A WORD WITH ALUMNI

Where Do I Go From Here?

Where do I go from here? This perplexing question confronts scores of college students as they near graduation and prepare to enter the "real world." A Christian college should prepare its students for the future by allowing them to "live the learning." The college experience should be an invitation into the great business of being responsible, active citizens of a country, a world. This challenge certainly is being met in the academic realm of Cedarville College, but what about outside the classroom? The Cedarville College student personnel administrators have supplemented the classroom education with many extracurricular activities which provide a testing ground for putting theory into practice. Serving as a class officer, a student senate representative, or in a Christian service ministry, gives the student an opportunity to exercise leadership techniques as well as communication skills. Examples of student leadership activities are endless, but the significant question is: How successful has Cedarville College been in preparing students for the "real world?"

This preparation has led to a wide variety of careers and occupations for Cedarville College graduates. An alumni survey found many to be employed in leadership positions such as

teachers, businessmen, and pastors.

College professor Vera (Andrew '03) Harvey holds the distinguished title of poet laureate of the state of West Virginia. Tim Timmons ('67) is an author and a counselor in family life seminars. Maryalyce Jeremiah ('65) is the head coach of Indiana University's women's basketball team.

Many alumni find themselves in positions of administration. Nick Frost ('67N) and William Pierson III ('65) are administrators for Baptist Mid-Missions and the Association of Baptists for World Evangelism, respectively. Joe Weah ('74) serves as a pastor and Christian school director in Liberia and Evandro Batista ('77), in Brazil. Arnie Fruchtenbaum ('66) is the president of a Jewish mission agency in San Antonio, Texas.

We find John Justice ('64N) employed by the Federal Bureau of Investigation while Elton Acker ('66) is the owner of a realty company, and Mel Entingh ('56) is founder and owner of the Enting Water Conditioning Company in Dayton, Ohio.

Several graduates have chosen careers which require special skills or which offer a unique flair. For example, Art Shuter ('70) works as a piano tuner; Wayne Dickason ('62N) has become a qualified plastic surgeon; and among the corps of missionary pilots are Dave Nelson ('72) and Clif Jensen ('72).

It can indeed be said that Cedarville graduates are leaving their mark in the world today. Among such a diversity of skills and talents, Cedarville College alumni serve the Lord in a broad range of occupations.

Alumni Scholarship Awards

In 1978 the Alumni Council established a Scholarship and arant Endowment Fund which added a new dimension to the utilization of alumni contributions. It expresses the Alumni Association's interest in our students and challenges them to pursue academic excellence as they grow in the grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Savior. In addition to these factors, the establishment of this fund was an important step toward fulfilling the desperate endowment need for the college.

The interest earned from this Scholarship and Grant Endowment Fund is awarded annually at the spring Honors Day Chapel. The award of \$500 is credited to each recipient's account, and each is given a wall plaque recognizing his achievements. Four awards were presented this year, and those honored were: Jonathan P. Selden, Silva, Missouri, in social science: Terri L. Schmidt, Union Grove, Wisconsin, in language and literature; Bradley S. Brandt, West Liberty, Ohio, in Biblical studies; and Sharon R. Rawson, Springfield, Vermont, in education. The Herman W. Scott Language and Literature Award was given in memory of the late alumnus Herman W. Scott ('33). The education award is entitled "J.D. 'Jack' Willetts Education Award" in memory of former educator and Alumni Association President Jack Willetts ('58). Selections were made by the faculty members of the respective departments.

At the end of June 1982, the balance of the fund was over \$18,000. Each year, approximately \$2000 in gifts is received for this fund. In addition, 5% of the alumni undesignated gifts is transferred to this account.

Teacher Works With Pupil

Dr. June Kearney, after completing her twentieth year as a Cedarville College faculty member this spring, will be leaving for a new career as assistant women's basketball coach at Indiana University.

The new duties for Dr. Kearney will commence this August with the beginning of Indiana University's fall semester. During the school year, the position of assistant basketball coach will be her full-time job. "I will also be vice-president of Sports Concepts, Inc., a business that runs summer basketball camps," she states.

Her move to Indiana will also reunite Dr. Kearney with her close friend Dr. Maryalyce Jeremiah ('65), current head coach of the Indiana University women's basketball team. Ironically, Dr. Kearney had Dr. Jeremiah as a student and the two also were fellow instructors and coaches at Cedarville. As to this situation, Dr. Kearney comments, "We joke about it a lot — I always tell her that I taught her everything that she knows, but not everything I know."

