APPROVED!

June 10, 1963 will go down in the history of Cedarville College as the day the Ohio State Board of Education granted the college reapproval as a teacher training institution.

Cedarville lost its teacher training prerogatives just prior to its becoming a Baptist College in 1953. It has taken ten years to once again merit approval. God has truly been gracious as buildings have been built and remodeled, faculty members have been provided, and many have sacrificially given financially.

Meeting endowment requirements has been the one big hurdle. The State Board has now allowed regularly budgeted church support in lieu of endowment. The trustees plan to continue to seek additional funds both for permanent endowment and general operations.

The new program will begin with this year's entering Freshman class. Students currently enrolled at Cedarville and who are in the joint program with neighboring Central State College will continue at Central State. It is unfortunate that approval was not granted for those currently in attendance, but we are grateful that the State Board did allow the college to

begin its own program of teacher preparation.

Students continuing the joint program will be allowed the \$15 per hour tuition rate here at Cedarville. Planning is also underway to provide transportation at least four times each day to and from the Central State campus at a very modest cost.

The joint program with Central State has been satisfactory, and college officials at Cedarville are grateful for Central State's Assistance. Their cooperation has enabled our Cedarville graduates to receive preparation for teaching in a recognized, accredited institution.

The joint program will continue to be arranged so that candidates for the elementary certificate will be able to complete the program in 136 semester hours, just eight more than the regular requirement for graduation. In the process the student receives two degrees and the appropriate teaching certificate. Students in secondary education will be able to complete a similar program, but the excess number of hours required varies due to the requirements in the different teaching fields.

Cedarville also held debates here on the campus with Wittenberg University. The debaters representing the College include Dave Fisher, Paul Gathany, Bonnie Hammack, Al Merwald, Nancy Shimits, and Jim Sprague. Mrs. C. R. Maddox is the Debate Coach.

On May 22, 1963, Cedarville College achieved another in its many firsts when Sophomore Ron McDugle challenged Ohio State's star debater, Senior Ed McGlone on WOSU-TV.

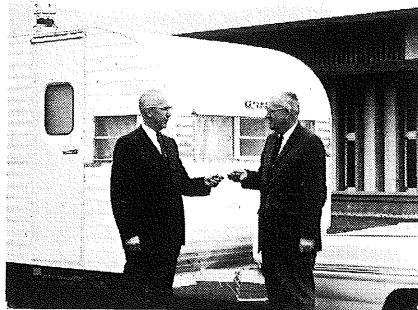
Mr. McDugle ably presented the negative position on the topic, "Resolved - That a Federal Department of Urban Affairs Shall Be Established." Ron is majoring in Bible, and is vice-president-elect of the student body. His opponent, Ed McGlone, was an honors student at O. S. U. and has extensive debate experience as a member of the varsity team. O. S. U. was eliminated in the quarter-finals of the National Debate Tourney at West Point this year. McGlone graduated this June with a B. A. and M. A. after only four years of college, and will be debate coach at Ohio University, Athens.

The judge noted, "It was a good debate, difficult to judge, but the decision must go to McGlone."

Cedarville's Professor, John Reed, observed, "Ron McDugle, actually a novice debater, in debating one of the nation's best, displayed a thorough knowledge of his subject and an extra-ordinary amount of courage."

SPORTS REPORT

Cedarville College completed the most successful spring sports schedule in ten years. The baseball team led the way with a Mid-Ohio Conference championship. The track and tennis teams placed third, and the golf team finished last.

The baseball team furnished many thrills in compiling a 16-2 record which gave them the top place among the small colleges in Ohio. Highlights of the season were wins over Taylor (2 games), Ashland (2 games), University of Dayton, and Central State College of Ohio.

Both hitting and pitching were the order of the day whenever the Yellow Jackets took the field. Five men ended the season with a batting average over .300. Al Merwald led the way with a .368 mark. Dennis McDonald was the champion for runs batted in with 27.

The new teacher education program beginning with the incoming Freshman class makes it possible for students to enjoy the many advantages of a fundamental, separatist Christian College and yet complete teaching preparation requirements within the normal 128 semester hours required for graduation. Cedarville College is approved by the General Association of Regular Baptist Churches and is an associate member in the Ohio College Association. Nineteen semester hours of Bible are required of all graduates.

ENROLLMENT

Enrollment at Cedarville College continues at a record pace. As of June 12, 453 students were planning to begin or resume their studies this fall.

Of the 453 coming this fall, 315 were students who attended this spring, 107 were incoming freshman, 22 were transfer students, and 9 were former students.

If enrollment rates continue as in previous years, 500 students will be attending the College this fall. Students still considering admission should expedite their application. The trustees have limited enrollment to 500 students.

MATTERS OF DEBATE

The Cedarville College Debate Teams have concluded the second Debate Season successfully. The teams participated in a Novice Tournament held at Purdue University, where the team defeated a team from Ball State Teachers College and Earlham College.

From the University of Cincinnati Tournament our teams returned with a

plaque for second place, having won over Wittenberg University, Capital University and Earlham College; being defeated only by the team representing the University of Kentucky.

At the Men's State Debate Tournament held at Capital University, the men's team won the decision over the University of Dayton and Capital University.

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Norris Smith, this year's most valuable player, demonstrated what a versatile athlete he was by pitching himself to a 9-1 record and on the off days he played center field and batted .351. Charles Wilkins, a freshman fast ball pitcher from Dayton, Ohio, carried the rest of the pitching load with a 7-1 record. Coach Lane Moody, who graduated from Cedarville, was very pleased with this year's results. Next season should be very good, too, since he loses only two men from this year's squad.

Outstanding performers in the other sports were in track: Bud Davis, high jumper who tied for first place in this event at the All-Ohio meet with a jump of 6'3"; Jim Sprague who took three firsts at the Mid-Ohio Meet, the mile, 2 mile (record 9:58), and the 1/2 mile in a record 1:59.5. Jim was honored to be the Mid-Ohio's outstand-

ing track man and also high point man. Another good showing was made by freshman pole vaulter, Larry Richardson, who cleared 12'6" this year for a second in the Conference meet.

The tennis team, led by Don Entner, had a good season with a 3-3 record and a finish of a third in the Conference meet.
