Alumni Council Report

Alumni Directory: Printing target date is March. The slow response to the alumni questionnaire prompted a second mailing. All the data has been updated on the computer. Alumni are still encouraged to send in their questionnaires if they have not already done so.

Scholarship Funds Update: The December scholarship fund appeal generated \$4,135.87 plus an additional \$1,061 to come from matching gifts. More than 100 of the specially designed Christmas tree ornaments were distributed. The fund's balance has exceeded \$41,000.

The John W. Bickett Heritage Scholarship Fund: The recent appeal generated \$1,590 from more than 20 responses.

MK Loan/Grant Fund: This fund was established by alumni to assist worthy MKs in their education here at Cedarville College. Several alumni have responded. The Financial Aid Office is distributing the monies in the form of low interest loans.

Enrich Your Life

Enlightening? Encouraging? Economical?...The Summer Enrichment Conference? How can a conference fulfill all of these roles? Can it really fulfill these purposes in the lives of alumni?

"The fifth annual Summer Enrichment Conference, designed for alumni and friends, will enrich the lives of participants spiritually and educationally," states Stu Walker ('71), member of the conference planning committee. Dr. Duane Gish, associate director of the Institute for Creation Research in San Diego, California, will be the keynote speaker, addressing the theme, "Beginnings." Dr. Gish received a B.S. degree in chemistry from the University of California at Los Angeles in 1949. He received his Ph.D. from the University of California, Berkeley, in 1953, majoring in biochemistry. From 1953-1955, he was a Lilly Postdoctoral Fellow in the Natural Sciences at Cornell University Medical College, New York City, and in 1956, he held the position of assistant professor of biochemistry at that institution.

In the fall of 1956, Dr. Gish joined the research staff of the virus laboratory of the University of California, Berkeley. From 1960 to 1971, Dr. Gish was a member of the research staff of the Upjohn Company, a pharmaceutical firm in Kalamazoo, Michigan, where he was a research associate in the Department of Hypersensitive Diseases Research.

For many years, Dr. Gish's avocation had been the study of the scientific evidence related to the question of creation versus evolution theory. In the fall of 1971, he resigned his position with the Upjohn Company to devote full time to this work. He thoroughly enjoys his position as associate director of the Institute for Creation Research.

Dr. Gish's messages will defend the Bible and creation and will expose evolution in the light of scientific evidence. Gish has researched, published articles, and lectured extensively on this subject. The conference is designed to answer crucial questions by furnishing Biblical insight to these contemporary topics.

Gish will speak to conference participants in at least two sessions each day. A short coffee break is scheduled between the morning sessions. During the sessions, complete nursery care will be available and the older children will participate in their own program featuring the Master's Puppets.

The Summer Enrichment Conference will enrich the lives of alumni socially and recreationally. Fellowship with friends and faculty, recall the "way it was" and rejoice in the "way it is." God has blessed Cedarville College and the evidence of those blessings will uplift your heart. Social activities will focus around the theme and include field trips, nature hikes, and films. In addition, the afternoons are free for recreation. Cedarville and the surrounding area have facilities for swimming, fishing, golf, tennis, and racquetball. Other activities that can occupy the afternoons are shopping, visiting nearby state parks and museums, and enjoying a leisurely stroll.

The Summer Enrichment Conference began five years ago for alumni. Because of the expressed interest of other college constituents, the conference is available to all interested persons.

A Look Inside the Biblical Education Department

One hundred fifty Bible majors, one thousand six hundred fifty non-Bible majors, and twelve dedicated Bible professors are bonded together at Cedarville College. The Biblical Education Department chairman, Robert Gromacki, states the objectives of the department: "to provide an undergraduate education for those who are planning on going into the ministry as a career...[and] to provide a foundation in the Word of God, whereby the non-Bible majors will be able to integrate Scripture in their lives and various careers." All graduates of Cedarville have at least a Bible minor. The department offers a pre-seminary major, as well as a comprehensive Bible major which enables the student to go straight into the ministry by providing three emphases: pastoral, missions, and Christian education. The pre-seminary course of study provides a student with a wide range of subject matter before three or more years of seminary. As the catalog of a well-known evangelical seminary states..."It is generally agreed that the best preparation for theological study is a broad program including work in the major fields of the humanities and sciences." Such a broad program is available at Cedarville. The department offers minors in Greek, philosophy, and Christian education, and has not only added courses in systematic theology, but has also extended Hebrew into a full school year.

