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
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
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

### Alumnus of the Year 1988 Dr. Robert L. Domokos



Kobert L. Domokos '62 was born in northeast Ohio, the youngest of six children, and was saved at the age of 12 in a small rural church. In September 1958 he felt God calling him into the ministry. One week later he was enrolled at Cedarville College.

As a freshman, Domokos made a life-changing commitment to serve God. He determined he must be willing to do anything and go anywhere for his Lord. This commitment led to many different outreach opportunities for Christ while he was a student, a pattern that has continued in his life to the present

After graduating from Grace Theological Seminary in 1965, Bob became pastor of the Bible Baptist Church of Huntington, Indiana. The church grew rapidly under his leadership. He later pastored the

Poland Village Baptist Church of Youngstown, Ohio, where his commitment to serve the Lord anywhere, doing anything, was challenged by guest speaker Dr. David Nettleton, president of Faith Baptist Bible College. Shortly thereafter Domokos was called to chair the pastoral studies department at Faith.

Because of his special ability to work with and to minister to others, Dr. Domokos was called to greater responsibilities at Faith and in January 1988 he became the seventh president of Faith Baptist Bible College and Seminary.

### **Honorary Alumnus** of the Year 1988

Dr. J. Murray Murdoch



onorary Alumnus of the Year Dr. J. Murray Murdoch has had an impact on the lives of students and alumni since 1965. His ministry at Cedarville College extends far beyond his eloquent classroom delivery and thought provoking lectures. His well known philosophy of educating rather than indoctrinating students has produced loyalty and friendships that began 23 years ago. He has contributed greatly to the academic credibility of this institution as Chairman of the History and Social Science Department and continues to challenge students through the integrating of history and theology.

But for J. Murray Murdoch, the classroom is just the initial sphere of ministry. From the world of ideas he moves into day-to-day reality, living out the principles he teaches through service to others. Dr. Murdoch's leadership as coach of the men's tennis team and advisor to Alpha Chi has been an example

and encouragement to many young men on campus, instilling and affirming in them spiritual accountability, loyalty, and integrity. Since 1970 Dr. Murdoch has been interim pastor at several area churches and presently serves as senior pastor at Grace Baptist Church in Westerville, Ohio.

His life is an example of commitment to quality in education and service to our Lord.



### Distinguished Service Award 1988

he 1988 Distinguished Service Award was given to William A. Brock '74H posthumously. A beloved friend of Cedarville College and Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Bill Brock went to be with the Lord Sunday, August 21, 1988.

Dr. Brock was the State Representative of the nio Association of Regular Baptist Churches. Brock also was serving on the Council of 18 for the General Association of Regular Baptist Churches, the boards of Baptist Builders Club and Baptist Mid-Missions, and was editor of The Ohio Independent Baptist. He pastored two churches in Columbus: Immanuel Baptist Church for 10 years and Maranatha Baptist for 16 years. In 1974 Cedarville College awarded him the Doctor of Divinity degree.


Dr. Brock leaves his wife, Merle, a daughter Janice ('70) of Columbus, sons Gary ('74), Kevin ('76), and Tim ('87N) of Columbus, sons Lynn ('68) and Jeff ('84) of Cedarville, and six grandchildren.

Bill Brock was always supportive of Cedarville College. He served as a trustee for 31 years and his influence continues through his family and those who were his students and associates. His closest friend and our College President Paul Dixon says Bill Brock was "an insightful man who had that rare combination of business skills, and a willingness to step out by faith and to take the risks that were needed in order for the College to be what God wants it to be and to go where God wants it to go."

This man of God had a heart for churches, pastors, the GARBC, missions, for Christian education, for his family. That for which many remember him is his sincere entreaty: "Let me know how I can help. If you need anything, let me know."



The trustees have announced that the newest dormitory on campus, now under construction, will be named William A. Brock Hall. Located on the north edge of campus adjacent to Willetts Hall, this residence hall will provide housing for 170 men and will be ready for occupancy in September 1989.

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





## Student Services — More Than Demerit Slips

he dean would like to see you...." This message is almost inevitably followed by the thought, "Oops! What did I do this time?"

DEAN. The mere word brings to mind demerit slips and oral warnings from a stern individual who sits with hands folded, staring across the desk at you as if he can read every guilty thought that ever crossed your mind!

However, the Student Services Division is much more than demerit slips and the discipline process. Through its eight departments, this division works hard to maximize the Cedarville College experience for each student.

Don Rickard, Vice President for Student Services, administers and coordinates the activities of the departments. The efforts of the central office to address student needs at the individual level is reflected in academic development, counseling, supervision of the Baldridge Reading Program, and a course in human sexuality which Rickard teaches. Claudia Spradlin, secretary, and Nancy Knauff, receptionist, assist in the activities of the central office in Williams Hall.

The Campus Activities Office, directed by Dick Walker '74N, provides cultural, social, and recreational activities for the students. The Artist Series and other guest performances enrich the college experience as well as intramural sports, banquets, talent nights, class competitions, all-school parties, and interest trips away from the campus. The office oversees the Student Activities Center, student organizations, leadership training, new student and parent orientation, a multitude of innovative programs throughout the year.

The Career Planning and Placement Office assists students in self-assessment and in selecting appropriate career goals. Job placement services and opportunities are available to seniors and alumni. Under the leadership of David Gaffner '69, the office now is helping faculty to integrate more effectively academic programs with job market requirements.

