ALUMNI HURDLE ANNUAL FUND BARRIER

The Alumni Association's Annual Fund has shown remarkable increases in various years during the decade of the '70's (see chart). However, since the 1974-75 campaign when gifts were first received for the construction of the chapel, the Alumni Association reached a plateau in annual giving and remained there for five years.

The fiscal year, July 1, 1979-June 30, 1980, was the year this five-year barrier was hurdled. In fact, a \$17,129, or 26%, increase was achieved. Congratulations and thanks to each involved alumnus! And that's not all the good news. The 1979-80 Annual Fund total is \$82,456. That's right! We raised \$2,456 over our goal! This sets a record for Annual Fund giving!

Why the increase? Perhaps alumni are more interested in the growth and direction of their alma mater. Certainly each year more alumni enter the financial bracket in which they are able to contribute more willingly and in larger amounts. Fifty-three percent of Cedarville's Alumni have graduated in the last ten years; an encouraging indication that annual fund giving should continue to show promising increases.

If the percentage of Alumni contributing to the annual fund continues to rise—as it has in the past two years from 12% to 18%—this year's goal of \$100,000, established by the Alumni Council, should provide a challenge, and yet remain realistically within reach.

A TRIBUTE TO M. EARLE COLLINS

Dr. M. Earle Collins, 76, a 1923 graduate of Cedarville College, died on June 4, 1980, in Columbia, Missouri, following a brief illness.

Born June 22, 1903, in Cedarville, Ohio, Dr. Collins pursued the lifetime task of personal investment in the lives of others. His career as educational administrator provided an ideal field for active concern, involvement, and leadership.

Coming from a family of Cedarville College graduates (eight, to be exact), Earle Collins continued his education at The Ohio State University where he received his Ph.D. in College Administration. For two years he served as Superintendent of Greene County Schools, before traveling to Egypt in 1925 as a short-term missionary on the faculty of Assuit College. In Egypt he



met his wife, Mary Dixon, and in 1931 they settled in Tarkio, Missouri, where he became Dean of Men, and then President of Tarkio College. From 1951 until his retirement in 1968, he was President of Missouri Valley College in Marshall, Missouri. He then moved to New Wilmington, Pennsylvania.

Throughout his life, Earle Collins held leadership posts in numerous councils and conventions of the United Presbyterian Church, as well as many educational and civic-oriented positions. An international traveler, he exhibited active personal concern for world missions.

This fall, two members of the class of 1964 and one of 1975 joined the faculty of Cedarville College. Dr. Clifford Johnson, Academic Dean, stated he is exceptionally pleased to have these high quality instructors join the Cedarville family.

Rev. David Warren, Associate Professor, is teaching Greek and other subjects in the Bible Department. Dave, his wife, Patricia (Schonscheck '63), and their four children came to Cedarville from Iowa where Dave was an Associate Professor at Faith Baptist Bible College for four years. Dave received his Th.M. in 1968 from The Dallas Theological Seminary where he specialized in Hebrew. He also served as pastor of the Champion Baptist Church in Warren, Ohio, and a board member of Skyview Ranch. A recipient of the President's Award, Dave evidenced outstanding leadership ability as a student at Cedarville.

Also a 1964 graduate, Sue (Geyser) Cummins received her M.A. in Business Education in 1969 and her Ph.D. in Vocational Technical Education in 1974 from The Ohio State University. She taught in various high schools for six years, including Beavercreek High School near Dayton, and for four years on the college level at Ohio University. Sue and husband Jim are active members of the Berean Baptist Church of Pickerington, Ohio. Sue is an Assistant Professor in charge of the Secretarial Science program.

Sarah (Harriman) Smith, a 1975 alumna, also joined the Business Department as an Assistant Professor. Sarah received her M.A. in 1976 and has completed all but her dissertation for a Ph.D. in Business Administration from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. Sarah and husband Barry, M.A., C.P.A., live in Cedarville.

Janet (McClelen 17) Collins died August 2, 1980. She was in failing health for a number of years and was cared for by her husband until entering a convalescent home in Xenia, Ohio. Janet was a sister-in-law of the late M. Earle Collins. Her husband, John (17), who farmed in the Cedarville area most of his life, presently resides in a convalescent home in Chillicothe. Ohio.

Don't Put God in a Box

If someone asked alumnus Cal Searles, "What is the greatest lesson you have learned in your Christian life?" he probably would answer with this simple phrase, "Don't put God in a box!" Although Cal was a business major at Cedarville College, he presently serves as pastor of the Camden Baptist Church.

In January 1975, Cal transferred to Cedarville College from Bowling Green State University. His plans were to study Business Administration and enter his father's insurance business.

While at Cedarville, Cal participated in many Christian Service activities, including the Greene County Jail ministry. Also, he was involved in personal witnessing while with the baseball team during spring training in Florida. It was at this time that Cal became burdened to intensify his study of the Bible and to grow spiritually. Returning to school and the daily chapel services, he was continually challenged by the messages to examine his career choice and to consider the ministry as a vocation.

Upon graduation, Cal went to the Philippines with the Missionary Internship Service basketball team. The team played basketball with the Filipinos to have an opportunity to witness to them. When Cal saw the millions of unsaved people, he became heavily burdened for their salvation. This burden remained heavy on his heart even after he returned to join his father in the insurance business. At this point in his life, he was faced with a serious conflict. He did not want to spend the rest of his life in the insurance business; yet, his parents had paid for his education and looked forward to his sharing his father's business. Besides, he had a degree in Business Administration, not Bible.

