

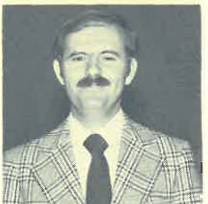

Communication Arts Department

One of the major changes occurring in our society is the change to what some have referred to as the "Communications Era." According to the Chairman of the Department of Communication Arts, Dr. James Phipps, "We are working to keep our program up with this important shift. New courses, especially in broadcasting, are designed to address the new innovations in media. Through graduate programs, several department members are doing an excellent job of staying up to date with the 'information age.'"

"Hands on" experience characterizes the faculty of the Department of Communication Arts. The department features instructors who have practical experience, enabling them to work with students not only academically but also in vocational settings to achieve the final goal of preparing strong communicators.

This department brings together a variety of interests and practical professional experience in its faculty, thus affording the student a complete, well rounded educational experience. James R. Phipps ('68), Ph.D., has worked with commercial and non-commercial radio stations. For the last twenty years he has worked with the college radio station, WCDR-FM, broadcasting the college basketball games, announcing, and programming. J. Wesley Baker, M.A., has a background in radio, television, and film. He has served as a news director, staff announcer, publicity director, and has appeared in Christian films. He recently spent time in Italy working with a Christian radio station, Radio Luce (Radio Light), in program development. Deborah Horner ('79), M.A., has a strong rhetorical theory background. She works with the forensic team, and is advisor to the *Cedars*, the college newspaper. James Leightenheimer ('80), has vocational experience in radio broadcasting in the areas of announcing and programming and is pursuing a graduate degree at Ohio University. Kurt Moreland ('76), M.A., specializes in research and organizational communications and is presently completing his dissertation for a Ph.D. from Purdue University. Marlin Rayburn, M.A., works in the area of general speech and homiletics, combining his sixteen years of teaching with his past experience as a pastor. David H. Robey, M.A., is gifted in the area of drama. He has authored two Christian works: *Bridge of Blood: Taking Christ to the Aucas*, and *For His Cause: The Ministry and Martyrdom of John and Betty Stam*, and has appeared in Christian films. He directs and/or performs in college drama productions and coaches the forensic team.

Adding depth to the department in other areas are Rebecca Baker, M.A. (drama); Sharon Biddle, Ph.D. (public speaking); Deborah Haffey ('68), M.A. (debate); Clifford Johnson, Ed.D. (group discussion); and Miriam Maddox, Professor Emerita (speech therapy).

Classes are divided into seven basic areas of emphasis: rhetoric and public address, communication theory, drama, forensics, homiletics, oral interpretation, and broadcasting. The department offers two majors: speech communications and broadcasting. Within the speech communications major there are three special areas of study: general communications, platform arts, and organizational communications. The broadcasting major is offered as an interdisciplinary major with specializations in journalism, management/sales, general communication, and video production.

In addition to the academic work, there are also opportunities in the broadcasting major for "hands on" experience working with radio and television equipment. Radio lab facilities feature two control rooms and a video editing suite. The college's radio station, WCDR-FM, frequently has positions open for student operators, and students have also worked with the other Christian radio and television stations in the Dayton-Springfield area.

The work of the Communication Arts program goes beyond its own majors. Besides providing instruction in speech for the general education requirements, the department also provides opportunities for developing those communication skills through forensic competition, dramatic productions, and speech therapy. Professor Robey says, "We recently looked back over our productions from the past four years and found that we had 446 students involved. And this doesn't include the number who have worked on publicity, audio, ushering, ticket sales, and so on. The totals demonstrate a wide-range of majors participating."

The pastorate, personnel management, public relations, education, law, journalism, radio management, and broadcasting are areas in which Cedarville graduates have proved that majors in speech communications and broadcasting prepared them well for their vocation. A survey of these graduates from 1974-1983 indicated that thirty percent have gone on to graduate school. Also of interest is the fact that sixty percent of male alumni with a speech major have attended seminary.

In combining professional experience with the academic and "hands on" structure of the Communication Arts Department, it is the goal of this department to produce students who are strong communicators, dedicated to presenting God's truth and prepared to minister effectively in the various fields of the communication arts.

The Abundant Life Singers, the Sounds of Joy, and the 1984 Summer Swordbearers will be featured on a new album produced by the Christian Ministries Department. Entitled "For Us," the album will present a salvation theme and will be available in the college bookstore after May 1, as well as from these traveling musical teams.

