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

STUDENT BODY PROFILE

RECORD ENROLLMENT

Students from twenty-nine states and five foreign countries form the student body of 821, the largest ever to enroll at Cedarville College. This year, in contrast to last year, the women outnumber the men, 424 to 397.

Seventy transfer students, eighteen veterans, and one hundred married students have enrolled in the college this year.

Approximately sixty-one per cent of the students are pursuing the bachelor of arts degree, twenty-four per cent the bachelor of science, and seven per cent the bachelor of music.

Cedarville College exists especially to meet the need of G. A. R. B. C. young people desiring Christian higher education. Young people from Regular Baptist Churches comprise fifty-eight per cent of the current student body, with eighty-two per cent coming from Baptist churches.

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

Dr. James T. Jeremiah, President



For the Lord's b'essing upon Cedarville College we are most grateful. There is a fine spirit of unity and anticipation of greater things for the college family as the new college year gets underway.

The students had more new facilities waiting for them when they arrived on camous this fall than any other time in the history of our college. There is the new library for which we prayed and worked so long; Maddox Hall, the new dormitory for women, housing 220 students; an enlarged and much-improved cafeteria; four air-conditioned classrooms with modern lighting and new furniture and many other improvements.

Every indication points to an ever-increasing interest in Cedarville on the part of young people who are looking for a Christian college. The Admissions Office is frequently asked to send representatives to "college night" programs conducted by high-school guidance staffs. Because of limited staff, plus the cost and time involved, it is impossible to participate in many of these programs. Futhermore, we find that the best applicants come from fundamental Bib'e teaching churches who have been counseled by pastors, youth directors, and Sunday School teachers.

We are very much concerned that the high-school juniors and seniors of your church become acquainted with what Cedarvil e has to offer them. I have often been asked if we are planning any special Prospective Student Days. We are approching this subject a little differently this year, and herein is the main emphasis of my message in this issue of the Bulletin.

Let me encourage you to bring a group of students from your church to the campus of Cedarville College any time it is most convenient to you. We need to know in advance when you plan to come and how many boys and how many girls will be in your party. We have a limited amount of guest housing in the dormitories, but in addition to that many of our students are willing to open their rooms to young people who are visiting us from the churches. It may be necessary when a large number come to the campus at one time for some of our guests to furnish sleeping bags and "rest" on the floor in a dormitory, but at least they will have a taste of dormitory life with the students.

In another place in the Bulletin is listed many special activities so that you may wish to bring your students here when the college is presenting a play, or when the basketball team is in action on the home floor. It would seem to me that the best time for young people to visit the campus would be some weekday when classes are in session and when they can also attend the regular chapel service which begins at 10 a.m.

Pastor, parents, youth, let me emphasize that now is the time to introduce your young people to Cedarville because many of them will be making decisions in the next few weeks as to where they will spend their college years. We do not believe that every young person in our churches will feel led to come to Cedarville, but we do want them to have an opportunity to see what we can offer. We pray with you that God will direct them into the school of His own choosing. We want to be of help to them if we can.

Recently, a survey revealed that most young people desire a college education in order to obtain personal financial security. No one will argue the importance of such a motive, particularly for the thou-




When the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees was held on October 13, Dr. George S. Milner, the man who has been on the Board for more than 14 years and has served as chairman


for most of that time, was re-elected to the Board and given the permanent position as chairman emeritus. We are very grateful to him for his years of dedicated service to the college.

WILL-CLINICS

Mr. Lee Turner, Director of Development, and Mr. Henry Phillips, Development Officer, have recently completed the "Estate Planning" course at Louisiana State University. The course, offered by the Institute of Insurance Marketing at Louisiana State University, covered different aspects of "Estate



Planning": tax implications, wills, trusts, and insurance. This training adds a new dimension to the services the college can offer our churches and friends.

In addition to the above training, the college retains the services of the Kennedy Sinclaire Corporation of Montclair, New Jersey. This corporation not only has trained trust officers for over thirty years; but also has helped over three hundred colleges establish deferred giving programs, during the last six years. Mr. Turner has also completed its training program.

In addition to furnishing helpful literature on wills, trusts, and other facets of estate planning, the college is providing a useful service by holding will-clinics in the churches. Colorful transparencies and an overhead projector are used to instruct people on wills, trusts, and other aspects of estate planning.

Over twenty will-clinics are tentatively scheduled to be held in the churches during the next three months. We have yet to receive a negative reply from a pastor that has been personally contacted. Pastors realize that they are doing their people a favor by holding a will-clinic, and the college has assured them that it will do the following:

- 1. The college is providing a valuable service in a technical area. The needs of Cedarville College will not be stressed but rather Christian stewardship and estate planning in general, trusting God's people will give where they have a concern.
- 2. A will-clinic will not take money out of the local church but rather educate people to a greater area of stewardship that will channel money into all phases of the Lord's work.
- 3. These clinics will be conducted by professionally trained personnel who will not mislead people in these delicate matters.

FACULTY SESSIONS

Each year for the past several years the Cedarville College faculty and administration have devoted two Saturdays to concentrated evaluation and examination of the total program.

These sessions are especially valuable as the college works toward regional accreditation. As yet, no definite target date has been set for achieving this important recognition but in recent years much progress has been evident. This progress has included the improvement of the library and other facilities and increases in the numbers of advanced degrees held by faculty members.

The 1967 sessions held November 4 and 11 specifically dealt with study of ways teaching could be improved and ways in which student achievement might better be analyzed.

It is hoped that the continued anlysis of the program will also lead to approval by the State Board of Education for the training of high school teachers.

Some of the critical needs which are delaying accreditation and approval include the renovation and increases of space in the Science Building, increasing the library's holdings by 20,000 volumes, and the addition of five faculty members who hold doctor's degrees.

As the faculty analyzed the many strengths and perhaps fewer weaknesses, it was noted that God certainly has blessed Cedarville College. In the few short years since the college came under the control of the Regular Baptists, many exciting improvements certainly have been made.

It is the faculty's continued prayer that God may continue to place His blessing on the college and that its spiritual, as well as academic, programs will continue to advance His honor and glory.