At the time this inner conflict was raging, Cal's pastor resigned and asked him to serve as interim pastor of the church. Cal agreed; and with the consent of the Deacons, he




began five months of service as interim pastor. During this time, several men were considered by the church to fill the vacancy, but none felt the Lord leading him to the church. Finally, in February of 1978, the Deacons asked Cal to consider being their pastor. In response to his willingness, the church overwhelmingly called him.

In the days since then, Cal has seen real growth in the church. Although he had his doubts in the beginning, Dr. Jeremiah encouraged him to put them out of his mind and get to work. Today the church is in the process of building a new sanctuary that will seat 400 people, and real spiritual growth is evident in the lives of the members.

"You can't put God in a box. When He wants to work, He will use whom He needs." This is the conclusion of a man who went to college planning to be an insurance businessman, but whose life the Lord redirected to meet the needs of the congregation of the Camden Baptist Church at Wakeman, Ohio.

Athletic / Academic Center



As you can see from the picture, construction on the Athletic/Academic Center is progressing.

Alumni, you may be wondering why there hasn't been more publicity or public fund raising for the \$2.3 million project. Cedarville College's Director of Development, Chuck Ross, states that the Development Office has been doing much work behind the scene. In fact, nearly one-quarter of a million dollars has been received in cash and pledges from trustees, and over \$70,000 has been committed by faculty and staff personnel. Also in progress is a campaign to solicit selected individual donors. Later, when foundations and businesses are approached for matching or challenge grants, alumni, parents, and friends will be called on to help wrap up the final amount to complete the project.

The Athletic / Academic Center will fulfill five urgent needs resulting from our increased enrollment—cafeteria space, academic classroom space, a student center, faculty and departmental office space, and larger and more adequate athletic facilities.

Faithful alumni contributed over \$106,000 toward the \$750,000 James T. Jeremiah Chapel—approximately 14% of the total investment. Might this be a challenge to you as you consider your part in the Athletic/Academic Center. If you would like to send a gift for this project, be sure to specifically designate it.



Based on the 36% increase in student applications over last year, the 1980-81 enrollment is projected to be 1475 students.

The 13th annual Cedarville College Pastors' Conference was held September 8-11. Dr. Ed Hindson, and Dr. Martin Clark, Director of Counseling at Cedarville College, were the featured speakers. Both men are noted experts in the field of counseling. "The Family in Focus" was the theme.

One phone per eight students is the capability of the completely computerized private phone system being installed on campus in October. The college-owned system features touch tone phones, call forwarding, and conference call capabilities.

In July, over 100 Baptist Mid-Missions candidates and senior missionaries attended the 25th consecutive Candidate School held at Cedarville College.

To keep up with increasing enrollment, the campus post office has installed 198 new student mail boxes near the entrance to the radio station.

At Commencement the Class of 1980 presented to the College ten park benches to be placed in various locations north of the James T. Jeremiah Chapel.

The 8th Annual Cedarville Baptist Open Golf Tournament was held September 11 and 12. Approximately 290 golfers competed for top honors in ten flights of competition.

Dr. Clifford Johnson, Academic Dean, announced that full-time faculty retention for the 1980-81 school year is perfect. There are 62 full-time and 22 part-time faculty employed.

Guest speaker at the President's Banquet for the 1980 graduating class was Dr. Tim LaHaye, pastor and author, of San Diego, California. His daughter, Lori, a Speech Communications major, is a member of the class.

The campus copy center will take on a new look this fall when the offset printer will be replaced by an A.B. Dick 1600 copier system.

The second annual "Salute to Summer" took place at Cedarville College July 10-12. This weekend, designed specifically for student recruitment, attracted over 600 potential students.

The Yellow Jacket Club has approximately \$7,100 in scholarship monies to be distributed by the coaches of the 13 intercollegiate sports for this academic year. Club memberships for the 1980-81 season are welcomed.

Christine Wyrtzen returns to Cedarville on Friday, October 3, for a sacred vocal concert.

The "Cedar What?" Banquet, hosted by the men of Alpha Chi, is scheduled for November 15. This banquet is the finale of several weeks of campaigning by faculty, and a mock election held for students during presidential election years.

Intramural Coordinator, Mark McDougal, announces a new competitive activity for this fall: powderpuff flag football.

Special speaker for the Fall Bible Conference was G. Michael Cocoris, Senior Pastor of the Church of the Open Door, Los Angeles, California. Pastor Cocoris is a graduate of Dallas Theological Seminary, and served as an effective evangelist before entering the pastorate.

Arrangements have been made with the Athletic Department to send all alumni "The Sting," a quarterly publication of athletic news and updates.

Alumni Byron (68) and Libby (Ross 70N) Shearer were the leaders of a youth group missionary excursion to Jamaica. The team from Grace Baptist Church, Cedarville, survived the high winds and rain of Hurricane Allen unharmed.

The Athletes for Christ basketball team reports God's blessing on their summer trip to the Philippines. Over 50 Filipinos accepted Christ as Savior during their five-week ministry there. The Athletes won all of their 32 games.

The southeast corner of the gymnasium has been set off for use by Food Service to make room for student seating at mealtime. A doorway has been made into the gym. This is a temporary arrangement until the new Athletic/Academic Center is completed.

If you cannot return for Homecoming, mark Saturday, February 7, 1981, on your calendar as "Alumni Night" on campus. At 2 p.m. there will be an alumni reception, followed by the traditionally exciting Alumni vs. J.V. basketball game.
