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
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

THE VALUE OF ATHLETICS

College athletes, by modern-day standards, are supposed to be big, lazy, mentally and spiritually deficient individuals. I would like to give you a thumbnail sketch of the four graduating seniors from this year's Cedarville College Basketball team, and give you the opportunity to decide on the value of the individuals, and the effect of athletics upon them. The seniors are Sam Canine, Dave Jeremiah, Ted Ocheltree, and Norris Smith. Where did they come from, what have they done, and where are they going?

SAM CANINE

Samisa 5' 11" guard, who comes from Blanchester, Ohio. In Sam's four years at Cedarville, he played three years on the varsity team, missing one year due to illness. Sam is a member of the college Kingsmen Quartet, and also of the College Choir. Hehas been active in both speaking and singing engagements, and was president of Modern Music Masters. His cumulative average here at Cedarville is 2.97. Sam's major is Bible, and he is planning to attend Dallas Theological Seminarythis fall.

DAVE JEREMIAH

From Cedarville, Ohio, this 6' 2" young man has been a real asset to Cedarville College. He has been a member of the College Choir, is a member of the Kingsmen Quartet, and also does supply preaching. One of his real interests is our college radio station, WCDR-FM, of which he is manager. He has started on the first five since a freshman at Cedarville. In his four years, he has accumulated the average of 15 points per game. He was cocaptain of the basketball team during his senior year, and is chaplain of Varsity "C" Club. His average for four years at Cedarville is 3.16. Dave's major is Bible and he plans to attend Dallas Theological Seminary this fall.

TED OCHELTREE

5' 7" Ted Ocheltree of St. Albans, West Virginia, has really been an active individual here on the Cedarville College campus. He has been co-chairman of the student body project for two years, and a dorm counselor for two years. He has served on the Student Council, and is presently vice-president of the same. Ted was captain of the baseball team during his junior year, and he has been a member of the varsity basketball team for four years. He is presently vicepresident of Varsity "C" Club. His academic average for four years is 2.64. Ted is a business major and is planning to attend Indiana University or Miami University for graduate work.

NORRIS SMITH

The majority of Norris's accomplishments lie in the physical education field, although he was also a member of the chapel and church choir. He has also been a dorm counselor for the past two years. In basketball, during his sophomore and senior years, he was voted the Most Valuable Player by his teammates. In the sport of baseball, he was voted the Most Valuable Player in his freshman year and then again in his junior year. He has accumulated three letters in this sport. Norris has started on the first five of the varsity basketball team since his freshman year, and he has served as co-captain for the team during his senior year. He is a member of Varsity "C", and he is presently serving as treasurer of the club. His major is physical education and he has accumulated a 3.13 average for his four years in attendance at Cedarville. He plans to attend graduate school in the fall, studying for the coaching profession.

As a coach in a Christian school, I look at these four boys and thank God for the privilege of having a part in their development into active, well-rounded men for Christ.

ANTI-COMMUNISM SEMINAR

An all-day Freedom Seminar under the direction of Mr. W. P. Strube, Jr., of Houston, Texas, was held on the Cedarville College campus on March 9. Mr. Strube is president of the Mid-American Life Insurance Company and vice president of the Christian Anti-Communism Crusade. He is author of "The Star Over the Kremlin" and many other pamphlets on the subject of communism and American freedoms.

The program, sponsored by the Student Council and the campus Anti-Communism Club, was for the purpose of informing students of the current threat of international communism and challenging them to take an active part

in combating it. Mr. Strube discussed the philosophical basis of communism and their program for world conquest. Other lectures covered the subjects of semantics of communism and the Christian's place inpolitical action if he desires to maintain the American freedoms. Several films were also shown throughout the day which was climaxed with a question and answer session.

In addition to student and faculty members, the Seminar was also attended by area pastors, representatives of Christian radio stations, and other individuals from surrounding communities who were interested in information about communism and methods by which it may be combated.

BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS

The annual church basketball tournaments, sponsored by the College Varsity "C" club, were held in the new student center-gymnasium. High school boys and those who have graduated within the last two years competed in the double-elimination Junior Division Tournament on March 15 and 16. The Senior Division, which is a single-elimination tourney open to men of all ages, was played March 22 and 23.
