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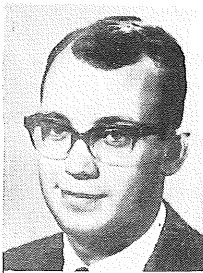

New Dean



Dr. Clifford W. Johnson will assume his new responsibilities as Academic Dean, effective September 1. He replaces Dr. Clifford R. Maddox who served in that capacity since 1956. Dr. Maddox will assume the position of Dean Emeritus and will act in the capacity of Director of Testing.

Dr. Johnson came to Cedarville in June of 1962 and has been acting as Registrar and Chairman of the newly organized Department of Education. Dr. Johnson received his B.A. and M.A. from Western Washington State College, and just before coming to Cedarville, he received his Doctor of Education degree from the University of Washington. His professional experience prior to this time was obtained in the field of education, having spent three years as an elementary teacher and ten years in administration.

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received his B.D. and Th.M. from Grace Theological Seminary. Professor Lawlor has been teaching at Cedarville for five years where he is an Assistant Professor of Bible and Greek.

Dr. Ray E. Bartholomew, Chairman of the Division of Language and Literature, received his Doctor of Philosophy degree this spring from Western Reserve University. He received his B.A. from Cedarville College in 1957. While at Cedarville he served as president of his senior class, received the Schol-

arship Trophy, and graduated summa cum laude. In 1959 he received his M.A. from Western Reserve University. During this time, he carried an "A" average (4.00). Dr. Bartholomew was awarded two consecutive scholarships from the Dean of the Graduate School at Western Reserve University with which he completed his master's and doctor's work. He has been teaching at Cedarville College for the past six years.

Dale S. Thomson, Associate Professor in the Science Department at Cedarville has been awarded the National Science Foundation Science Faculty Fellowship. The National Science Foundation is an agency of the Federal Government and awards only 400 of this type fellowship throughout the nation. This coveted fellowship provides salary, all tuition and fees which totals about \$8,500 for a period of 15 months. Mr. Thomson will be taking graduate work at Ohio State University toward a Ph.D. in zoology.

Mr. Thomson attended Fenn College from 1952-53. He received his B.S. from Cedarville College in 1956. He was awarded both the President's Trophy and the Music Trophy. He earned his M.A. from Ohio State University in 1962. This degree was also completed on a NSF grant. Mr. Thomson has been teaching at Cedarville College for the past seven years where he is an Associate Professor of Biology.

Assistant Professor L. Bert Frye completed his master's work at Miami University. His studies were in the field of physics, and his thesis was written on astronomy.

He received his B.S. in engineering from the University of Missouri and his B.D. from Grand Rapids Baptist Seminary. Prior to this, he worked in professional engineering for nine years.

Professor Frye is beginning his fourth year of teaching the physical sciences at Cedarville.

Miss Carla Packard joins the faculty as Assistant Professor in Speech. She received her A. B. in French from Wittenburg College, Springfield, Ohio, and her M. A. in French from Ohio State University. Miss Packard brings with her a rich background of teaching experience, having taught at both Ohio State and Capital University, Columbus, Ohio.
