Faculty work on Degrees

Fourteen Cedarville College faculty members are presently working on their doctoral degrees. These fourteen represent all the 21 departments except Speech and Music.

According to Dr. Clifford Johnson, Academic Dean, the percentage of faculty members holding doctor's degrees is an important academic factor. The doctorate provides professors with an increased knowledge of their area of study, along with a greater understanding of challenges which students will face when they attend graduate institutions. Nearly fifty percent of the faculty hold doctor's degrees, and Dr. Johnson believes sixty to seventy percent is an obtainable objec-

It is true to note that graduate study by faculty

members carrying regular teaching loads can take dedication and personal discipline. Some faculty and social activities are curtailed. A big factor is the travel time involved. Some travel to Columbus or Dayton several times a week. The college does make some attempts to adjust the faculty member's responsibilities, but the rigor of the situation remains.

Faculty working on doctorates include Sue Baker, Charles Dolph ('74), James Grier, Joseph Halsy, Lawrence Killian ('64), Mark Larson, John McGillivray ('70), Richard McIntosh, Beverly Monroe, Terry Phipps ('70), Sarah (Harriman '75) Smith, Edward Spencer, and Ronald Walker. Richard Durham's dissertation has been accepted; he now awaits the conferral of his doctorate.

Alumnus Successful in Research

A former Cedarville student, Dr. Charles Hartzell (63N), is presently in the forefront of the exciting and challenging field of medical research.

Dr. Hartzell has served as the Director of Research at the prestigious Alfred I. Dupont Institute of Wilmington, Delaware, since 1978, and presently also fills the role of Acting Director of Research.

After receiving his Ph.D. in biochemistry from Indiana University in 1967, Dr. Hartzell spent a year in Australia doing research on wool proteins., The next three years were spent at the University of Wisconsin where his emphasis was on research in cellular energy requirements.

The work which was done at the University of Wisconsin led to an American Heart Association Established Investigator Award, a five-year grant for independent heart research. The final four years of that research were spent at Penn State University.

The Dupont Institute includes a clinic and orthopedic pediatric hospital. The research being done there on the musculo-skeletal system relates to, among other diseases, muscular dystrophy, ataxia, scoliosis and arthritis.

Dr. Hartzell's work includes a joint appointment with the University of Delaware where he teaches and supervises graduate students. He has published over 60 scientific articles.

Dr. Hartzell's wife, Marguerite "Peg" (Getty 63N) Hartzell received a master's degree in speech pathology from Penn State and is a speech therapist at Sterch School for the Hearing Impaired, Newark, Delaware. The Hartzells, who have two children, Scott, age 13, and Amy, age 11, live at 102 Maplewood Lane, Wilmington, Delaware 19801.

Mounts, a preseason All-American pick in Street and Smith's official basketball yearbook, claimed M.V.P. honors this season in the Cedarville Invitational Tourney and the Wilfred Laurier Tourney in Ontario, Canada. He was recently selected national NAIA player of the week.

The satisfaction related with these honors is almost unmeasured. Yet, Mounts has maintained a distinctive testimony for Christ—something which is often lost in the wake of tremendous success. His biggest tribute may have come when former high school coach Bill Hill pointed to Mounts during a pregame drill at Wilmington and instructed his young boy, "Son, that's the kind of ball player you should pattern yourself after."

The Hollaways



"For I am confident of this very thing, that He who began a good work in you will perfect it until the day of Christ Jesus." This promise comes to mind as Joe and Sharon Hollaway, Baptist Mid-Missions appointees to New Zealand, tell the story of their personal progress toward the foreign mission field. Both are 1968 graduates of Cedarville College.

"Frankly, I felt guilty. It seemed too nice, too perfect," Joe admits freely, referring to their decision to go to New Zealand. Interest in that field was first sparked over a Sunday dinner with new friends, a couple who were preparing for New Zealand. "Come along with us," was the invitation, half in jest. The friendship grew and with it the desire to minister in that country. Baptist

Mid-Missions' hearty approval of the direction they were taking finally confirmed their decision.

Joe and Sharon view these recent moves as the fruit of a gradual development in their lives over many years. Unconditional commitment to Christ has always been their duty, but as for His part, "the way He did it was quite natural."

Joe, saved two weeks into his freshman year at Cedarville, later responded at a college missionary conference: "Whatever it is, I'm willing." With no clear directions, he majored in sociology and upon graduation served three years in the army. Although Sharon came to Cedarville with missions in mind, she says, "I was not ready to go to the field after college. I needed knowledge, practical teaching, just plain growing up." So they "let Uncle Sam take over."

