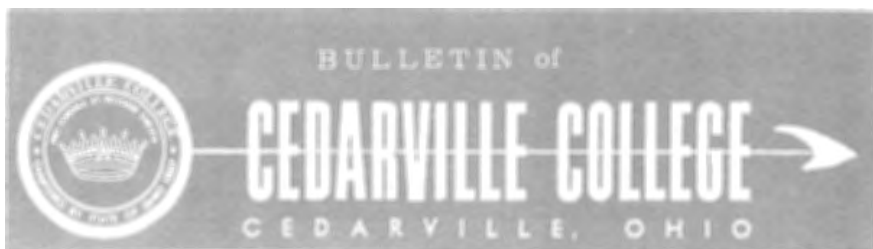

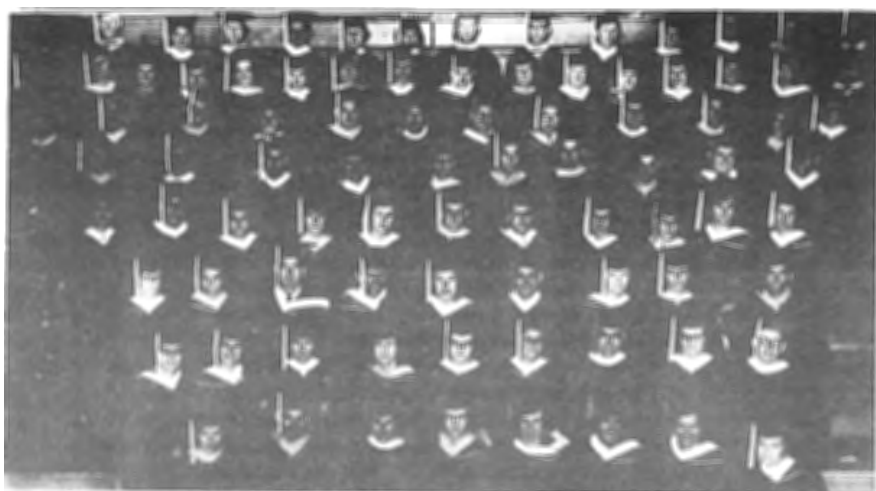

## CLASS OF 1965

On May 29 degrees were awarded to 92 seniors, the largest class ever graduated from the college. Commencement activities were presided over by Dr. James T. Jeremiah, president of the college. An audience of approximately 1,000 was present to hear the commencement speaker, Dr. John F. Walvoord, president of Dallas Theological Seminary, Dallas, Texas.

Questionnaires answered by 51 of the graduating seniors reveal that their vocations will be as follows: 17 are going into full-time Christian work, 7 of these plan to attend seminary, some are going directly into the ministry, and others into Christian education, missionary service, etc.; 18 plan to be teachers, 9 in elementary education and 9 in secondary education; 2 plan to go into radio work; 2 into social work; 2 in accounting; and others into secretarial work, nursing, industry, etc.

Our prayers go with these young people as they make their contribution to the Lord's work.

Dear Friends:

On May 29, 92 seniors received degrees at our 69th Commencement. This was the largest graduating class in our history.

Vacation time is here! Some of the students will remain for summer school. The maintenance department will be making some changes in our buildings. A number of our faculty will be working on higher degrees. This does not sound like a vacation, but for most of our students, it is.

Before September, we must add 40 rooms to Faith Hall. This is a project which must be rapidly put into operation. The architect is preparing working drawings for the new library so that construction can begin as soon as the funds are available. We hope this building can be started by January 1966.

Seven hundred or more students are expected when classes begin on September 14. The campus will be crowded, but we are anxious to help as many Christian young people as possible, so we are "stretching" our facilities. My, how we need that new library!

Two teams will be visiting the churches this summer. I sincerely hope you can hear one of them present the gospel in music. They will be presenting a slide story of the college which will be most informative.

Thank you so much for your interest in our college. Without our many friends and the blessing of God, this Christian education responsibility would be an impossibility.

## Degree Conferred



Miss Ruth Hege was awarded the doctor of humanities degree in recognition of 28 years of faithful service in missionary endeavor.

The last seven years of Miss Hege's missionary experience were spent in the Congo, from which she was evacuated on February 2, 1964, because of terrorists' attacks. Her co-worker, Miss Irene Ferrel, was martyred by a terrorist's arrow, and Miss Hege also was wounded and left for dead.

Miss Hege has recently written a book entitled "We Two Alone" relating her personal account of the experience in troubled Africa.

While conferring the degree, Dr. Jeremiah said, "There are eternal rewards for the people of God who have faithfully served Him. Obedience to His Word and call bring the assurance of eternal commendation, but also deserve recognition in time."

## Trustees Approve Two Building Projects

During the commencement exercises, Dr. George Milner, chairman of the board of trustees, announced that the trustees had authorized an addition to Faith Hall, a women's dormitory, and set January 1966 for the start of construction on the new \$300,000 library.

The addition to Faith Hall will accommodate 80 women students and will be ready for use in September of this year.

## New Alumni Officers

The alumni attended a banquet on May 29 after the graduation exercises. Dr. Clifford Johnson, Dean of the College, spoke on "Academician and the Alumni."

The treasurer, Stuart Chaffe, informed the alumni that giving had increased from approximately \$1,033 in 1963-64 to nearly \$1,827 in 1964-



65, and \$1,500 had been given to the college to help finance the 30-minute color, sound film. The alumni had previously voted to accept the film as a project.

The film, costing \$4,000, will be entitled "Higher than Higher Education" and will contrast the Christ-centered curriculum at Cedarville with the secular college.

### Campaign Report

During the last chapel service of the school year, the students presented Dr. Jeremiah with a check for \$1,000 for the library. After student council president Ron McDugle made the presentation, Dr. Jeremiah said that he realized this represented a great deal of sacrifice on the part of the students and that he would be happy to see the "student body of 1965" engraved on the bronze plaque to be erected inside the new library.



In order to raise the \$300,000 needed to build the library, the college challenged 300 churches and individuals to give \$1,000 each. The names of these donors will be engraved on an honor plaque inside the new library.
