

#### WILL YOU BE ON OUR HONOR ROLL?

Applications for next year are coming in at the starting rate of nearly 2 to 1 over last year. Unless we start construction on our new library and dormitory by spring, most of these future leaders of our churches will have to be turned away. We believe the Lord would have us to build in 1965 and have set the following goal:

Library	\$300,000	Money to be raised	through:
Dormitory	\$350,000	Bond issue for dormitory	\$350,000
TOTAL	\$650,000	Gifts for library	\$300,000

There are two ways that you can help us accomplish this:

#### I. Bonds for the dormitory

Our new series "C" Bond issue of \$350,000 will enable us to build a dormitory. Income from the dormitory will be used to retire the bond issue. Pastors can encourage individuals in their churches to invest their savings in these bonds paying 5%. In this way, their money will both work for them by earning more interest than in a savings account and work for the Lord in providing a greater ministry at Cedarville College.

II. Gifts for the library

The library will have no income to underwrite a bond issue and must be built through gifts. To raise funds, the College has challenged 300 churches or interested friends to give \$1,000 each. The names of donors will be engraved on an honor roll plaque that will be erected inside the new library.

In last month's Bulletin, we cited an example of the sacrificial giving of \$1,000 each from a small mission church and an individual. Since then, several churches and individuals have accepted this challenge.

The response to this challenge has given us cause to rejoice. We have been particularly impressed with the ingenuity that some have used to raise the \$1,000 gift. Perhaps one of these ideas will enable you to participate.

1. GIFTS

Many of you may be able to give an outright gift of \$1,000 as was done by Mr. Kenneth St. Clair, Business Manager of the College.

2. CEDARVILLE COLLEGE DAY

Some churches might want to follow the example of the First Baptist Church, Blanchester, Ohio, and designate a Sunday as Cedarville College Day. Several of the churches have invited a musical team and speaker from the College and used this opportunity to work toward a \$1,000 goal for the library.


3. MONEY CAN BE BORROWED

The Faith Baptist Church of Greenville, Ohio, borrowed \$1,000 from a bank to give to the library fund. (This is a six-year-old mission church with an average attendance of 93.)

#### 4. <u>50 PEOPLE GIVING ONE DOLLAR A WEEK</u>

Emmanuel Baptist Church at Toledo has a project of challenging 50 people to give \$1 a week for 20 weeks. This will enable them to give \$1,000 to the library.

Coach Don Callan's Yellow Jackets are Fiding a winning streak of 7 straiger games with no losses in what appears to be one of our most promising seasons.

Actions such as these put Cedarville in an enviable position. With a testimony as strong as the one I saw at the basketball game the Lord surely will bless Cedarville and its basketball team in the future. "
