



A Word With Alumni

- Scholarship and Grant Endowment Fund The balance of this fund is slightly more than \$30,000. Last year it grew by \$9,000, approximately 41%. This growth permitted the Council to expand the award by including the Communication Arts Department among the departments giving the Alumni Award. Five \$500 scholarships from interest income were awarded at the Honors Day Chapel for the 1984-85 academic year.
- 2. **Annual Fund** As of May 1, \$164,788 have been received, an increase of 29% over last year at this time. The Council established a goal of raising \$100,000 for the college's general operating fund for the 1984-85 Annual Fund Campaign.
- 3. Homecoming 1984 "Memories of a Lifetime" has been selected as the theme for the October 19 and 20 Homecoming festivities. A change in scheduling of the class reunions now has all the Heritage Alumni meeting on Friday evening before the Prism V Concert. All the class reunions will be Saturday morning from 9:00-11:00 a.m. so that more alumni can participate. The alumni banquet in the Athletic Center will follow the 11:00 a.m. parade.
- 4. Questionnaire and Directory Update Alumni questionnaires are being returned at a rate slower than expected. To date 1,200 have been returned. The Council urges you to respond today, so that the new directory can be printed.
- Alumni Gatherings Since last July, 19 alumni gatherings have been held in eight states. Over 540 alumni and friends enjoyed these times of fellowship. Research is being conducted to develop gatherings in new locations. If you are interested in helping to coordinate such a gathering, please contact Council member Roy Kern, P.O. Box 10906 G.S., Springfield, MO 65808.
- Graduating Seniors Each graduating senior will receive a wallet-size mini-diploma as a "welcome gift" from the Alumni Association. The Council also approved to counderwrite the cost of a commencement morning breakfast for the graduates' parents.
- Council Meeting The Alumni Council will meet on Wednesday, July 4, in conjunction with the Summer Enrichment Conference. If you have any suggestions or comments you would like to share, please send them to Gary Kuhn, P.O. Box 601, Cedarville, Ohio 45314.

"Thank you, Alumni" became a familiar response of students and faculty at the Friday, May 4, Honors Day Chapel. Five scholarships of \$500 each were awarded to students with outstanding academic achievement by their respective department chairman. Gary Kuhn, Director of Alumni Relations also presented the J. W. Bickett Heritage Fund Award of \$700.

The Alumni Scholarship and Grant Endowment Fund, which was established in January 1978, began with the intent of endowing scholarships by investing the principal at a high yielding rate so that interest income could be used to provide a truly academic scholarship for each department. By random draw each of the eleven academic departments were selected in the order they were to annually present the alumni award. Selected first was the Education Department, which named the award in memory of former educator and alumni association president, Jack Willetts. The Language and Literature Department was second, followed by the Biblical Education, Social Science, and the Communication Arts departments. Each time the interest income reaches a plateau of \$500 a student from the Business, Music, Psychology, Health

and Physical Education, Science and Mathematics, and Nursing Departments will be added to the list of Alumni Scholarship recipients.

The first Alumni Scholarship Award was presented in 1980 to John Hart. John has completed two years of study at the University of Dayton School of Law and certainly is representative of the quality of student who receives the Alumni Scholarship.

This year's recipients include Amy Jo Windnagle who received the J.D. "Jack" Willetts Education Award. Amy resides in New York and is one of four children attending college. She plans a career in elementary education and has special interests in music, writing children's literature, and using drama and puppets with an evangelistic emphasis. Keven Todd, from Plainview, Minnesota, received the Language and Literature Award. He is a junior English major planning to attend law school after graduation. Also interested in law school are sophomore speech major Jim Liebler and senior Luis Corchado. Jim, from Findlay Ohio, received the award from the Communication Arts Department while Luis, a pre-law major from Maple Shade, New Jersey, received the Alumni Award from the Social Science Department. Junior Aaron Bowes, of Little Current, Ontario, Canada, received the award in Biblical Education. He plans to participate in a pastoral internship this summer before completing his senior year.