After the service, Joe went into business with his father and brother, distributing oil products throughout Ohio. During this period, missions kept nudging the back of Joe's mind. Not sure he was called, he was still open. "You don't go into missions just because you want to," he says.

Later, he turned to aviation, selling air charter. As always, he really enjoyed the sales end of things. But that was when the Lord finally said, "Come and serve."

They applied to Baptist Mid-Missions and were accepted in July, 1978. Now they await their visas, hoping to leave for Hastings, New Zealand, with their three children by May. There they will be involved in church planting.

Joe compares their years between college and New Zealand to those of Moses on the back side of the desert: years of preparation. God only knows how many other alumni are now in that same training ground.

College Placement Center Becomes a Reality

We are pleased to announce the Placement Center has become a reality. While the college is most grateful for the placement contacts with corporations and other enterprises in past years by our individual academic departments, there are several reasons for establishing a professionally staffed, centralized placement office.

First, as a growing, maturing institution with twentyone majors, Cedarville College now has more students graduating with more diverse interests than previously. Second, increased competition within the job market makes it imperative for the college to provide placement expertise to our students. Finally, the Placement Center will benefit both the college and the employer by increasing employer access to our graduates. The Center is presently functioning under Acting Director Don Rickard, Dean of Students, and a secretary.

Dave Ormsbee, Director of Admissions



Bob White has moved on to coaching football, and Dave Ormsbee has taken over his position as Director of Admissions. But what is a young chemist, interested in medicine and particularly podiatry, doing in a job concerned with prospective college students? Dave, a 1978 Cedarville graduate, explains it this way.

Chemistry challenges! Although he has never wanted to be a lifetime chemist, the rigor of the discipline appeals to his mentality. Thus he majored in chemistry, and upon graduating worked as a chemist in customer service for Allied-Kelite Products Division near Detroit. It was a time for thinking, for arranging goals. Dave hoped to use what he had learned in a future medical profession or in some career directly related to helping people.

But in mid-1979, Dr. Bob White asked Dave to consider traveling as a promotional representative for Cedarville College. During his college years, Dave had traveled extensively with the Swordbearers, serving as the group's president during his junior year. The outreach had involved a great amount of promotional work for the school, including displays and seminars. The experience was a springboard to his work as Student Recruitment Coordinator. Between September 1979 and May 1980, Dave booked 32,000 miles, visiting schools and churches.

"I have always had opportunities to work with people," Dave says, and this is what he enjoys. He believes no experience gained is wasted, for experience can be used by the Lord. Now, in his new position as Director of Admissions, Dave is relaxed, confident, and eager. Student applications for 1981-82 are coming in at a record pace. "This is an excellent year," he reports.

As he steps into his new job, he describes his basic goal as service to as many people as possible. "In a way, I'm a salesman for the school," he comments. In some ways Dave misses chemistry, but he enjoys his present position. He has always looked upon medicine and science as his profession, and public relations his hobby; but now the positions seem just the reverse--at least for the time being.

Library Services

As Cedarville's academic program grows more sophisticated, so do the demands upon the library as a resource center for research. Librarians must be schooled in obtaining information efficiently and comprehensively, and passing on their expertise to the student researcher.


At present our library holds 80,000 bound volumes and 14,000 volumes on microforms, and subscribes to roughly 750 periodicals. Students check out two-to three-hundred books per day, but this in no way represents total use of materials (e.g., reserved and reference volumes, microforms, newspapers, journals, and audio-visual equipment).

The inter-library loan system connected to 2200 other libraries gives faculty and students access to another seven million volumes from holdings both in this country and abroad. Many of our own books are presently on loan to other libraries through this system.

At the core of the emphasis on efficiency stands the concept of computerization, of which inter-library loan is only a part. The school continually adds various other complex computer services, including large data bases for subject search.

The library facilities grow at a consistent rate each year, yet the race to keep up with accelerated student

growth can sometimes prove discouraging. The ideal amount of materials ever recedes beyond reach. But perhaps quantity is not really the major goal, anyway. As Mr. Lynn Brock ('68), the director, remarks, "We need to learn to ask the right questions. It's not how much, but how you use what you have."







According to Admissions Director Dave Ormsbee ('78), of the 129 Winter Quarter applicants, 116 were accepted. Of those accepted 49 were readmitted and 44 were transfers from other colleges.

Coach John McGillivray ('70) and his Bible-toting, Africa-bound soccer players left Cdarville December 14 to work with **Allan** ('66) and **Ruth** (Hardy '69) **Fisher**, missionaries in the Ivory Coast. During the two week ministry, the team accumulated an 8-10 record and ministered to over 5000 people.

