## 130 Graduate at 71st Annual Commencement



Approximately 750 relatives and friends viewed the largest graduating class in the history of Cedarville College receive their degrees May 27th at the 71st annual commencement service. Of the 130 graduates, 51 were presented with Cedarville's first elementary education certificates.

Dr. Herman A. Hoyt, president of Grace Theological Seminary and Grace College, delivered the commencement address on the topic "The Only Absolute and Its Consequent Implications." Dr. George S. Miller, past chairman of the board of trustees, received an Omega watch in appreciation for his many years of faithful service to the college and was made chairman emeritus of the trustee board.

Two long lines of human bookmobiles, maintaining a semblance of order, delivered the books to their new air-conditioned home. The library was in operation

the following day. Formal dedication will be conducted prior to the fall quarter.



More than half of the cost of construction and furnishing the new library was underwritten by numerous \$1000 donors including churches, individuals, businesses, and classes. A special plaque of commemoration will enhance the library entrance.

The old library will undergo partitioning and painting before becoming the fine arts building, housing the art and music departments.

## DEVELOPMENT NEWS



The new addition to our cafeteria is already under roof and should be in operation by the beginning of the fall quarter. Doubling the present seating capacity, this \$230,000, air-conditioned addition will allow 526 students to be seated at one time. Also, the new facility was designed to be converted to academic classrooms at a later date when the college builds a student-center cafeteria.

Included in the \$230,000 remodeling project is the conversion of the present overflow dining room in the cafeteria into offices for student officers. The two large classrooms on the second floor of the gym are also being remodeled into three air-conditioned classrooms.

The new addition to our cafeteria is being financed by the sale of bonds. The recent increase of interest rates on our bonds has been enthusiastically received. Friends of the college have invested a total of \$430,400 in our bonds. A wide selection of bond maturity dates are still available at the new interest rates of 5% for 1-5 years; 6% for 6-10 years; and 7% for 11-15 years. Anyone desiring more complete information can mail the coupon in this issue of the bulletin.

The next time you visit the campus you will see our exciting, new, air-conditioned library in operation. We rejoice in this milestone in the progress of the college. Gifts received from friends and churches now total \$244,000 toward the needed \$400,000. We are grateful for this fine response and are trusting the Lord for the needed additional \$156,000.

The college is celebrating its 80th anniversary this year. The next issue of the bulletin will share with you some of the college's past growth and its future goals.

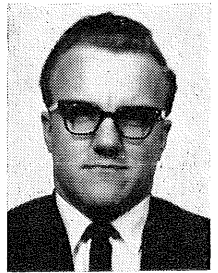