Referring to her new responsibilities, Dr. Kearney acknowledges, "It is going to seem strange going back to basketball—but I love basketball." She states that she has a lot to learn in the area of summer camp administration. Therefore, she plans to concentrate mainly on this area for the time being. However, she states that in the future she may again do some aching and officiating.

Since coming to Cedarville in 1962, Dr. Kearney has served as a physical education instructor and has coached several women's sports. In fact, within the area of athletics, she has been the individual most responsible for developing the women's programs.



Softball 1976-81 74 wins, 43 losses In both softball and basketball, Dr. Kearney has never had a losing season; in 19 years at the volleyball helm, she experienced only three such seasons. In four consecutive volleyball seasons – from 1976-77 through 1979-80 – her squads

finished among the top eight teams in Ohio.

Several high points of her Cedarville years are chief in Dr. Kearney's mind. These include: two volleyball seasons in which her teams finished fifth in the state tourney; the all-state selections of two of her athletes, Brenda Hobar ('80) Gerber for volleyball and Vicki Butler ('80) for softball; a plaque presented to her by the 1980-81 volleyball team commemorating her 200th career coaching win in that sport; and a plaque given to her by the 1980-81 volleyball squad listing all her coaching career records season-by-season.

Heritage Alumni Create Scholarship

Several Heritage Alumni have expressed an interest in Christian higher education and a concern for Cedarville College students who are preparing to serve in the pastorate or the mission field. In response to this interest, the Alumni Association has authorized the establishment of the JOHN W. BICKETT HERITAGE FUND. Since these students will need additional years of schooling in seminary or language studies, this scholarship fund is designed to assist them financially during their undergraduate work at Cedarville.

The fund is named in memory of John W. Bickett who was the first member of the graduating class of 1897 to receive his diploma. Eighty per cent of this first graduating class went into the ministry, including Rev. Bickett who pastored in nearby Clifton, Ohio, and several other locations. He also had a personal ministry in the lives of many Cedarville graduates and served as a trustee of Cedarville College for a decade.

It is the desire of some Heritage Alumni to remember the early graduates who helped lay the foundation of the college by establishing the JOHN W. BICKETT SCHOLARSHIP FUND. 86th Commencement

On Saturday, June 5, Cedarville College held its 86th Commencement in the new Athletic Center. Two hundred sixtynine graduates received the baccalaureate degree, 11 the Secretarial Science Certificate, and 1 the One-Year Bible Certificate. Rev. A. Donald Moffat of Xenia, Ohio, was awarded the Doctor of Divinity degree. Approximately 2600 graduates, parents, relatives, and friends were in attendance.

President Paul Dixon's commencement address chalenged the graduates to live by their class motto, "Let us walk as He who called us." He commented on God's blessings here at Cedarville and how we've outgrown our chapel for these occasions.

The baccalaureate graduates include 42 in Biblical education, 68 in business administration, 39 in education, 17 in health and physical education, 14 in language and literature, 8 in music, 24 in psychology, 21 in science and math, 19 in social science, and 17 in speech.

Rev. Moffat, recipient of the honorary doctorate degree, is currently a Bible conference speaker and evangelist and will become a special field representative for Cedarville College beginning July 1.

Mr. Jack Wyrtzen of Word of Life Fellowship, Inc. and grandfather of two of the graduates spoke to the seniors and their parents at the Friday evening President's Banquet.







Dr. John A. Brumbaugh, professor of cell biology and genetics at the University of Nebraska, was the 1982 In-Forum speaker. Topics discussed were *Genetic Engineering Today*, *Should Christians Engineer?*, *Genetic Engineering in the Future*, and *Can the Family Survive Genetic Engineering?*

Recent Artist Series presentations were Charles Postlewaite, guitarist, and the Mainz Chamber Orchestra under the direction of Gunter Kehr and featuring Nina Tichman, piano soloist.

The 15th annual Cedarville Pastors' Conference will be held on campus September 13-16, with Reverend George Gardiner, pastor of Calvary Church, Grand Rapids, Michigan, as guest speaker.

The college will host the 10th annual Cedarville Baptist Open on September 16-17. Over 300 men will be swinging their clubs for the church and individual competition trophies.

Dave Gaffner ('69), director of placement at Cedarville, encourages all alumni who are employers to contact him so they can represent their businesses at the October 19 Career Day to be held in the new Athletic Center.

