Callan Reaches Milestone

Men's head basketball mentor Don Callan recently celebrated a milestone in his coaching career. This year's Jackets netted Callan his 400th coaching victory when they defeated Concordia on November 21.

Callan, who "came to stay" in Cedarville in 1960, attributes much of his success to a personal attitude of "stick-to-itiveness." The early years were difficult, but Dr. Jeremiah encouraged Callan and gave him the freedom to develop the athletic program the College knows today. "We've come a long way," says Callan, who ascribes his success with the athletic program, particularly the basketball team, to the quality athletes who have been recruited.

Callan encourages spiritual as well as physical development of each of his players. In 1969 he expressed his desire that students should be able to experience missions in a personal way. He and campus pastor Harold Green then formulated what is today known as M.I.S., Missionary Internship Service. Callan urges all his ball players to participate in the M.I.S. program.

Callan models a desire to serve God. He cited chapel services as "a special time of the week," and that which has had the greatest impact during his 28 years at Cedarville.

To commemorate Callan's 400th victory, many former players sent letters of appreciation and congratulations which were compiled into a notebook and presented to Coach

Callan at the alumni basketball game. Also, the signature of each of Callan's basketball athletes was reproduced on a table built to celebrate the 400th victory.

"Coaching at Cedarville has been a great experience for me," says Callan. The table and notebook will long serve as a reminder of win number 400 and the men who helped him achieve it. Callan, Lord willing, plans to remain at Cedarville and persevere through his 500th victory.



Ledarville College seeks to help each student develop his or her academic potential. Many students are currently assisted through seminars in study skills, through flexibility in their course of study, or through tutoring. And now, through the honors education program, gifted students will be challenged to realize their full potential for the glory of God.

Dr. Gary Percesepe '75, assistant professor of philosophy and director of the honors program, has been developing this program since 1985. Other faculty members have contributed ideas, and several have attended National Collegiate Honors Council conventions to learn how other honors programs are conducted and to share with consultants the curricular model Cedarville has adopted.

The honors program is not a major, but rather a series of specially designed courses that will enrich the present curriculum. Percesepe states that these courses will be "rigorous and demanding, challenging students to aspire to higher things in the world of ideas." He emphasizes that the honors program must encourage spiritual honor among the participating students and faculty and never degenerate into an elitist group separate from the rest of the College.

Admission to the program for entering freshmen is based on ACT/ SAT scores, written essay, personal interview, and G.P.A. Students accepted into the program will complete seven honors courses capped by a senior research project or thesis. Three of these courses will be taken in the freshman year in a sequence known as The Making of the Modern Mind, which will focus on the history of western civilization, tracking the development of philosophic, literary, scientific, and aesthetic traditions.

In the sophomore and junior years, honor students will take a total of four Honors Integrative Seminars. Each seminar will be taught by two or three faculty members from different academic departments who have explicitly expressed interest in teaching an honors seminar. This type of team teaching affords the honor student a true interdisciplinary approach to the topic of study.

The first of these seminars, Sociology of Sport, was taught winter quarter by Michael DiCuirci, associate professor of music; Kurt Moreland '76, assistant professor of communication arts; and Percesepe. The course explored the thesis that baseball is a paradigm for social change in America and addressed issues such as a theology of play, recreating as an aspect of the image of God in man, the need for myth in the social life of man, baseball's

peculiar hold on American culture, and the highly nuanced literature that has recently been written by sports journalists. Several guests were invited to address the class, including Roger Kahn (author of The Boys of Summer), Mike Schmidt of the Philadelphia Phillies, and Gordy Coleman and Marty Brenneman representing the Cincinnati Reds.

The senior year will see the honor student involved in a year-long tutorial relationship with a faculty member, preparing a project/thesis in his major field of study. At commencement the honor student will receive a diploma with appropriate recognition of the honors status.

Having the honors program conveys to the general public and Christian community that at Cedarville College superior scholarship is highly regarded and encouraged. The program provides opportunity for a more thorough integration of the various disciplines, and gives the student an opportunity to better understand how all knowledge relates to its source. Percesepe summarizes: "Honors offers an adventure in the world of ideas, coupled with practical incentives for transcribing faith and learning into larger culture for the glory of God, and the benefit of men and women in His image."



