

HOMECOMING 1964

The Annual Homecoming activities on October 10 at Cedarville Colege were a large success. One hundred twenty-five alumni registered in the morning, and many other alumni arrived throughout the day for the festivities. Parents of students and other visitors swelled the crowd on campus to an all-time high.

After hosting the guests to an open house on the campus, a parade led by Queen Nancy Buerer and her court traveled from Community Park down Main Street in Cedarville to the College campus. Each class constructed elaborate floats appearing in the parade. Colorful displays constructed by clubs and other student groups were scattered throughout the campus. The sophomore class won first prize for the best float and the junior class second prize. The winning displays were: first, Future Business Associates; second, Faith





Hall; third, combined musical groups.

Cedarville Alumni, at a noon luncheon, voted to raise \$4,000 for the production of a 30-minute color, sound film depicting Cedarville College. The film will be made during this school year and released during the fall of 1965.

The Cedarville College soccer team helped to make the Annual Homecoming successful by defeating the highly regarded Central State team 4-2. After the queen and her court were presented at half time, entertainment was furnished by two sky divers who jumped from a high altitude, delaying the opening of their shutes while ignited flares marked their descent.

The choir and other musical groups climaxed the day's activities by presenting an excellent musical program for the evening.



Dear Friends:

We encourage you to visit the Cedarville campus and see for yourself what God has been pleased to do for your College. "The Lord hath done great things for us: whereof we are glad." (Psalm 126:3)

You will not need a guided tour to observe that we are operating the College at full capacity. The dormitories are full and the library is crowded. Please note, I am calling your attention to conditions as they now exist, not as they will be in another year. What shall we do to accommodate your young people next fall and the year after that?

To the limit of our ability, we are planning to expand our facilities. Our "ability" in this regard is limited by financial income. You can strengthen our hands by prayerfully listening to this appeal for help.

It has been estimated that the library building will cost at least \$300,000. This building could be erected in 1965 if 300 churches and/or individuals would prayerfully consider the possibility of giving \$1,000 before January 1, 1966, and then go to work on the project. It can never be done if each of us leave the responsibility to someone else. It would greatly encourage us if many of you would at least attempt to be one of the 300.

Remember, though we are asking you to help in this library project, it is not for our own advancement that we ask, but for your College and your young people and your church that we plead. We are grateful that you share this challenge with us.