Robert Gromacki received a Th.M. from Dallas Theological Seminary and Th.D. from Grace Theological Seminary. Dr. Gromacki came to Cedarville in 1960, becoming department chairman in 1967. He is not only an active conference speaker and supply preacher, but also author of twelve books, articles, and Sunday school material.

Jean Fisher has taught at Cedarville since 1956, the same year she earned her M.A. from Wheaton College. She writes primary curriculum for Regular Baptist Press and coordinates Christian education workshops. In 1977 she received the Honorary Alumnus Award.

Jack Riggs, author of youth and adult Sunday school material and a recent book, *Hosea's Heartbreak*, earned his Th.D. from Dallas Theological Seminary in 1968 just before coming to Cedarville.

Richard Durham, Th.D., received his degree from Grace Theological Seminary in 1981. He served as a missionary in the Philippines for 23 years and was president of Baptist Bible Seminary and Institute in Manila. He is active as a supply preacher and has been advisor for Fellowship for World Missions since coming to Cedarville.

Donald Parvin received his M.Div. degree from Faith Theological Seminary in 1957. He pastored for 24 years, is on the A.B.W.E. Advisory Council, and directs the pastoral internship program. Mr. Parvin will be returning to the pastorate next year after nine years at Cedarville.

David Warren ('64) received his Th.M. degree from Dallas Theological Seminary. Before coming to Cedarville in 1980, Mr. Warren served for seven years as a pastor and four years in Bible college teaching. He is an active supply preacher.

Gary Percesepe ('75), who will receive his Ph.D. this year from St. Louis University, has been assistant professor of philosophy at Cedarville since 1983.

Daniel Estes ('74) received his Th.M. from Dallas Theological Seminary in 1977. He served as assistant pastor for seven years at the Clintonville Baptist Church in Columbus, Ohio, where he ministered to the students attending Ohio State University. He is now working on his doctoral dissertation on the topic of Hebrew genre. This is Mr. Estes' first year as assistant professor.

Floyd Elmore ('77) will join the college faculty next year. Presently, he is earning his Th.D. from Dallas Theological Seminary and teaches Bible and missions at Dallas Bible College. Since Elmore served as a missionary in South America under Baptist Mid-Missions, he will also be a valuable asset to Cedarville in the area of missions.

Four part-time faculty complete the department: Harold R. Green, Irene W. Parvin, William Wheeler, and Byron Shearer ('68).

The department has other duties that aid students. It provides theological interest among students through the annual Staley Distinguished Christian Lecture Program and works closely with the Placement Office to find suitable opportunities for ministry.

Gromacki believes that the Biblical Education Department can train individuals adequately in the area of missions and encourages students to consider short-term service in the missionary internship program.

The Biblical Education Department attempts to build into the lives of all 1800 Cedarville students. Each departmental member is qualified and committed to fulfilling the college theme verse, II Timothy 2:2, by teaching faithful students so that they will be able to teach others also.

Cedarville College offers children of alumni a free headstart in college life. These select students have the opportunity of attending Cedarville College the summer before their senior year of high school. Ten free credit hours of general education courses are available each summer to qualifying students, who can also take up to ten additional credit hours at the summer school discounted rate. The students usually begin with communication courses such as Grammar and Syntax, or Fundamentals of Speech. Then they can choose from other freshman level courses such as Introduction to Humanities, Principles of Biology, U.S. History, and New Testament Survey.

Such a program can be advantageous to a future college student. Elaine Gardner, a participant of this program and now a freshman at Cedarville, expressed how she profited from this program. "When I came to Cedarville this fall as a freshman, I felt at ease about meeting people and did not feel like a 'lost freshman' as many students do. Knowing most of the rules, being familiar with many of the professors, and having had a previous opportunity to experience the workload helped greatly to ease the adjustment of college life. I found that I was more excited about college during my last year of high school than my peers because I already had a little taste of it".

A few preliminaries and requirements come with the Alumni Children's Program. The first and foremost stipulation is that at least one parent be a graduate of Cedarville College. The student must have a minimum grade point average of 2.5 and be in the upper 25th percentile of his/her class. A written statement by his/her guidance counselor must confirm that he/she is mature enough for college academics.

Why has Cedarville College decided to fund such a program? The answer is simple. Cedarville College wants to express appreciation to alumni for their support through the years. The administration wants to do something to show alumni that they are still an integral part of the college even though distanced by miles.