Dear Alumnus,

I trust that you feel a real sense of joy and gratitude to God for His blessings on your alma mater during the Centennial Campaign. I'd like to take this opportunity to share with you some specifics of His provision, particularly how He met our needs through the generosity of alumni.

The Campaign for the Centennial Library was completed on schedule at the end of January, 1988. Well over 1900 individuals participated with commitments ranging from \$1 to \$350,000, and over 600 of these contributors were alumni.

Two special grants offered at important points during the Campaign were especially significant. The first was targeted to alumni which matched gifts given by alumni during the last six months of 1986. We are most grateful for the support of alumni as you exceeded your \$150,000 goal by \$28,000. The second was a challenge grant from College friends promising the final \$350,000 needed to complete the Library if all other commitments reached \$4.0 million by January 31, 1988. On February 1, I had the pleasure of announcing in chapel that God had provided the funds and we had reached the goal.

Alumni also contributed to other aspects of the Centennial Campaign: the Annual Fund goal was surpassed by \$241,000, and an additional \$1.1 million was added to the College endowment fund with \$1 million of that amount targeted for student scholarships and other forms of financial aid. Alumni have responded generously through Torch Club, Charter Society, President's Associates, and the Alumni Phonothon.

I want you to know how grateful I am for your continuing support and prayers for Cedarville College. We have significant plans for the future which I believe will give you a growing sense of satisfaction with your alma mater.

Please visit campus often. Let us know how we can serve you. We love you and pray God's best for you.

CDR 25 Years on the Air

In 1962, while Americans were celebrating significant achievements in the nation's infant space program, many at Cedarville College were excited about the birth of a new radio station. WCDR's first broadcast came at 7:30 p.m. on December 1 live from Winona Lake, Indiana basketball contest against Grace College.

Through the encouragement of Dr. James T. Jeremiah, the station was launched by classmates Paul Gathany '63 and David Jeremiah '63. Gathany stayed at Cedarville College following his graduation to manage WCDR and is currently general manager. Jeremiah, pastor of Scott Memorial Baptist Church in El Cajon, California, hosts Turning Point, a program heard daily on WCDR. The station began broadcasting with only 10 watts of power from the third floor of what is now Founders Hall, with programming focused on the biblical truth found in Isaiah 26:3, "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose MIND IS STAYED ON THEE..." As WCDR celebrates its 25th anniversary this year it continues that spiritual focus.

In celebration of the anniversary approximately 50 former WCDR employees and students gathered during Homecoming 1987 for an open house at WCDR's present location in the Communication Building. In addition, vocalist Robbie Hiner presented a concert in honor of the anniversary. All who were present enjoyed a piece of one of the 16 large "birthday" cakes baked especially for the occasion. Then in December the staff of WCDR presented a 30-minute radio drama of Charles Dickens' classic, A Christmas Carol, as an anniversary present to its listeners.

The staff of WCDR is celebrating not only 25 years of service this year, but also a ten-fold power increase to 30,000 watts. Gathany feels the increase will position the station for

the future, as WCDR now has the distinction of being the only Christian station to broadcast with a Grade A reliable signal to both Dayton and Springfield. A total of two million potential listeners are within a good listening range which encompasses the Cincinnati area.

What lies ahead? Gathany says he would like to take advantage of the new technology available in the industry to reach more areas with the Gospel. WCDR currently has four FM translators in operation which rebroadcast the signal from Cedarville to the cities of Chillicothe, Portsmouth, and Wheelersburg, Ohio. The first translator was installed in Richmond, Indiana, in 1985 and continues to provide quality Christian broadcasting to nearly 40,000 people who live in that area.

Currently, WCDR is waiting for the F.C.C. to approve an application to upgrade the service in Portsmouth to 3,000 watts. Gathany said he hopes to increase the power in the other translator areas as well, which will position WCDR as the flagship station of a new network. In anticipation of these opportunities, WCDR has recently changed its identity to "CDR Radio." This will enable the station to promote its ministry with a uniform approach in all cities which it serves.

