ADDITION STARTED





Construction is well under way on a \$127,000 addition to Faith Hall. Presently, the dormitory houses 70 girls, but an additional 80 girls can be accommodated when the 40-room addition is completed.

The project will be ready by the fall semester. This additional facility will allow us to accommodate an anticipated enrollment of 700 students. The college decided to delay the building of a three-story, \$350,000 women's dormitory until next year. The addition to Faith Hallwill serve as an adequate substitute until the new women's dormitory can be constructed.

This summer the administration building will undergo many changes for the better. The exterior will be sandblasted and repointed. The north and south entrances to the building will be remodeled to include aluminium glass doors, pillars supporting balconies, and the east doorway to the building will be closed.

The old cafeteria building is now being converted for use as a post office and print shop. After the post office and print shop are transferred from the administration building, space will be available for additional staff offices.



Dear Friends:

In our last message to you, we mentioned that the addition to Faith Hall must be ready by September. Construction is under way now, and we are assured by the contractor that the building can be occupied by the opening of the fall semester.

It is impossible for me to stress as emphatically as I desire the absolute necessity for our new library. With a student body of 700 trying to use a library built for 225, we are facing a problem which can be solved in only one way: WE MUST BUILD A NEW LIBRARY.

Every attempt will be made to begin construction of this library by January of 1966. It will cost \$300,000, but by that time we will have slightly more than \$100,000 if all the commitments are met.

Many friends of Cedarville College are to be congratulated for the way they have responded to the library appeal. Many have sacrificed in order to contribute to this cause. We are most grateful and thank all of you for your many gifts to the Library Fund.

From a human standpoint, \$300,000 is an impossible sum, but no more so than the \$100,000 appeared when we started. The solution to the problem is "God is able." Will you, with me, claim the promise of Jeremiah 33:3, "Call unto Me, and I will answer thee, and show thee great and mighty things, which thou knowest not." What seems to be impossible with man, is surely not impossible with God.

CAMPUS NEWS

Ninety students registered for summer school that started June 7 and ended July 16.

Dr. Clifford Johnson, Academic Dean, was encouraged over the success of this year's summer school. The 90 students enrolled represent a healthy increase over the 56 that registered last year. A variety of 25 courses were offered by 12 faculty members participating in this session.

Dr. Johnson also reported that applications now being processed reveal that enrollment for the beginning of the fall semester should total approximately seven hundred.

TWO TEAMS ON TOUR

Two traveling teams are representing the college this summer among our churches. The Royal-Heirs Trio started their tour on June 13 which will extend through August 14. Most of their engagements will be concentrated in the Midwest, including Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia.

The Heralders, a boys trumpet trio, are concentrating most of their ministry in the East. The tour began on June 14 and will end August 17. They will be visiting the following states: Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Michigan, New York, Connecticut, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Virginia.

Many churches visited by the teams have already expressed appreciation for the rich spiritual ministry brought to their people by these groups.