Live radio came to the Alford Auditorium stage when the Communications Club presented "On the air," a radio revue. This laid-back program was filled with jingles and slapstick comedy from the 1940 era when every home had a radio and the shows and commercials were a part of everyday life.

A January 1, 1984, library inventory reveals the overcrowded facility constructed in 1967 houses 87,985 bound volumes; 15,945 microform volumes; over 900 periodical subscriptions; 1,209 cassette tapes; 655 filmstrips; 3,821 records; 8,042 35mm slides; 159 films; and 19 videotapes.

"Salute to Summer," an on-campus program for high school age students sponsored by the Admissions Office, is scheduled for July 12-14. Activities include a full day at Kings Island amusement park near Cincinnati.

Dr. J. Don Jennings, president of Northwest Baptist Seminary, Tacoma, Washington, was the featured speaker for the Spring Enrichment Conference, March 19-23.

"Perceived or actual stereotype of 'conservative' Cedarville and 'liberal' Antioch" was the topic of discussion at the Antioch College weekly Friday Forum, to which Cedarville was invited. Dr. Allen Monroe and junior Cheryl Phillips from Cinnaminson, New Jersey, represented Cedarville on the panel.

Freshman Rob Moore from West Olive, Michigan, and sophomore Jane Romig from Gilbertsville, Pennsylvania, will compete in the NAIA National Indoor Track Meet in Kansas City, Missouri. Rob qualified in the mile run with a time of 4:16, while Jane clocked a 2:18 in the 880 yard run to qualify.

The Placement Office, directed by David Gaffner ('69), recently provided a series of useful seminars including: Resume Writing; How to Write a Letter of Application; How to Interview; Evaluating a Job Offer; and Job Searching.

Rev. Jerry Falwell will be speaking in chapel Monday, April 9, as part of our In-Forum series, "The Christian's Responsibility in Politics."

Fall quarter's student participation in recreational and intramural activities involved 45% of the student body, announced Mark McDougal ('78), Director of Recreational Activities. He also noted that Cedar Lake provided seven weeks of ice skating enjoyment, the longest period in years.

The Greene County Red Cross presented a new van to the Red Cross Disaster Unit of Cedarville College. Cedarville's disaster unit is 19 years old and was the first of its kind at any college in the United States.

A new dimension of school spirit was realized this year with the formation of a Flag Corps. This eleven-woman squad performed during three basketball halftime shows.

Cedarville College's athletic booster organization, "The Yellow Jacket Club," announces a 1983-84 membership of 189. Over \$14,000 has been received to help provide scholarships for the 14 men's and women's varsity sports.

Port Charlotte, Florida, is the home of 6' sophomore Lisa Campbell who shot a blazing 60.2% from the floor. She led the women's basketball team in points per game (17.8) and rebounds (12.3), which were instrumental in her selection to the All-Western Buckeye Collegiate Conference 1st team and All-NAIA District 22. Tim Danube, 6'6" senior from Baraboo, Wisconsin, was selected All-NAIA District 22 and 2nd team Mid Ohio Conference while becoming the eighth player in Cedarville College history to play in 100 or more games.

"The Diary of Anne Frank" was the winter drama production, directed by Professor Dave Robey. The spring drama production, scheduled for May 3-5, is "She Stoops to Conquer," a comedy by Oliver Goldsmith. Rebecca Baker is the director, and performances will be Thursday and Friday at 8 p.m. with a special 2 p.m. matinee on Saturday for alumni and parents.



Xenia native has Cedarville connection

Helen Hoover Santmyer, a native of Xenia, recently burst into the limelight when her fourth book "*...And Ladies of the Club*" was chosen as a main selection for the Book-of-the-Month Club. In spite of her overnight success, literary acclaim has been years in the making for 88-year old Santmyer.

The 1,344 page novel that has caught the attention of publishers, agents, and Hollywood producers was begun more than fifty years ago as an answer to Sinclair Lewis' unflattering portrait of small-town America in *Main Street*. The action takes place in a mythical southwestern Ohio town and covers the period between 1868 and 1932. The title refers to members of the local women's literary club, through whom the town's political, cultural, and social changes are related. "I just went along and wrote down what happened," says Miss Santmyer. The Book-of-the-Month Club calls "*...And Ladies of the Club*" "...an absolutely stunning story," and "the great Middle American novel."

