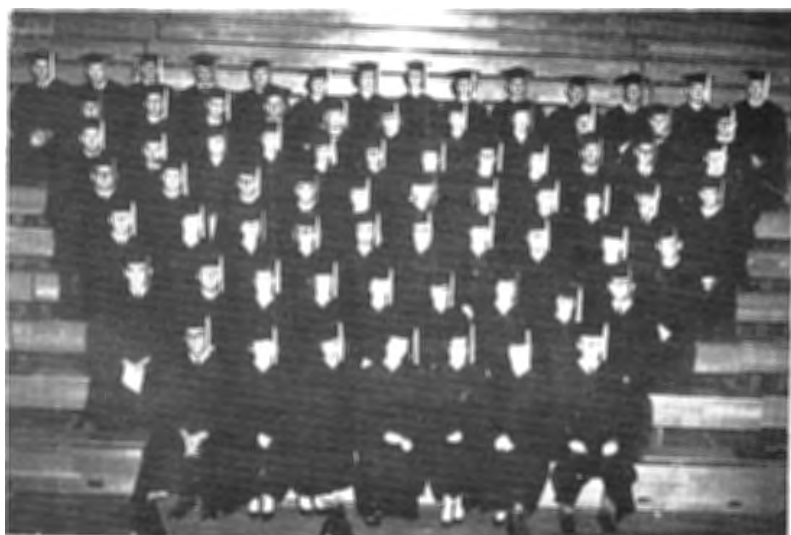

CLASS OF 1964

Eighty-two seniors graduated from Cedarville College this spring. This is the largest class ever graduated from the College. Commencement activities were held in the College gym with Dr. James T. Jeremiah, President of the College, presiding. A large audience was present to hear the commencement speaker, Dr. Earle Griffith, D.D., Vice President of Piedmont Bible College, Winston-Salem, North Carolina.

Their courses of study cover a wide spectrum, having received Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, and Bachelor of Music degrees. Our churches can be proud of these Baptist young people and look with optimism to their contribution to the Lord's work in the future.

DEGREE CONFERRED



In recognition of the years of service and outstanding contributions that Dr. Kenneth Masteller has rendered in the pastorate, Bible-teaching ministry, and world missions, Cedarville College conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity. Dr. Masteller has been pastor of the Haddon Heights Baptist Church, Haddon Heights, New Jersey. During his 24-year ministry at this church, the membership increased to 800, the Sunday School to 1270, and \$85,000 was given annually to missions. Dr. Masteller has led the church through two building programs involving the cost of \$525,000. He has also contributed much to the cause of world missions, serving as a member of the Association of Baptists for World Evangelism and making missionary trips in the behalf of world missions. Dr. Masteller previously held the Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Divinity degrees.

DR. MADDOX HONORED



Special recognition was given to Dr. Clifford R. Maddox during the commencement exercises when the College honored him with a Distinguished Service Award. For the recognition of his outstanding contributions to Cedarville College, the Board of Trustees voted to make him Dean Emeritus. Dr. Maddox received his B.S. from Georgetown College, 1916; M.A. from the University of Chicago, 1925; and Ph.D. in 1933. Many years of his life have been devoted to teaching and administration in the public schools. For 30 years he served the Thornton Township High School, Harvey, Illinois, as Psychologist, Supervisor of Instruction, and Assistant Superintendent in Charge of Instruction. For eight years (1956-1964) he has served as Academic Dean at Cedarville College where he has established a testing program and given wise counsel in the development of the academic program.