Gathany commends his present staff of five full-time and seven part-time employees. Their dedication to the Lord is reflected in their work as they encourage listeners to increase their love for and service to the Lord. The future ministry of CDR Radio is in good hands.

Almost Like Home Cooking!

Do you remember the time you spent in the cafeteria during your college years—the laughter, the conversation, the practical jokes, reading your mail, cramming for an exam, developing relationships? What about the special banquets or the insightful discussions that influenced your way of thinking on a particular topic? Mealtime is much more than just a break for physical nutrition. It is a vital dimension of college life. This is particularly true at Cedarville College because the food service staff extends its responsibilities beyond that of preparing and serving food to caring for students much as they would care for their own families.


Pioneer Food Service, the company that has catered the College meals since 1980, is a Christian organization that seeks to meet the nutritional needs of students as well as to provide an atmosphere conducive to social and academic growth. Comprised primarily of bornagain believers, Pioneer services only church affiliated schools throughout the United States. The company operates from a Christian perspective and considers food service a ministry to college students. Pioneer's full-time staff includes Chuck McKinney, director; Steve Bandi and Glenn Stahlman, assistant directors; Patty Beam, secretary/banquet coordinator; and 11 cooks and bakers. Between 170 and 200 parttime student workers complete the food service staff.

Many changes have been made to improve the quality of food service at Cedarville College since Pioneer came to campus. Moving into the old gymnasium allowed expanded dining area and serving lines. Salad bars, fruit carts, condiment bars, and a sandwich line have been added to relieve the congestion of the three serving lines, and soup and ice cream are now available daily. Every Wednesday is a special night when carved roast beef, steak, or shrimp is served. The need for formal dining on campus was addressed through the completion of the President's Dining Room. This beautiful facility accommodates up to 40 persons and is used for administrative meetings, faculty and staff dining, and small student groups. Both the Student Government Association Food Service committee and the cafeteria suggestion box provide a means for students to voice their likes and dislikes and have been a great help to the Pioneer staff.


The biggest challenge to the food service staff is preparing three nutritious, appetizing meals each day for 1,600 students. They accept this challenge eagerly and do all they can to make institutional food as appealing as possible. It is an awesome task! Betty Hawes, head cook for the afternoon shift, was hesitant to cook for so many college students when she began working at Cedarville College 21 years ago. She recalls, "I walked through the door the first time and wasn't sure I wanted to work here. But every year it is more rewarding and now I don't want

to work anywhere else!" She has developed many friendships with students over the years and always appreciates the visits she has with those who come back to Cedarville from time to time.

Although the dedicated work of the food service staff is often unnoticed by those who benefit from it the most, their servant attitudes and willingness to address specific needs and preferences are undaunted. They continually strive to meet much more than just the nutritional needs of their family - the Cedarville College family.

Hey, Chuck, That Was a Good Meal!



Food Service Director Chuck McKinney

Like many other college students, Chuck McKinney helped pay for his formal education by working in the college cafeteria. With a vocational goal of minister of music and youth, he did not realize at that time how the Lord would use his practical training in the cafeteria of Mount Vernon Nazarene College to prepare him for a unique ministry later. Pioneer Food Service was started by the food service manager at Mount Vernon Nazarene College and Chuck became the company's first employee in 1973. When Cedarville College contracted Pioneer to cater in 1980, Chuck McKinney came as director of food service.

Food service entails more than just feeding students. McKinney wants each

student to learn to make nutritional decisions and helps educate them about what is best to eat by providing each new student with a booklet about nutrition and through monthly newsletters. He also uses a color code system to make students aware of which foods are more nutritious than others so they can make better food value choices.