Miss Santmyer graduated from Xenia High School in 1913 and then earned a bachelor of arts degree at Wellesley College in Boston, Massachusetts. She worked in New York as a secretary to the editor of Scribner's magazine and then earned a bachelor of letters degree at Oxford University before returning to Xenia in 1929.

In the 1920's she wrote two novels: *Herbs and Apples* and *The Fierce Dispute*. A third book, *Ohio Town*, is a history of Xenia, and became quite popular after the 1974 tornado demolished this county seat.

Miss Santmyer is better known to Cedarville alumni as Dean Santmyer or Professor Santmyer. From 1936 to 1953 she served as Dean of Women and Head of the English Department.

Miss Santmyer's success has recently appeared on the pages of the *New York Times*, the *Chicago Tribune*, the *Washington Post*, *Time*, and *Newsweek*, as well as on CBS and NBC's national news, not to mention the local T.V. and newspaper coverage. She responded to all the publicity by saying, "They've made entirely too much fuss over this book. I'm simply overwhelmed."

By the time Miss Santmyer finished the transcript, 11 boxes of bookkeepers' ledgers were covered with longhand and she was in a nursing home bed, partially blinded by cataracts and weakened by emphysema. "*...And Ladies of the Club*" was originally published in 1982 by The Ohio State University Press which holds the copyright. It is clear Miss Santmyer was not in the writing business for the money. She was motivated by saying something in which she believed. The fact that it took so many years to produce the book in her spare time and in poor health provides an astonishing testament to

her perseverance. G.P. Putnam's Sons plans to publish her book, expecting to sell more than 100,000 copies. After reading her book, a Los Angeles producer and director acquired motion picture and television rights. Informed of the book by his mother in Cleveland, Ohio, this producer/director plans to adapt the story for a television mini-series.

Recalling her experience with Cedarville students, Miss Santmyer said, "They were good kids, we rarely had trouble with any of them." Dr. William R. Clark ('49), president of the Educators Employment Consultant Bureau in Williamstown, Massachusetts, and former pupil of Miss Santmyer, has special appreciation for his mentor and credits her with his achievements in education. He recalls Miss Santmyer as a tiny woman, no more than 90 pounds, with hair pulled back tightly in a bun, who never raised her voice but managed to instill awe in her students. He stated, "Her uncompromising insistence on academic excellence was a crucial spur to my achieving, and her dedication an inspiration." He remembers, "We were all a little afraid of her. Her comments on our papers were sometimes longer than the paper itself." Mr. Clark was able to accept his first job teaching and coaching at his old high school in Rock Castle, Virginia, and still graduated because Miss Santmyer agreed to let him take advanced grammar as an extension course. "All her students knew she was writing," he said, "but she was teaching to survive."

In appreciation of Miss Santmyer's labors, the 1952 Cedrus was co-dedicated to her and states, "Her class-room work has been masterly and thorough. The living products of her efforts testify to the thoroughness with which she has labored, and to her success in putting things across. English is English y'know. But to perfect her knowledge of English she has added Latin, Greek, French, and German, which have given her a mental balance rarely to be found anywhere. Long may she wave."

The closing paragraph from a *Washington Post* article was an excellent salute to Miss Santmyer. "So here's to you, Helen Hoover Santmyer of the Hospitality Home East in Xenia, Ohio. Savor your triumph. Take pride in knowing that you will give pleasure to countless readers and that you serve as an example of tenacity, talent and integrity for the rest of us."

Opera House considered for National Register

used it as a project for an independent study. Subra recalls, "this project has been an excellent experience for myself in large scale remodeling. The opportunities I have had in working with the public and professional people have made my time and efforts worthwhile." Jeff currently is employed by Liberty National Bank as a Loan Officer Trainee in Buffalo, New York, but he continues to monitor the Opera House as it progresses toward a state of restoration. "My ultimate goal is to have the Opera House placed on the National Historic Register and then to see full restoration and renovation according to code for public and community use."

This once famous and beautifully furnished attraction of Cedarville now stands empty except for some of the lower level space which is used for local government offices. Built out of brick in 1888 after the first opera house was destroyed by fire, it was the largest and most magnificent structure in the county. A variety of plays and performers enhanced the gaslit stage. It was used for college plays, graduation ceremonies, minstrel shows, political rallies, and other public gatherings. The Opera House was last used in 1955 for the Cedarville High School graduation. "The number of memories and historical happenings that took place within the Opera House walls more than justify its nomination," stated Representative Haines.