Winter quarter chapel speakers included Dr. Ernest Pickering, Emmanuel Baptist Church, Toledo, Ohio; Rev. Virgil Stoneking, Bethel Baptist Church, Cherry Hill, New Jersey; Dave Becklund of the American Wilderness Institute; Dr. Don Tyler, Brownsburg, Indiana; and Rev. Ron Cannon, Lima Baptist Temple, Lima, Ohio.

Approximately \$3 million will be awarded in federal, state, and private grants, scholarships, and loans to Cedarville College students this year. In 1979-80, 81% of the student body received some type of financial aid.

Initiated by the "Class of '72," the Student Body Loan and Grant Fund has grown substantially. The principal is nearly \$50,000, and approximately \$12,000 has been awarded to 60 students.

Twenty-three juniors and seniors from Cedarville were selected for the honor of Who's Who Among American College Men and Women.

Mr. Bob Johnson, who has a strong background in management and has worked in maintenance for Weyerhouser Inc., has replaced Mr. Al Grisham as Director of Physical Plant. Mr. Grisham assumed the duties of Campus Construction Director.

At 21-3, this year's Yellow Jacket basketball team is closing in on the 1964-65 season win-loss record when co-captains Mark Comb ('65) and Dozier Carter ('66) led Cedarville to a 23-4 mark.

The College Health Center reports 606 students used its services during one week in January, and as many as 165 were treated in one day, due to the flu.

Dr. June Kearney, who has been coaching volleyball at Cedarville for 18 years, achieved her 200th coaching victory when her team defeated Ashland College, November 4, 1980.

The Cedar Cliff Elderly Housing Apartments, recently constructed in the Cedarville community, are located across the street from Bethel Hall and consist of 23 single-person units.

The Cedarville College Women's Fellowship have rolled up their sleeves again to help bring a "woman's touch" to the student lounges and other public areas. Remodeling, new furniture, paintings, and lamp fixtures will help these areas take on a new appearance. Previous projects include the organ and projector equipment in the Chapel.

The greater Cleveland area alumni, students, parents, and friends were treated to a time of fellowship before the varsity basketball team defeated Grand Rapids 89-62 in a double header held at Lakeland Community College in Mentor, Ohio, on January 3, 1981.

Dr. Louis Goldberg, professor of Bible, Theology, and Missions at Moody Bible Institute, was the featured speaker for the Staley Foundation Lecture Series held on campus, February 17-19.

At the January meeting, the Trustees approved preliminary plans for the remodeling of Williams Hall into academic and administrative offices and approved the addition of the final dormitory wing to Lawlor Hall.

Cedarville College has received a challenge grant for \$150,000 from an Ohio Foundation for the new Athletic/Student Center Complex.

Two books recently added to the Alumni Archive Collection include Attorney-at-Law Larry Lillback's ('71) Rapture Planning, published by Carleton Press Inc. and Tom ('68) and Martie (White '70) Biller's Simple Object Lessons for Children, available through Baker Book House Publications

During the spring of 1978, a freshman from Springfield, Ohio, reviewed his stats after completing his first season of Cedarville basketball. He realized that he had a chance at breaking the college basketball scoring title.

Now, four years later, his shot slipped through the net and suddenly all the dreams accumulated in four years transpired with one flick of the wrist. Eric Mounts had surpassed Illinois All State and former Yellow Jacket star Al Knott (1962-66) as the number one scorer in Cedarville basketball history.

The moment was captured in classic fashion. His parents and high school coach were present to witness the event. Eric broke the mark in a big way by piling up 41 points to surpass the old mark by 26 points and bringing his career total to 2083. And to Eric's satisfaction, the record was broken in a winning cause. Mounts would certainly add to his record-setting total with 17 regular season and other possible post-season contests remaining on the Jackets' schedule.

In reflection of the moment, Eric observes many things concerning the significance of the mark. He takes very little personal glory but relates his success to the honor that his Lord has given him in possessing these talents. "The Lord multiplied my talents. I was just an average player in high school, but I fit in with the program at Cedarville, and I've been fortunate in es-

caping serious injury."

He continues, "I'm confident in the ability that God gave to me. Success isn't in what you do, though; it's what you do with what God has given you. You've got to believe in yourself." Mounts does believe in himself, but it is a belief which reflects the deep dedication and relationship that he possesses in his Lord and the people around him. He demonstrates this by saying, "The record means as much to my dad as it does to me. He becomes an active part of my game, and he's an encouragement."

Mounts portrays a positive testimony for Christ and for Cedarville in every activity in which he becomes involved. The scoring record only magnifies this quality.