Serving food that students like is very important to Chuck. He meets weekly with the Food Service Committee of the Student Government Association to decide on menus and to plan special meals such as Lumberjack Night, Greek, Italian, or Mexican entrees, a Hawaiian luau, or a banquet. He then has to order the specific foods for the meals - in just the right quanti-





ties. He says accurate production is his biggest challenge because nobody likes leftovers! He maintains careful records of how many students eat each particular entree and on which day of the week students eat more. If it is raining, for instance, students remain in the cafeteria longer, and therefore consume more food. And Monday supper is always the best attended meal. Corn, broccoli, and green beans are selected in that order as the favorite vegetables with four to five times more corn consumed than any other vegetable. Being aware of all these factors enables Chuck to execute his responsibilities more efficiently.

Chuck takes the opportunity to get to know many students with whom he works with. He remembers one in

particular - the first Student Government Association Food Service Committee Chairperson, Carla (Marling '83) Griffin. She is now a Pioneer Director at Atlanta Christian Collegein

Chuck McKinney is a faithful servant who feels the best compliment he could ever receive is hearing students say, "Hey, Chuck, that was a good meal," or "I appreciate the work you did tonight." McKinney responds by saying, "I'm just like everyone else; I like to be appreciated." Since his promotion to district manager for Pioneer Food Service, Chuck deals with several colleges in the area and is sincere when he says, "Of all the schools I go to, the students at Cedarville are tops!"

From the Heart

As one in that category, may I bring to your attention a way to get our job done more effectively; a way that involves alumni of Cedarville College regardless of age or vocation.

Every other church planting venture involved a number of "companions." A look at the list of people ministering with Paul reveals a doctor, writers, a politician, tent makers, young people, old people, men, and women.

Back to WHAT IF.... WHAT IF we missionaries actively approach lay people who have been trained in the church and in God's Word and who are adequately supporting themselves in their professions — WHAT IF we challenge them to be "companions" on church planting ventures? That's right

— WHAT IF we ask them to relocate their families and their work into an area of the country where they can assist a church planter? What if you alumni with a burden for church planting here in the States could use your support, encouragement, and spiritual maturity in a new work. What could happen?

For the missionary and his work:

*Personal encouragement in difficult work — a support group

* Multiple contacts in the target community through jobs, housing, etc.

* Qualified lay leadership which young churches need so desperately

* Financial support through faithful tithing

*Long term stability in doctrine and practice

For the companions or team members:

*Personal, active involvement in planting churches

*Use of talents and gifts where they are needed and valued

* No deputation

* Practical training for later ministry

*A direct impact on missions
Because of your strong Bible training, church background, professional
training, and a burden for missions, you
alumni are well suited for the companion or team ministry. What a great way
to fulfill the Great Commission without
an investment of time and expense in
language study, extensive travel, or
deputation delays. Perhaps you could
be a part of this companion concept as a
responsible layman using the gifts God
has given you.

Attention, Parents: It's Free!

Few things today are free, especially college tuition, but Cedarville College extends to children of alumni an opportunity for tuition-free summer school. This opportunity, appropriately entitled Children of Alumni Scholar Program (COASP), presents a special college experience to children of Cedarville graduates.

The program was started in 1983 with four participants, and the anticipated enrollment for 1988 is 15. It presents to high school juniors the chance to earn ten college credit hours during the summer, tuition-free! Held during the first session of summer school, the program offers classes which range from Bible and English to science and history. The five-week term demands condensed classes, yet allows for biblical integration and individual attention.

A new summer school course offering for 1988 is a required philosophy class taught by Dr. Gary Percesepe, director of the Cedarville College Honors Program. Dr. J. Michael Lopez, director of summer school, believes this class not only carries a broad Christian perspective pertinent to every growing believer, but that it also provides a sense of belonging, important to any student away from home.

COASP offers the high school student a college experience which, as Lopez states, gives "greater scholarship and admission opportunities" after high school graduation. Students who take part in this program usually find both application to colleges and adjustment to college life easier than those who do not participate.

COASP not only is a money-saver for alumni, but it also provides a way

for the College to thank them for their valued support. Gary Kuhn, director of alumni relations, notes that "through this program alumni have an opportunity to enrich the educational experience of their children. And they often find themselves renewing friendships with former classmates who are also bringing their high school students to summer school."