Steve Lantz ('75), pastor of First Baptist Church of Louisville, Ohio, has broadened his ministry by producing a vocal album, "Hallelujah, What A Savior." The album may be purchased at the college radio station.

Trustee approval included the granting of faculty tenure to Dr. Sharon Biddle, Mr. Richard Baldwin, and Dr. Richard Durham. Other action included the promotions of Mrs. Anne (Rodgers '76) Rich to assistant professor and Dr. James Biddle to professor.

Student fees for the 1982-83 academic year reflect a 9.5% increase over the 1981-82 cost. Cedarville ranked 49 out of 60 schools in student fee comparison of Christian College Coalition Schools.

Rex Rogers ('74) will be joining the Social Science Department faculty this fall as an assistant professor in the area of political science.

Three students competed in a "rebound-a-thon" for the American Heart Association's area fund-raising drive. Freshman Gary Cooke jumped and jumped for 26 consecutive hours to set a Guinness World Record. However, his record lasted only one week.

The tennis team finished the season with a 20-3 record. This was more than enough to win the Mid-Ohio Conference and to give them their 16th trip to the NAIA National Tournament in Kansas City. The lady netters also won the district title and berth to the Kansas City finals.

Coach Allen Monroe hailed this year's golf team as the best in Cedarville history. The squad finished 14-2 with a first and two seconds in invitational play.

"The Rainmaker," performed by the Cedarville College Village Players and directed by David Robey, was this year's spring stage production.

Dr. Hugh Hall has been added to the Development Office staff as associate director in charge of church relations, and Dr. Don Moffat was appointed "special representative" of the college.

On Friday, May 21, the Junior-Senior Banquet was held in the Presidential Ballroom of the Westin Hotel in Cincinnati. Entertainment was provided by Bert Kettinger.

David Ormsbee ('78), director of admissions, announced that applications are being received at a record rate, and he anticipates 1,750 students in the fall.

Five continents will be visited this summer by 125 students and faculty from Cedarville College, spreading the gospel through music and preaching.

Basketball Coach Don Callan will be conducting a week-long basketball camp on July 26-31 for boys in the 5th grade through high school.

Special chapel speakers during the spring quarter included Dr. John Whitcomb, professor of Theology and Old Testament at Grace Theological Seminary; Rev. Leon Rowland ('61), associate professor of Old Testament at Grand Rapids Baptist Seminary; and Dr. Don Jennings, A.B.W.E. International Director.

History Repeats Itself: Second Generation Roommates

"I don't really remember," replied Jeff Thornton when I asked him when he had first met his roommate Dave Moody. That's a strange answer, you might think. Everyone remembers the first time he met his roommate. But for Dave and Jeff, they were too young to remember. Their acquaintance at a very young age was the result of a long friendship that started on this campus in 1954.

Two young men arrived that fall and soon became good friends. In the fall of their junior year, Jerry Thornton ('58) and Lane Moody ('58) decided to room together. Of course, they didn't live in Lawlor or Carr. They found themselves assigned to a small room on the third floor of Collins Hall, previously known as the old Science Building.

By that time, they were good friends. Sports was an avid interest they both shared. They played basketball and baseball together. "Lane was definitely the better basketball player. But I guess baseball was more my game," Jerry remembered. They did everything together. They sang in a quartet; they sang in the choir. Many nights would find them at the home of their coach, Bob Underwood, watching television: baseball, basketball, football – whatever the season.

Graduation came soon enough for Lane and Jerry and, unre most college students who say goodbye to roommates
and friends, they went together to Grand Rapids, Michigan,
and landed their first teaching assignments in the same
school district. Lane and his wife Pat and Jerry and Linda
were very close friends. "I've often told my children that college friends are special. You may lose track of high school
buddies, but the really close college friends are friends for
life," Jerry told me.


In 1963 the Moodys and Thorntons were proud parents of baby boys. The Moodys already had two daughters, Debbie and Linda; the Thorntons had a daughter Jayne. Since the girls were already playmates, it was natural that the boys soon became friends. "Jeff had an empty field next to his house. There was an old bike trail there. It was off limits to Jeff and me. The girls were allowed to play there because they were older. We used to slip off over there and play until we heard a familiar voice call us home," Dave laughed as he told me. He doesn't remember the first time he met Jeff either. "I guess you could just say we grew up together – at least until third grade, when we moved away," Dave explained.

