NEW RECORD ATTENDANCE

The Cedarville College family is excited about the prospects of the 1965-66 school year, which promises to be the greatest year in the history of the school. The 760 young people attending Cedarville this year represent a 25 per cent increase over the record attendance of 603 last year.

To accommodate the additional students, new dormitories have been built and our faculty increased. Articles in this issue by Dr. Clifford Johnson, Academic Dean, and Mr. Richard McIntosh, Dean of Students, will bring you up to date on new faculty members, dormitories, and staff.

In addition to the more than a third of a million dollars spent on new dormitories, many existing facilities have been remodeled and improved. The administration building took on a new look when the exterior was sandblasted and repointed. The north and south doorways were replaced with aluminum glass doors. The east doorway to the building was closed and the trim painted. The old cafeteria building was converted for use as a post office and print shop. This transfer provided space for additional staff offices. (See pictures on page 3)

Athletic facilities have been enhanced by the addition of two new softball fields west of the soccer field. A new heating plant was installed in the science building, driveways have been widened, and many new sidewalks added. Alford Memorial Auditorium has been enhanced with the addition of draperies and a new pulpit. A combination of hard work by the maintenance department and an abundance of summer rain from the Lord have added a plush green carpet of grass to our campus. To all this we can say with the Psalmist "This is the Lord's doing, and it is marvelous in our eyes."

We believe that the Lord has led each one of our students to Cedarville and covet your prayers that the faculty and staff may have the wisdom and strength to meet the challenge of training these young people.

NEW PUBLICATION

Our former four-page bulletin that was printed monthly has been enlarged to a six-page paper that will be published every two months. This new format will enable us to report in depth news of the College and keep our churches and friends better informed.

GOD GIVES THE INCREASE

Working FOR God is one thing; working WITH Him is quite another. He who serves merely as an employee of the Lord must expect only to receive due credit for his labors and nothing more. Present joy in being a co-laborer with Him is thus of small significance.

The Corinthians, like so many Christians today, were arguing as to which religious union they would support. Some were "Paulinians" while others were "Apollonians." (1 Corinthians 3:4-6) Paul reminds us that such division is a mark of spiritual carnality.

What a difference we can observe when we serve as a shareholder in the Lord's work rather than a man on the payroll. "For we are laborers together with God." (I Corinthians 3:9) A person who is a part of the corporation will serve more sacrificially and joyfully than one who serves only for a salary. When we labor WITH Him we may be assured that "the giver of the increase is God."

Paul does not discount the responsibility of the Christian to work. He says, "I have planted, Apollos watered." It has been said that "There is one way to make dreams come true: wake up and go to work." Resting in and waiting upon the Lord are surely important spiritual qualities but no one should use them as excuses for spiritual laziness. One who has been saved by God's grace and thus has had an "inward experience" not only should, but most certainly will know an "outward expression" of God's love in service. But again, we must constantly remember that whatever is accomplished is done because it is God Who gives the increase. The little old lady who came to the parsonage door and handed the pastor a basket illustrated this principle when she said, "Here are some things the Lord and I raised."

During the past years we have been aware that God gives the increase. There have been many trustees, faculty members, students, pastors, and church members who have "planted and watered" but God has given the increase. Some of us can remember the prophets of gloom who predicted that the College would never make it this far. "But God" has opened doors for us when they were seemingly barred shut against us. He has provided a competent dedicated faculty and also sent to us capable students with a Christian testimony when it did not seem likely that either would be interested. He has supplied the finances for the operation and expansion of the College when the supply could have come from no other source. In it all we have been able to prove again that "man's extremity is God's opportunity."

Now, what about the future? With over 750 students enrolled this fall and the prospects for many more in the immediate years ahead, our faculty and expansion needs are humanly insurmountable. We are confident, however, that as ALL OF US faithfully do our gardening of "sowing and watering" God will give the increase. Will you join us right now and do all you can to make this new library a reality?

We hope it will be possible to begin construction of the new library in January of 1966. If you will join with us right now in prayer and sacrificial giving, this building will become a reality for the College year 1966-67.

NEW DORMITORIES AND STAFF

to replace Rife Hall which was lost in a fire on June 30. These apartments in the Cedar Park development provide housing for two married staff members and 133 men students. The total cost for the apartments and furnishings was approximately \$175,000. These apartments will be used eventually for housing married students.

Additions to the Student Personnel staff for the coming year include Mr. Stanley Ballard from Dallas, Texas, Dean of Men, who will be supervising Cedar Park in addition to counseling responsibilities; Mrs. Henry Bresson from Tippecanoe, Indiana, supervisor for Faith Hall; and Mrs. Edna Griffeth from Sturgis, Michigan, will serve as supervisor for Williams and Patterson Halls.

The Student Health Center has been relocated in more ample quarters at the east side of Faith Hall. Mrs. Jan Bonnema has been employed as a full-time college nurse with Miss Judy Tobias serving as relief nurse for evenings and weekends.

Mr. Earl Slabaugh of Elkhart, Indiana, has been employed as Campus Security officer who will have charge of student parking and night security.

Student Personnel Services have been centralized on the ground floor of the Administration Building. Offices are now provided for the Dean of Students, Dean of Men, Dean of Women, and secretarial services.

The lounge facilities in residence halls and the Student Center have been improved with the addition of new furnishings to provide better social settings for our growing student body.

Student Personnel Development

In an attempt to keep pace with the 25 per cent increase in enrollment, this year's expansion program has been focused on providing additional housing for resident students and appropriate supervision and counseling services.

An addition for accommodating 80 women has been made to Faith Hall at a cost of more than \$160,000 for building and furnishings. Included in these facilities are a large lobby, lounge, and a supervisor's apartment. The rooms are carpeted and feature built-in desks and chests of drawers and studio-type beds.

Seventeen apartment units located on a four-acre tract of ground on the south edge of Cedarville have been purchased from the Lankford Development Company to provide temporary housing facilities for men students. An additional four-unit apartment building has been constructed



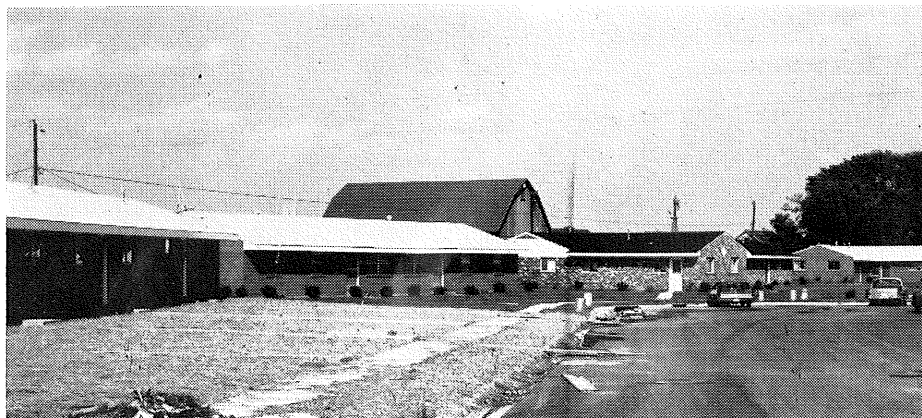

Rapidly increasing enrollment at Cedarville College has made it possible and necessary to add well-qualified faculty members in several academic areas. This increases the size of our faculty to a new high of 45.