In a letter of appreciation to the Alumni Association, Jim Liebler stated the sentiments of all the scholarship recipients. "This past year at Cedarville College has been very fulfilling as well as rewarding. The Lord taught me many valuable lessons, and I am glad that in His divine providence He led me to Cedarville for my education. It is a great honor to receive the Alumni Scholarship, and the \$500 will go a long way in helping me with next year's expenses." Amy Windnagle adds, "I hope my future performance at Cedarville will not make you regret your generosity."

339 Graduate

Commencement Day at Cedarville College is a day of celebration – a day laden with the victory of achievement, and bittersweet with goodbyes to friends that have grown to love each other – the culmination of four years of memories.

On Saturday, June 2, the 88th annual commencement of Cedarville College became the final memory for the class of 1984.

Receiving four-year diplomas at the annual commencement ceremonies were 339 graduates along with 16 two-year secretarial science students and two one-year Bible students who were awarded certificates. The baccalaureate graduates include 93 in business administration, 46 in education, 38 in psychology, 34 in Biblical education, 28 in communication arts, 27 in science and mathematics, 26 in social science, 22 in language and literature, 18 in health and physical education, and seven in music. Donn Ketcham, medical doctor and veteran ABWE missionary to Bangladesh, was awarded the honorary Doctor of Humanities degree.

"Only fear the Lord and serve Him in truth with all your heart. For consider how great things He hath done for you" (I Samuel 12:24) was the text for President Dixon's commencement challenge.

Senior Class President Dave Dever from Westerville, Ohio, presented a unique class gift to President Dixon. Concerning their class project Devers stated, "As graduates beginning new careers, we have the potential to help the college meet the challenges of the future. Providing financial support as alumni is important if we are to insure Cedarville College's educational excellence." Wanting to do more than close out their class bank account, the seniors were encouraged by Dever to participate in the "Leave a Legacy" challenge. The class of 1984 sets a new precedent at Cedarville College by being the first graduating class to give from their abundance, in an organized fashion, for the needs of others. The challenge comes in the form of financially supporting an endowed scholarship, hence the title "Leave a Legacy."

We congratulate the seniors for their many accomplishments while at Cedarville, and challenge them to fulfill Paul's command to Timothy, "...commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also."

Social Science Department

The Social Science Department strives to aid students in understanding the origin of ideas and institutions and to gain a better perspective of the facts and interpretations of history, the functions of government, and the nature of society. The department also seeks to acquaint the student with the methods and tools of research and to provide an opportunity to conduct such investigations. Finally, the department aids the student in developing a Christian world-and-life view through the integration of biblical principles with the subject matter of the academic disciplines.

To accomplish these goals, the curriculum of the department has been carefully developed by strong faculty members who bring their own expertise to the fields of history, sociology, geography, and political science. J. Murray Murdoch, Ph.D., chairs the department and is responsible for U.S. History and related courses. In addition to coaching the college tennis team, Murdoch has authored *Portrait of Obedience: The Biography of Robert T. Ketcham.* Sandra Entner ('59), M.S., teaches courses dealing with social work and also assists the college counseling service. Joseph G. Halsey, M.Ed., is the instructor of American National Government and is currently researching his dissertation at the University of Cincinnati. James E. McGoldrick, Ph.D., offers his students the opportunity to investigate western civilization as well as

the history of Christianity and Great Britain. In addition to authoring two books, Luther's English Connection (1979) and Crucial Questions in Baptist History (forthcoming), he has published numerous articles on the Protestant Reformation. Allen L. Monroe, Ph.D., expends his energies (when not displaying his distinct culinary arts or coaching the golf team) in social science, geography, and political philosophy. Robert G. Parr, a former pastor, brings a thorough understanding of biblical principles to the discipline of sociology. Parr is presently engaged in doctoral study at The Ohio State University, focusing on social theory. Rex Rogers ('74), Ph.D., directs his students in the areas of public administration, urban politics, and research methods. Rogers, a former research consultant for the Institute for Policy Research, University of Cincinnati, also serves Cedarville College as the Director of Academic Computer Services.

