

\$25,000 CHALLENGE GRANT RECEIVED



The college recently received a \$25,000 grant from The Kettering Fund of Dayton, Ohio. Mr. Allen J. Martin made the presentation to Dr. James T. Jeremiah, President, and Rev. Lee C. Turner, Director of Development.

This is the largest gift ever received by the college The college has now received over \$46,000 from foundations and businesses this year.

Mr. Martin stressed that most of our support should come from our own constituency and that the grant was given to challenge our churches and friends of the college to participate in our "Fulfillment of Faith" program.

The "Fulfillment of Faith" program is an appropriate name for our ten-year master plan announced in this bulletin. By faith the Lord has supplied us with a fine college, and we are confident the Lord is going to complete the work He has started at Cedarville.

Our ten-year master plan is based on our past growth. In projecting our future needs, we have curtailed our potential enrollment in order to set obtainable goals. We feel it is our solemn duty to 1) plan for the future based upon our past, 2) share these plans with friends of the college, and 3) ask the Lord to burden the hearts of His people to help meet the need. If anyone is awed by our projected plans, he has only to look at what the Lord has done in the past and ask, "Will He do less in the future?"

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

Dear Friends:

Whenever we attempt a new, exciting, and overwhelming venture at Cedarville College, we invariably think of the children of Israel facing the crossing of the Jordan River. The officers elected to direct this great undertaking reminded the people that "Ye have not passed this way hereto fore." This was a new experience for them, even though they had faced similar problems before.

Since our college has had unusual and unexpected growth, we have faced over the past twelve years many different types of rivers that have had to be crossed. The obstacles were impassable and the victory appeared to be impossible, "But God" stepped in with His provision when we stepped out on faith. This is the explanation of what has been accomplished to this hour.


The "Fulfillment of Faith" program, outlined in this issue of our bulletin, is a continuation of the same policy which Cedarville has held through these years. These goals ahead of us are, as usual, like mountain ranges which must be overcome but we are confident that our God is One "Which removeth the mountains" (Job 9:5).

The first, and at the present time the most important objective before us, is the completion of the new library. Our loyal friends have contributed over \$181,500 to this project. It will take at least \$400,000 to complete the building and purchase the necessary equipment. The trustees have made arrangements to borrow the needed funds to meet this crucial need in our college program. Emphasis must be given, however, to the absolute necessity of repaying this money within the next five years. Appeals for the Library Building Program will continue as a part of our "Fulfillment of Faith" program.

Churches and individuals taking part in our "Fulfillment of Faith" program, by indicating that they will give \$1,000 to the Library Fund, will have their names inscribed on the library plaque. This will be done by the college if we have a sincere commitment that the money will be given in the months ahead. In other words, this can be a project which some can plan and bring to completion during the next five years if this much time is necessary.

Your prayerful interest in Cedarville College makes you a part of the "Fulfillment of Faith" program. You can do nothing until you have prayed about the needs at Cedarville, but you can do much more afterward. Will you give of your means, encourage your church to do likewise, and make the college known so that others, too, will have a practical part in the Christian education of our young people?

NOW UNDER CONSTRUCTION

The new 220-bed dormitory is being constructed by Southern Mill & Manufacturing of Tulsa, Oklahoma. The dormitory is not included in Phase One of our ten-year master plan because it is being financed by C. I. T. Financial Corporation of New

York and leased to the college. Rent is expected to pay off the debt in 15 years at which time the college will obtain title to he building.

The Wenrick Construction Company of Medway, Ohio, has the new library well under way. The 18,822 square foot library building itself will cost \$258,000. Furniture, streets, utilities, etc., will run the total cost to approximately \$400,000.

The cost of the library is included in Phase One of our "Fulfillment of Faith" program. Gifts received for the library now total \$181,500. We have made arrangements to borrow the rest of the needed funds on short-term notes

so that the library may be completed. However, the notes must be paid off within the next five years.

Although our needs projected in Phase One leave a balance of \$788,500 to be raised during the next five years, \$215,000 in gifts must be received to retire the debt on the library.

We are exercising our faith by planning for the young people who will be attending Cedarville in the future. Friends of the college are challenged to exercise their faith by asking the Lord what He will enable them to give toward our "Fulfillment of Faith" program.

The seminar program is related to many phases of national security.



David is scheduled to graduate this year from the college.




ASSISTANTSHIPS WON
