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




SIXTY-SEVENTH COMMENCEMENT

Sixty-two seniors will graduate from Cedarville College this month. This is the largest class in the history of the College.

The baccalaureate service will be held in Alford Auditorium, Thursday, May 23, at 7:30 P.M. Rev. J. Irving Reese, founder and director of the Fellowship of Baptists for Home Missions, will speak on the subject: "Gripped By A Hand Divine."

Commencement will be held in Alford Auditorium, Saturday, May 25, at 10:00 A. M. Rev. Hall Dautel, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Harvey, Illinois, will deliver the commencement address on the theme: "The Mightiest of the Mighty."

CEDARVILLE GRANTED MEMBERSHIP

The Ohio College Association meeting in the Ohio Union on the campus of the Ohio State University on March 30 voted to accept Cedarville College as an associate member. This action was taken upon recommendation of the Executive Committee which had met in Columbus on the day before.

Associate membership has all the rights and privileges of full membership except no one from the school will be qualified to hold office in the Association until full membership has been granted.

An inspection team headed by Dr. Kenneth McFall of Bowling Green State University, Bowling Green, visited Cedarville College on March 25. Other members of the group which met with College administrative personnel were Dr. Lloyd L. Ramseyer, president of Bluffton College, Bluffton; Mr. Russell G. Frantz, Heidelberg College, Tiffin; Mr. D. J. Guzzetta, University of Akron, Akron; and Sister M. Angelita, president of St. Mary of the Springs, Columbus.

After meeting briefly with the administrative committee, each of the five visitors inspected one area of the school's operation. Dr. Ramsever met with Dr. James T. Jeremiahto discuss the general administration of the College. Mr. Guzzetta and Dr. C. R. Maddox discussed the academic and testing programs of the College, Mr. Frantz consulted with Mr. George Boyd and Mr. Lloyd Miller concerning the financial status of the school. Dr. McFall discussed the areas of records, admissions, student personnel services, and science facilities with Dr. Clifford Johnson and Mr. Richard McIntosh. Sister Angelita inspected the library with the guidance of Mrs. Alberta Chaffe.

After lunch in the cafeteria, the inspection team met with Dr. Jeremiah to give him a report of thier impressions and to inform him of the recommendation that they would make to the Executive Committee of the Association. The visitors were impressed with the progress that the College had made in the last ten years, with the consecration of the trustees, administration, and faculty, and with the standards of conduct observed by our students.

DORMITORIES NAMED

The Board of Trustees, at a recent meeting, named two of our new buildings.

The men's dormitory, built in 1959, was named Patterson Hall in honor of Mr. William B. Patterson, a trustee. Mr. Patterson has greatly aided the college with his sacrificial gifts and service. Many of his vacations have been spent on the campus doing electrical work in the college buildings.

Williams Hall is the new name for the women's dormitory erected in 1961. This new building has been named in honor of Dr. Arthur F. Williams, the head of the college Bible department. Dr. Williams has been a part of the college since the Baptists began operating the school in 1953. His faithfulness to the Werd of God in his life and teaching is deeply appreciated by trustees, faculty and students.

ELINOR MARSHALL MEMORIAL

The Student Council voted recently to contribute \$100 toward a fund to purchase new equipment for the College business office in memory of Mrs. Elinor Marshall who went to be with the Lord December 17, 1962.

Some improvements are planned in the business office this summer, and it is hoped that sufficient money will be available to purchase fire-proof filing cabinets or a steel desk and chair in memory of Mrs. Marshall, who worked for five years in the College business office.

Members of the College family and friends or relatives who may wish to

contribute to this fund may send their contributions to the College business office designated to the Elinor Marshall Memorial Fund. It is hoped that sufficient money will be available at graduation time so purchase of the equipment can be made by the close of the school year.

DAVID MATSON WRITES:

After having been an alumnus of Cedarville College for approximately two and one-half years, the Lord has graciously made it possible for me to continue my studies on the graduate level at the State College of Iowa. I have been questioned as to my feelings regarding the need for a student to apply himself or herself on the undergraduate level in order to be accepted for graduate study.



For various reasons, explained or unexplained, accreditation seems to have become the educational balance in our modern day society. We are prone to weigh everything that is in the field of education upon this one factor. We have become obcessed with this term. In education as in many other matters, we will gain from it exactly what we place into it. Education is not something that rubs off of the ivy-twined walls of an accredited institution.

As I entered Cedarville in the Fall of 1957, the matter least on my mind was accreditation. Education and the value of it cannot be so simply determined. One needs only to have the opportunity to either visit and examine, or attend other universities to realize the truth of this. There are other dependent and independent variables which surround this topic: God's will for the Christian; individual desire, environment, internal and external forces, initiative; these and other factors all wield their influence in this matter of a good education.

May I urge each of you that is presently attending Cedarville and all who will in succeeding years, to apply yourselves and make the moments and hours of your study count. Entrance to Graduate Schools depends not on the fact of whether or not one attended an accredited institution, but rather on your undergraduate achievement and individual performance on graduate entrance examinations.

Naturally, I sincerely trust that the day will soon come when Cedarville will be accredited. But until that day comes, let us not look with contempt, disdain, or pity upon students who are willing to sacrifice in the early stages of the school to make these things a reality. Rather, let us work diligently, apply ourselves continually on the undergraduate level and trust completely in the Lord for His guidance pertaining to specialized training on the graduate level.

LIBRARY REPORT

During this school year our library has received some gifts which have been an encouragement to us. Among them were two multi-volume sets, <u>The Encyclopedia Americana</u> and <u>Lands and</u> <u>Peoples</u>, gifts from Miss Mary Bailey of Indianapolis, Indiana.

Cash gifts of \$150 given in memory of Mr. Henry B. Lightly and \$1000 presented by an anonymous donor have enabled us to purchase books directly related to our curriculum.

Dr. N. L. Siplock, Chesterland, Ohio, has given us very welcome assistance in locating out-of-print volumes which are hard to find. He has also

given cash gifts totaling \$290 designated for the purchase of books for the library.

Another friend of the library, Mr. George Ort, President of Art Guild Bindery of Cincinnati, has made contributions in the form of services and materials which have been very much appreciated.

These gifts have made possible the addition of worthwhile volumes which help to make our collection what it should be and, yes, what it must be in order to fulfill its function.

On occasion we are asked what individuals and groups within our churches may do to aid the college. Often special projects are requested. May we suggest that your youth group, Sunday School class, missionary society, or church write to the college librarian for library projects which will greatly aid this important phase of our college program.

FREE BOOK

Our friends do not receive many letters from the college or appeals for funds. Through the college Bulletin we do seek to keep you acquainted with the needs which we face as the college continues to grow.

Recently, a special appeal was sent out for special contributions to be given to the expansion fund in order to complete the student center-gymnasium and make changes in present buildings. To care for the larger student body which we expect on our campus next fall, we need a minimum of \$40,000. This money must come from sources other than student tuition and budgeted church gifts to the support of the college.

In order to encourage gifts to this fund, we have arranged to give a copy of Baker's Bible Atlas to everyone who gives \$25 or more to the expansion fund of the college before June 1. This 336 page book has colored and numerous black and white maps covering every phase of Bible History.