Dr. Edward Greenwood, the man behind it all, has spent four years planning, preparing, and operating the program, which already has benefited ten families. Throughout the year he makes arrangements for summer school and works with the administration lining up courses, trying to get the best possible program. He switches from a professor during the school year to planning chapel speakers, taking care of payroll, handling forms of recommendation, heading an advisory board of eight, and assuming the position of summer school administrator. As a graduate of Cedarville College, your child can earn free college credit and experience life on a Christian campus.

His Enthusiasm Shines Through

Rev. Harry Sinks

From his college cheerleading days in the late 1930's to cheering in the special Homecoming chapel service, Harry Sinks has lost no energy. This man's zeal for life inspires everyone that he meets.

Harry's energetic life began in China while his parents were missionaries. When he was still quite young, his family returned to the States where his father pastored several churches. Because of his father's strong influence and God's leading through a nearly fatal accident, Harry chose the ministry as a fulltime vocation.

After graduation from Arcanum High School, Harry entered Cedarville College, which was at that time a small Presbyterian school with about 150 students. His four years at Cedarville were packed with activity. He traveled with a gospel team, volunteered at a nearby hospital, led cheers at the football games, and collected live snakes and alligators. In his spare time he completed his studies! In 1938 Harry graduated with a double major in science and history and a minor in English.

Bonebrake Seminary (now United Theological Seminary) in Dayton, Ohio, was the next step in his education. After he graduated with a Bachelor's of Divinity degree, he and his new wife Harriet began a church planting ministry in the Appalachian Mountains of Kentucky. While Harriet worked as a nurse in the local hospital, Harry pastored the churches. Together they shared the blessing of building four churches. Mr. and Mrs. Sinks then returned to Ohio where Harry has since been the pastor of five different churches.

Today the Sinks live at the Otterbein Home, a senior citizen's village in Lebanon, Ohio. Although he officially retired in 1978, Harry remains very active. He leads the daily devotionals, plans activities such as shopping trips or other outings, and occasionally teaches Sunday School for the residents of the home. Also, as a member of the pulpit supply, he preaches in area churches almost every Sunday. In his free time Harry still enjoys snake hunting and cheerleading.

During the homecoming activities in 1983, Harry enthusiastically performed a cheerleading routine much to the delight of the Cedarville College student body. "When you're up, you're up; when you're down, you're down; but when you're up against Cedarville, you're upside down." Harry visits the campus frequently and recently had these comments, "I am pleased that my alma mater continues to grow" and "I am very much impressed by the depth of the Bible and Christian living emphasis. It is just outstanding."

Whatever he does, whether preaching God's Word, snake hunting, or leading cheers, Harry does it with enthusiasm. It is rare to find people with such zest for life. Harry explains his energy very simply: "To keep active in the fields that you're most interested in, and to be overly interested in the things of the Lord creates enthusiasm...to love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, thy mind, and thy soul – that's the energizing part!"

Magna Cum Laude

"With great distinction" John N. Murray served his Creator, his country, his community, and his college.

John died October 19, 1984. The twinkly-eyed Scotsman, better known as "Jock", had organized the golden reunion of the class of 1934 and had returned to his alma mater to celebrate.

For more than 35 years John was involved in public education in the Randolph, Vermont, area. He began as a French and Latin instructor, advanced to principal for ten years, and served as superintendent for 14 more years before retiring in 1969.

Murray's fervent belief in education can be linked to the fact that his own came the hard way. Working three years after high school gave him enough "seed money" to enter a little college in southwestern Ohio, referred to him by his pastor who was a "close friend" to Dr. McChesney, the president of that college. In spite of working during his college days Jock graduated magna cum laude and then received his master's degree from the University of Vermont.

A long standing member of the First Presbyterian Church of Graniteville, Jock was a former deacon there. He was an active member of the Randolph Senior Citizens Center and the Rotary Club. The latter organization recognized him for his sacrificial and exemplary service to his fellow man. In

1969 he received the Community Service Award and in 1980 the Rotarian Citizen of the Year Award. During World War II he served as a captain in the Vermont State Guard, and for many years he was associated with the Green Mountain Boys' State program. John worked closely with state officials to create the first union school district in Vermont, a union which resulted in Randolph Union High School. His leadership also resulted in a junior high school building with a separate gymnasium and auditorium which was named in his honor.

Jock leaves a wife, Avis, whom he married in 1936, a son Donald and two granddaughters.

Jock's enthusiasm and love for his alma mater is evidenced by the way he served it, magna cum laude.