The Social Science Department offers eight majors (American Studies, History, History/Political Science, Political Science, Prelaw, Public Administration, Social Science, and Sociology) to prepare students for further study and work in a number of fields such as archival work, law, foreign service, politics, professional writing and research, social work, and teaching.

The department also offers opportunities for internships and study tours which permit students to broaden their perspectives by better understanding their field of interest. These internships usually involve short-term placements with government agencies and staffs of elected officials, or research-oriented positions in libraries or archives. Study tours, which provide both credit and research opportunities, are conducted on a yearly basis.

Considering the breadth of knowledge encompassed by the curriculum and the strength of the faculty members, it is not surprising that this department prepares students for work in such a variety of occupations. However, one goal prevails: to prepare students to deal with the world around them from the perspective of a Christian world-and-life view based upon the integration of biblical principles and the subject matter of their academic disciplines.

Deaf Ministry challenges Webster

Keith Webster, a 1962 graduate of Cedarville College, became interested in a ministry with the deaf in 1971 when he visited the Bill Rice Ranch in Tennessee. Here at the world's largest summer camp ministry for the deaf, Keith learned basic sign language. Soon after that his wife was interpreting to their own congregation where Keith pastored.

Webster remembers "seeing the deaf people pray with their hands was a moving experience." As the Lord increased his desire to work with deaf people, the Websters stepped out in faith and left their church in Hagerstown, Maryland, to begin work at Oak Forest Baptist Temple in Illinois. Here they had access to the more than 10,000 deaf in the Chicago area. With the ministry to the deaf reaching a high attendance of

eighty-three, Keith began Signs for Living, a television program for the deaf which is broadcast in Pittsburgh and Detroit.

In 1981 Webster moved to Temple Deaf College in Peoria, Illinois, where he now serves as executive vice-president. Temple is the nation's only Bible college whose curriculum is designed exclusively for the deaf. Here, rather than interpreting classes, they are taught by instructors using "total communication," which Webster explains "is not just sign language but finger spelling, lip reading, pantomime and facial expression." In addition to offering courses for the deaf in science, math, English, grammar, reading, speech, finance, general psychology, physical education, and choir, Temple also offers a program in which hearing people are prepared for working with the deaf. Two of Temple's faculty members are deaf, and the remaining faculty and staff are required to know sign language.

Keith shares Temple's motto; "Training the Deaf to Reach the Deaf." God is truly using this Cedarville College graduate to accomplish that goal for His glory.

Viscount Thurston, concert pianist from Columbus, Ohio, was featured in concert April 12 as part of the Artist Series. Thurston attended Julliard School of Music and received his bachelor and master degrees in piano performance from The Ohio State University.

"The Christian's Responsibility in Politics" was the theme of this year's In-Forum, held April 9-13. Rev. Jerry Falwell of Moral Majority, Inc., Mr. Samuel Ericsson of the Center for Law and Religious Freedom and the Christian Law Society, Dr. Paul Feinberg of Trinity Evangelical Divinity School, and Dr. Richard Mouw of Calvin College were the speakers.

Psychology professors Dr. Stanley Ballard and Dr. Charles Dolph ('74) conducted a Life Management Seminar on campus May 8 and 9. Self-esteem, assertiveness, and stress were the main topics addressed.

The Gregg Smith Singers, the Dayton Philharmonic Orchestra, and Nielson and Young (a piano duo) will be featured in the 1984-85 Artist Series.

Christine Wyrtzen presented a concert May 17 for the encouragement of family and friends.

McIntoshes return to the Pastorate

For over 23 years, both Mr. and Mrs. Richard McIntosh have been dedicated contributors to the programs and progress of Cedarville College. Although originally intending to continue here until retirement, they have recently committed themselves to a new ministry and will be leaving Cedarville in June.

