest school superintendent in the country. That same year, 1969, he was named the Man of the Year by the city of Brunswick. Jack spent 18 years with the Brunswick school system before retiring in 1976 because of ill health. The last school which he designed, the J. D. Willetts Middle School, was named in his honor.

For two years after his retirement he directed the activities of Camp Patmos, Regular Baptist Youth Camp in Ohio. During that time he became the friend of many more young people from throughout the state and earned the nickname of "Uncle Jack." Because of his sense of humor and his ability to challenge the mind, he was sought after as a speaker.

Jack, whose dedication to Cedarville continued through the years, did a great deal to promote the college and willingly gave of his time to serve with the Alumni Association. Because of his accomplishments Jack was given the Alumnus of the Year award in 1970.

Jack is survived by his wife Carol who presently lives at 1047 South 75th Place, Mesa, Arizona 85208. He also leaves his parents, Rev. and Mrs. Earl Willetts (Rev. Willetts has served on the board of trustees of Cedarville College for many years), and four children. Daughters Janet Roberts and Joyce Greetham are both graduates of Cedarville as are their husbands, Ed Roberts and Fred Greetham. Jeff, who is a sophomore at Cedarville, is the president of his class and is actively involved in many campus activities. J. D. is a freshman at Christian Heritage College, El Cajon, California.

In Jack's memory the alumni association has set up the Jack Willetts Memorial Scholarship. Donations to that scholarship may be sent to the alumni office.

"Family Trees"

One Shingle Oak (4 inches in diameter, weighing nearly a ton), 1 "Green Mountain" Sugar Maple, 15 "Bloodgood" London Planes, 1 "Red Sunset" Maple—does it sound like something out of a horticulturist's diary? These saplings, members of a new genus of "Family Tree," have begun sprouting in the Cedarville campus landscape.

The TORCH/AVISO, in the January 1979 issue, told its readers about a new program to provide much needed shade trees on campus. Alumni and friends of the college can donate a family tree or a memorial tree which the college will plant and label with the tree's name and the name(s) of the donor(s). In 1979, twenty such trees were planted on the grounds.

However, at least 2 dozen possible locations for trees remain on the main campus, not to mention areas around the tennis courts and lake, and along Route 72.

Mr. Paul Ware, campus grounds manager, reports that a number of large trees (6-8 inches in diameter) are now available from a local nursery. The cost for transplanting such a tree is about \$300. (Most of the expense is tied up in digging and hauling—\$250. The trees cost from \$35 to \$75 each.) Total costs of other varieties, depending on type and size, range from \$50 to \$100 (per tree), \$100 to \$300, and on up to \$500.

Local friends of the school, Mr. Ware suggests, could donate large trees growing on their property. Transplanting charges are \$200-\$250 per tree. Also, small trees native to certain areas but unavailable in the nursery trade would be gladly received.

Trees are useful, aesthetic gifts in a fairly reasonable price range. After all, everyone can't give buildings. So, if any of the above extractions is relevant to you, you may want to donate your own family tree. And we don't mean pedigree.

Portrait of Obedience

Regular Baptist Press recently released the book *Portrait* of Obedience, a biography of the late Dr. Robert T. Ketcham, by J. Murray Murdoch, Ph.D. Dr. Murdoch spent many hours conversing with Dr. Ketcham and researching materials about his life.



Sports Update

Jackets Finish 21-9

The Cedarville College Yellow Jackets ended their most successful season since the 1964-65 Dozier Carter-led-squad, posting an impressive 21-9 mark for 1979-80.

The Jackets made the NAIA District 22 finals for the first time since 1969 by defeating Malone College 92-91 in overtime but were stopped in the final game by a tough Defiance College team.

The Jackets finished as the best team of record in the district, including an 11-3 record in Mid-Ohio Conference, good for second place behind conference champ Malone College.

Reflecting on the season, Cedarville's head coach Don Callan said, "We won a lot of games that should not have been ours. We were the smaller team almost every time we played, but we played our hearts out. The guys on this team are not only good ballplayers but also are quality young men. They show themselves to be mature in their attitudes and they demonstrate spiritual depth that reflects their love for Jesus Christ."

The Defiance game saw Cedarville's largest and most vocal crowd of the season turn out to cheer the Jackets. Defiance was ready for action and came out shooting a whopping 67% from the floor in the first half. The 85-70 win sends Defiance to the NAIA Nationals in Kansas City. The crowd gave the home team a long, standing ovation to show their appreciation for a super season.

The contest marked the final appearance of seniors Kim Kauffman and Rick Hickman. Kim averaged 19.5 p.p.g. and 8.9 rebounds per contest. Rick has been the Jackets mainstay at the point guard position and is the team's top assist man, averaging 7 per contest while scoring 9.4 p.p.g. The loss of Kauffman and Hickman will be noticed, but with the return of top scoring guard Eric Mounts, top rebounder Drew Baker, and top field-goal shooter (56%), Mark Womack, and the remainder of this year's squad, Yellow Jacket fans can look forward to next year with anticipation.

Junior Eric Mounts averaged 22.7 p.p.g. and has been named the 1980 recipient of the J. Albert Turner Award as the most valuable basketball player in the MOC. This marks the second consecutive year that Mounts has received this honor. Eric was also selected for the All District 22 squad and chosen to try out for the Olympic team. Eric surpassed Steve Young as the fifth leading scorer in Yellow Jacket history and is on his way to passing Al Knott, Cedarville's all-time leading scorer with 2,056 points. Eric has 1,833 at the end of his third season at Cedarville.

Coach Callan was honored by his peers who named him NAIA District 22 Coach of the Year. In his twentieth season, he guided the Jackets to a 21-9 record.

Having lost top wrestlers Dale West and Jeff Conklin to graduation, Battaglia reconstructed his entire line-up. This definitely has been a rebuilding year for the team. Members were willing to learn, which may not be as good as experience, but it surely helped the coach.

According to Battaglia, the team was strong enough to be competitive with a number of their 1979-80 opponents.

Coach Battaglia did not predict great victories but remained optimistic throughout the season. The competition included such teams as University of Dayton, Central State University, Case Western, Findlay, and Sinclair Community College.

View of a New Fieldhouse

Sixteen years ago, Dr. Don Callan, Chairman of the Physical Education Department, wrote an article about the proposed new gymnasium, explaining the disadvantages of old Alford and the advantages of the proposed new building. That building became a reality and has been extremely functional over the years. However, as the enrollment has almost tripled to our current 1351 students, the present cafeteria/gymnasium/student center complex, which also includes classrooms, is very inadequate.

After a thorough study of the long-range campus needs involving all departments, it was felt that the critical need for classroom and cafeteria space would be met best by building a new fieldhouse and converting the present gymnasium into an enlarged cafeteria, a student center, and additional classrooms.

The trustees approved construction of the fieldhouse. This new building has been designed with the whole Cedarville College family in mind. It will have a maximum of open space to make it versatile and will include 3 basketball courts, volleyball, V_{10} mile running track, pole vault area, long jump pit, tennis courts, and badminton courts. The areas are interchangeable. Jogging can take place during most of these activities which will be scheduled and coordinated for maximum use. In addition to the open fieldhouse, an attached facility will house the offices, locker rooms, training room, storage and equipment rooms, a laundry room, weight room, wrestling and tumbling room, handball-racquetball courts, and classrooms.

By now, you can imagine our excitement and that of the student body as we anticipate the possibility of occupancy within the next year.

We anticipate God's provision for this building as we rejoice in seeing His blessing through our student growth.