The boys didn't see much of each other after that until they were in high school and their parents visited Cedarville College the same weekend. The daughters in the Moody and Thornton families were already attending Cedarville College. "Jeff and I played a lot of basketball that weekend," Dave said. "We kind of got reacquainted."

When Jeff decided to attend Cedarville College, he heard that Dave was coming too. "I wrote Dave a letter and asked in to room with me." I was not surprised when Jeff told me mat they played a lot of sports together. Basketball and soccer are two of their favorites, although they can often be found in the Athletic Center together lifting weights. They were members of the Salvage Five intramural basketball team. "First Place!!" added Jeff.

When I asked if he could imagine a third generation Moody and Thornton rooming together at Cedarville College, a thoughtful Jeff replied, "Yes, I could imagine my children coming here. Even if their goals in life involved a major that Cedarville didn't offer, I would encourage them to attend here at least one year. I really appreciate the spiritual emphasis here on this campus. A few students complain about going to chapel every day. Maybe it's because I know I won't be here next year and will finish my education at a secular campus, but I really appreciate chapel. Yes, I could definitely imagine my children here at Cedarville."

Perhaps in another twenty or twenty-five years, history will repeat itself again – with third generation roommates.

I have been to many funerals, but never had I considered one to be a celebration — never, that is, until one of my best friends from college passed away at age 29 and requested that her funeral be a celebration.

For Kim this meant daily treatments with machines and medication, frequent hospital stays, difficulty in breathing, and eventually an inability to digest food.

When I think of Kim, I remember her sweet spirit – her uncomplaining attitude in spite of her difficult circumstances. Even in death, she was most concerned about the feelings of others. She was ready to meet the God who allowed her to have cystic fibrosis, the disease she credits for bringing her into contact with many wonderful people.

Kim's memorial service began with the congregation standing to sing, "Turn Your Eyes Upon Jesus." Other songs sung or played according to Kim's wishes were: "Because He Lives," "Special Delivery," and "How Great Thou Art."

I found myself feeling extremely sad that I would no longer be able to see Kim and enjoy her fellowship. While I was happy to know her suffering had ended and she was with our Savior, it wasn't until a few days later that I was able to focus in on being able to see the funeral as an actual celebration.

How do you celebrate the losing of a friend? This is how I finally came to view it. I remembered our conversations from college days about our expectations of marriage, and I knew that I would have been thrilled to attend Kim's wedding. Then it suddenly hit me: Kim had met her bridegroom – THE Bridegroom. She is now waiting for the rest of the bridal party to arrive. She is having the celebration to end all celebrations, and I am truly happy for her at last!

Nursing Program Update

The past few months have been exciting ones for the new nursing program. On April 16 the Board of Regents gave unanimous authorization to Cedarville College to offer a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree. This approval makes it possible for Cedarville College to grant the B.S.N. authorized by the state of Ohio. Last November the Ohio Board of Nursing Education and Nurse Registration also approved the program. This approval enables graduates to qualify for national State Board Examinations leading to the R.N.

The Department of Nursing will be eligible to apply for National League of Nursing accreditation in 1985 following the graduation of the first class. Accreditation will be retroactive to the establishment of the program in 1981. N.L.N. accreditation will be helpful to graduates who desire to continue their education in graduate school.

Irene Alyn, R.N., M.S.N., Ph.D., has been appointed chairman of the Department of Nursing. Dr. Alyn has several years of teaching experience at the graduate and undergraduate level at the University of Illinois in Chicago. Her doctoral work was in physiology, and she has extensive experience in nursing and consultant work. She is the co-author of Saunders Tests for Self Evaluation in Nursing Competence and has written several nursing texts. Dr. Alyn holds membership in a number of national nursing committees and is a member of Belden Regular Baptist Church in Niles, Illinois. She was employed by Cedarville College as a consultant for curriculum development prior to her appointment as chairman of the department.

Dr. Alyn will be engaged in curriculum development and negotiation of clinical contracts during the 1982-83 year. She will be assisted by Jan Bauer, R.N., M.S.N., the second full-time faculty appointee. Miss Bauer has fifteen years of teaching experience and is currently completing the Robert Wood Johnson Fellowship in Primary Care at Indiana University. Additional faculty will be appointed in the autumn of 1983 when the nursing sequence begins. Dr. Lila Seaman, administrative assistant for nursing, will be responsible for recruitment, administration, and development.

At the present time, about forty-six students on campus are taking prenursing general education, Bible, and support cognates. More than fifty have applied for the fall of 1982.