Mr. McIntosh, presently Associate Professor of Bible, will be returning to the pastorate, a position he held for eight years before joining Cedarville's staff in September, 1960. He and his wife, Barbara, will serve full time at Bible Baptist Church, Kokomo, Indiana.

Mrs. McIntosh's involvement with Cedarville has been varied. After raising their four children, she worked from 1966-1970 in the post office, then as a clerk in the business office, and most recently she has been the director of academic records and registration.

Professor McIntosh stated that this change was the result of several occurrences and realizations. While traveling with the Australia team in 1979, he began to notice an inward desire toward a deeper involvement with a church family. One thing that stood out to him amidst the activity of the 80 scheduled concerts was the strong love and warmth shown by members of hosting churches.

Another influential factor has been his work with black pastors from all over southwest Ohio at Second Baptist Tabernacle in Wilmington, Ohio. Mr. McIntosh explained that these two experiences and time spent in Togo, West Africa, at a summer Bible Institute brought him to a strong realization that he missed the relationships and responsibilities of church growth and involvement.

Mr. McIntosh stated that he is looking forward to the full-time pastorate specifically because it will provide opportunities for more intense involvement with people. Here at Cedarville he has developed many close relationships with faculty and students, but he is planning to also enjoy people of all ages and the benefits of long-term relationships in his new position. He also said that although he has been able to speak in over 250 churches since he began working at Cedarville College, he now looks forward to the "steady, ongoing work...within a single church family."

Professor McIntosh has served in many capacities since 1960, beginning as dean of students for 10 years, and part-time English professor. At that time, the staff was limited and his responsibilites included such roles as disciplinarian, advisor for all sophomores and seniors, financial aid director, Christian service director, planning committee chairman and more.

Both Mr. and Mrs. McIntosh recognize the challenge of such a change. Both face the realization of a difficult departure because of "deep roots in the college, the community, and church."

Overall, the couple anticipates the dramatic change in roles with caution and courage, but as Mrs. McIntosh stated, Proverbs 3:5 and 6 offer them confidence in God's guidance and strength.

Youngman heads for China

After eight years as Director of Campus Activities, Myron Youngman is leaving Cedarville to embark upon a new career. Joining with the Educational Services Exchange with China (ESEC) Agency, he will be assigned a position as instructor of English at one of the universities in China.

Youngman graduated from Cedarville in 1976 with a major in pre-seminary Bible. At Cedarville he participated in several dramatic productions. In addition to acting, he tried his hand in student directing and other "behind the scenes" jobs. While pursuing a major in architectural design at Iowa State University near his hometown, New Providence, Iowa, he gained background for the graphic work he performed as director of campus activities. He explains that experiences he had while he was a student helped to prepare him for his responsibilities. Myron's creativity has been appreciated at variety shows, Prism concerts, at campus banquets, and in the coordination of the Artist Series. His talents are also evidenced by his work on the college activities calendar, and in various tabloids, including the Sting publication. Looking back over his years, Youngman believes his work with the variety shows has been most memorable.

In retrospect, Youngman said that if he could change anything, he would have strived for more people-oriented as opposed to task-oriented work. "That is why I am excited about China. I will have more control of my time and become more people-oriented." He is quick to point out that traveling to China three times with the summer Missionary Internship program and leading the team in 1983 had a great impact upon him in his decision to return. Myron stated, "The Lord has given me a love for the Chinese and now an opportunity to develop some personal relationships." In the future, Myron plans to continue working in a university with the Chinese people and being involved in the performing arts. Eventually, his dream includes "landing a university position in Hong Kong."

When Curtis Hoke graduated from Cedarville in June 1983 he, like all seniors, had many hopes for the future. He and his fianceé Carol Stoltzfus were looking forward to an August wedding, but the events of July 31, 1983, dramatically changed the direction his life would take.