The estimate for remodeling and renovation is approximately \$500,000. The main expenses are plumbing, wiring, and heating. The care and respect Cedarville residents have shown the building has a lot to do with its being considered for listing in the National Register of Historic Places. A final decision is expected to be made by the federal government in a few months.

Thanks to the efforts of 1983 alumnus Jeff Subra, the National Register of Historic Places is considering the placement of the Cedarville Opera House, constructed in 1888, on its register. This approval would qualify the building as a historical site and open the way for possible funds for renovation.

The Cedarville Opera House, located on Main Street, has been given approval by the Ohio Historic Site Preservation Advisory Board to be included in the National Register. According to State Representative Joseph E. Haines, "preservation officials tell me that a chief reason for recommending the inclusion of the Opera House in the Register is the building's excellent physical shape and lack of major structural changes to its original design. The Opera House could represent a typical, but well preserved piece of late 19th century architecture to the people of Ohio and the nation."

While a junior, Jeff was introduced to the need during a business club meeting when guest speaker, Mayor Warren Webber of Cedarville presented some of the needs of the village. Jeff, along with current Student Body President John Jackson, and senior Brian Smith, did a project for their small business management class. They set up the Opera House as a "Broadway West" and created a mock business using the existing structure on a partnership basis. As a senior, Jeff

Shawnee High School recognizes E. M. Irvine



Edward M. Irvine was born August 28, 1922, in Selma, Ohio. His family moved to Cedarville while he was yet a young boy, his parents hardly realizing the impact that living in a college town would have on their son. Ed graduated from Cedarville High School in 1940 anticipating a college education just so he could coach. "That's what got me interested in education," Irvine states. Now, forty-four years later, he is still investing his time in the lives of young people.

Mr. Irvine's career in education began at the Caesar's Creek School, eight miles south of Xenia. He transferred to the Ross Township School System (Jamestown, Ohio) in 1948, where he taught history and coached basketball, baseball, and track. In only four years, Ed's leadership abilities were recognized as the offer to become the principal of the Tecumseh High School in Springfield was extended. He served in the position from 1952-58. Always looking for a challenge, Ed then accepted the job of setting up the first curriculum at newly established Shawnee High School in the Springfield Local school district. During his 22 years as principal at Shawnee High School, Ed led the school into three successful building programs and an enrollment that doubled. One of the building additions which the school enjoys today is the new 2,000 seat gymnasium. On December 2, 1983, during the basketball half-time celebration in the presence of the county superintendent and school board officials, the gymnasium was dedicated and named the E.M. Irvine Gymnasium in recognition for Edward Irvine's faithful service and leadership at Shawnee High School.

Ed recalls many wonderful experiences at Shawnee, including the eight consecutive years that the football team won or shared the conference title. He smiles when thinking about young men and women who have made something of themselves. Some have become doctors, lawyers, and judges, but he also remembers a few who went the other way.

Reflecting on his Cedarville College experience, Ed remembers his education, broken up by World War II. He started at Cedarville in 1942 and completed a year before his term of service. He returned to Cedarville College in the summer of 1946 and received his Bachelor of Science degree in 1948. Two Cedarville College professors stand out in his mind because of the great impact they had on him. Mr. Irvine commented, "A.J. Hostetter made me want to teach. He was well versed in his subject material and was outstanding in his relationships with students. I took any class he taught." In recalling the other professor, Mr. Irvine remarked, "Coach Mendell Beattie never lost his cool and was always a sportsman. He believed academics came before athletics and stressed the importance of learning. He taught me that losing is not the worst thing that could happen." It was also because of Mr. Beattie that Ed started his Masters work at the University of Cincinnati. He received a Master of Education in 1953 and recalls "that Cedarville College did a pretty decent job of preparing me for this work."

Although Edward Irvine retired in 1980, he is a part-time employee of Cedarville College in the Education Department. As a student-teacher evaluator he continues to direct the lives of young people. He and his wife Betty have lived in their current Cedarville home for 24 years and are active in the community.

An example of Ed's joy and personal fulfillment in enriching the lives of young people is best evidenced in his son, John, who follows in his father's footsteps by teaching and coaching in Corpus Christi, Texas.
