CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

NEED FOR LEADERSHIP

Have you ever been a part of a really growing progressive organization or business? Did you stop to analyze the "why" of that growth? Were the leaders of the organization the key to the progress? Why are some churches going concerns? Why are some moving ahead spiritually and numerically? Why are others barely maintaining the status quo?

Today the workaday world of most adults is filled with trained experts who give them assured, knowledgeable leadership. These adults also need qualifed leaders in their local churches. In church 5 oups they seek to have their spiritual needs met. There they seek the opportunity to serve the Lord.



Within the church group young people and children are being taught the vital, life-changing truth of God's Word. These age groups are forming life-time concepts and attitudes. If Christ Jesus, the Living Word, is to become their Saviour and Lord, they must have spiritual leaders who will direct them to Him.

The outreach of the local church depends upon its leaders. Will the church reproduce itself? Will its members engage in personal evangelism? Will it support home and foreign missions? The answers to these

questions will be determined by the church's leadership.

PREPARATION FOR LEADERSHIP

It is the purpose of the Department of Christian Education to prepare its graduates to become leaders in local churches. Course offerings are local-church oriented. However, graduates of the Department are equipped for leadership positions in other Christian organizations.

Both a major and a minor in Christian Education are offered. Students majoring in Christian Education will receive the Bachelor of Arts degree. Course offerings include: The Inductive Method of Bible Study, Christian Education of Children, Educational Work of the Church, Christian Education of Youth, Christian Education of Adults, Methods of Bible Teaching, Practice Teaching, Christian Education, Philosophy of and Christian Education Seminar. Students interested in Christian camping may elect to take Introduction to Camping and Camp Counseling,

Classroom activities are planned to give the students opportunities to put principles and theories into practical use. Practice Teaching provides teaching experience with younger age groups. Students in Christian Education Seminar, a senior course, are planning and conducting a series of Teacher Training classes in an area church.

This year students in the Department organized the Christian Education in Action club. Members are broadening their understanding of the field of Christian Education by going on field trips, attending conferences, hearing speakers and conducting instructional meetings. They are setting up a Christian Education lab room to provide resource material and teaching aids for student use. For their first major project they conducted sixteen Christian Education Workshops which were attended by college students and

people from area churches. These teaching-learning responsibilities afford many valuable lessons in leadership.

Coach Callan's 1963-64 basketball squad exceeded everyones fondest expectations. The Jackets riddled by graduation of such standouts as Sam Canine, Dave Jeremiah, and allconference guard Norris Smith, were forced to rebuild around lone returning star Dozier Carter, 6'5" giant forward from Portsmouth, Ohio. The successful rebuilding job reached a pinnacle on March 3 when before a capacity crowd at the fieldhouse the Jacketmen defeated Steubenville to earn the right to represent N.A.I.A. District 22 at the national tourney to be held in Kansas City.

Other highlights of the season included victories over Bluffton, Ashland, Defiance, and a last second 77-75 win over Taylor University. The Jackets ended regular season play with a record of 19-5, before falling victim to a strong Central Oklahoma team in The Kansas City National Tourney.

Hopes for next year sky-rocketed with last weeks announcement that 6'4" Associated Press All-State Allen Knott of East Moline, Illinois had en-

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rolled for the fall semester. Allen, an active member of the First Baptist Church of Silvis, Illinois, brushed aside nearly 60 scholarship offers including 6 from Big-Ten Schools. This type of Christian dedication is certainly refreshing in our present materialistically minded society.

Although getting very little cooperation from the weather, Coach Lane Moody's baseballers are working hard in preparation for opening defense of their Mid-Ohio League Championship. It will be hard to improve over last

year's 16-2 record. Success will depend upon a trio of young pitchers; Beavercreek, Ohio sophomore Charlie Wilkens, freshman left-hander Dick Dillelio of Cleveland, Ohio and Jamestown, N. Y. freshman Randy Ross.

Coach Moody is looking to Al Merwald, last year's leading hitter at .396, veterans third baseman Denny MacDonald, and short stop Tom Delanzo along with freshman Keith Abshear to supply the necessary hitting power to make the Jackets Mid-Ohio league champs for the second straight year.