A math major at Cedarville, Curt was active in campus government. A member of Pi Delta and Student Senate, he served as Student Body President his junior year and Student Body Project Chairman his senior year. He was also involved in an off-campus outreach to the Hospitality Home West, a nursing care facility in Xenia.

On July 31, Curt was swimming near his home. Diving into the water, he struck someone swimming under water. When Curt arrived at the hospital, doctors determined his neck had been broken, and the hospital became his home for the next seven months. He found himself in a wheelchair with partial use of his hands and arms.

Although Curt admits the adjustments he has made since the accident have been frustrating at times, he speaks much more readily of the "incredible chances" his handicap has given him to minister. He is most thankful that his father has become a believer through the events of the past year, and that he has had "numerous opportunities to witness" of his faith in Jesus Christ.

Through months of therapy and rehabilitation, Curt recounts he "has come in contact with a number of people... nurses, therapists, assistants" whom he would never have met otherwise. Since he requires assistance in performing many daily tasks, he has to be with someone almost all the time. Through this constant contact with others, Curt has repeatedly shared his faith in Christ and his unswerving confidence in the wise providence and sovereignty of God in his life.

Curt is currently studying computer programming at the University of Pennsylvania. He will complete his coursework in February and then hopes to secure employment and to set another date for his wedding.

A key to the independence for which Curt is preparing will be a specially equipped van which he can operate. While the State of Pennsylvania will equip the van for his use, Curt must purchase the vehicle.

Through the initiative of a classmate and friend, Mark Pinkerton, a special Curtis Hoke Van Fund has been established at Curt's home church, Calvary Baptist, 543 Randolph Street, Meadville, Pennsylvania 16335. Friends of Curt and Carol who wish to have a part in their ministry may do so through this fund.

Curt, we admire you for your commitment to Christ and your courage during this time of recuperation. We pray for God's blessing upon your endeavors.

Walker steps into...

The present dean of men, Dick Walker, is looking forward to a new position at Cedarville in the fall of 1984...that of director of campus activities.

An accounting graduate of Bowling Green State University in Bowling Green, Ohio, Walker served a term in the Navy before coming to Cedarville College in 1970. He notes that he "originally came to take classes, but also applied for the position of student activities director."

Having enjoyed eight years' work in summer camp programs, Walker intended to go to seminary after taking classes at Cedarville in order to work full time in a camp ministry. His call to work with young people was first actualized in his first year at Cedarville when he was placed in charge of the intramurals program and was the manager of the Snack Shop. In 1971 he became the assistant student activities director and head resident of the Cedar Park dormitory complex.

In the summer of 1972 Walker became the assistant food service director, his first full-time employment at Cedarville. In November of that year, while remaining head resident at Cedar Park, he transferred his responsibilities to that of campus activities director. He remembers the day well: that night, a 90-piece orchestra had been scheduled to perform a classical concert in Alford Auditorium. The guest conductor arrived, slapped his hand against his head, and moaned that the orchestra would never fit on the stage of Alford. Walker did some quick rearranging, and the concert began only five minutes late in the old gymnasium. In the fall of 1975 he replaced Mr. Robert Burkett as the dean of men. He moved out of Cedar Park that year but remained the campus activities di-

rector until 1976. His assistant that year was Myron Youngman.

For the past nine years, Walker has enjoyed immensely his position as dean of men. "The thing that has made the position the most meaningful," he reminisces, "has been meeting graduates and noting the development in the men's lives after they leave campus. I am grateful to see how God has worked in their lives."

He feels that the length of time he has been the dean of men has been beneficial, giving him a "healthier perspective" toward students. He anticipates continued contact with the student body; his goal is to increase the number of students he will get to know. He has a great interest in programming and would like to "maintain the quality programs that Myron has developed. He adds that there will be "no significant departure from what Myron has done; I will just approach things from a different perspective." This new perspective will be seen in the months to come as Dick slips on already familiar shoes.