Director of *Counseling* Sandy Entner '59 is assisted by Carl Ruby '83. Students come to this office to seek personal help in areas of normal individual development and interpersonal relationships as well as for more serious problems. The office has established several support groups for students with a terminally ill relative, an alcoholic parent, extreme perfectionism, and other needs. The office also offers academic support by sponsoring study skills and time management workshops.

Dave Gidley '73 directs the *Financial Aid Office* which seeks to distribute available funds to students who need them most. The goal is to maximize the effectiveness of financial aid resources to enable as

many students as possible to attend Cedarville College. The staff offers financial counseling regarding financial aid and repayment of loans.

Patterson Clinic is the hub of Health Services. Betty Bertschinger and her staff offer treatment for illness or injury and educational programs relative to preventive medicine and current health issues. The Clinic provides a self-help room complete with scales, band-aids, cold medicine, and informative charts as well as publishing a monthly medical newsletter called *Lifeline* which gives helpful hints on staying healthy.

The offices of *Dean of Men* and *Dean of Women* complete the division. Deans Tim Bosworth and Pat Bates administer the resident hall programs and assist Vice President Rickard with student counseling and discipline

The College views discipline as an opportunity to build into the lives of the students. Discipline is a

potentially positive experience — an opportunity to reinforce the values of accepting responsibility and consequences of decisions and to demonstrate unconditional love to students. Great care is taken to distinguish between institutional preferences and biblical mandates in defining Cedarville's standards.

Resident hall life is an important testing ground for student development. It is here, amidst the fun of football in Maddox courtyard or unit devotions in Lawlor, that teenagers become young adults. Students find their personal values challenged. They learn to be more responsible for the consequences of their actions. They learn to accept others as they are. Overseeing this growth is the challenge which the personnel of Student Services joyfully accept.

An example of researching and implementing ideas to improve dorm life is "Frosh Hall," an experiment designed by Steve Meyers '85, resident director of Lawlor Hall. Walls separating three units of Lawlor have been removed to make one large unit where 25 freshman men and four student resident advisors live. The living arrangement will be evaluated on criteria such as grade point average and group interaction. Frosh Hall quite possibly may be a model for further changes designed to improve and enhance residence hall life.

The Student Services Department is committed to the mission of the College and desires that each student leave Cedarville prepared for a life of service to Christ. In the words of Vice President Rickard, "Providing services and programs for the purpose of meeting professional expectations is not enough. We really want to make a difference in the Kingdom of God. So we continue to commit ourselves to making a difference in the lives of students. That's what it's all about — to make a difference in God's program."

For current students and alumni alike, Student Services has taken on a new goal — to become a place of refuge. Echoing throughout the division is the desire to meet needs, to be known as a caring place where college family can come "home" to find rest and encouragement.

The familiar phrase has a different ending at this college. "The dean would like to see you...become the best you can be to make a difference in the Kingdom of God."

# A Developing Ministry

The Division of Student Services has developed in concept and in scope as the College itself has matured in its 35 years under Baptist administration.

The first Dean of Students was Dr. Arthur Williams who served from 1953-1960. Dr. Williams brought his seminary training and pastoral experience at a time when Cedarville was moving from a Bible college to a liberal arts curriculum. Remembered as a kind, fatherly figure of great sensitivity, he went to be with the Lord in 1978.

Picking up this important mantle in 1960, Richard McIntosh also brought a theological, pastoral background to the office. Under his ten years of leadership, the ministry began to take on the form of what would become the present Student Services Division. New, distinct departments such as Financial Aid, Health Service, the Residence Hall program, and Christian Ministries were defined, and Campus Activities was created as a part-time ministry to the students. In 1970 McIntosh moved into teaching full time in the Department of Biblical Education until 1984 when he returned to the pastoral ministry at Bible Baptist Church in Kokomo, Indiana.

In 1970 Don Rickard '60N returned to Cedarville to become Dean of Students. He brought both professional training at the master's level and experience in student personnel work at Eastern Michigan University.

Building on the efforts of his predecessor, he further defined and developed the existing departments. Need was arising for distinct departments of Counseling and Career Planning and Placement. Campus Activities became a separate, full-time ministry encompassing a multitude of services and programs including student government, social/ service organizations, the Artist Series, and social, recreational, and intramural activities. The very important Residence Hall program was carefully crafted to help achieve the mission of the College.

The positions of dean of men and dean of women appeared in the 1960's. Many people have given of themselves and of their expertise in these positions through the years — Stan Ballard, Joy Mackay, Tom Loper, Joyce Moore, Mary Armstrong, Virginia Ertle, Bob Burkett, Beatrice Printy, Dick Walker, Pat Bates, and Tim Bosworth.

Programs are conceived and refined, but ultimately it is people who have made Student Services what it is has been through the years. The deans, the division personnel, and the many young people who served as advisors in the residence halls contributed in untold ways to the character and walk of the thousands of students who made Cedarville their college home.



Bates

Dean of Women Pat Bates oversees the women's residence halls, personal counseling, and the help given to academically marginal students. Her desire is to help others experience God's grace in

Her own testimony focuses on God's forgiveness and His healing grace that involves much more than restored physical health. She reaches out to those around her, encouraging and reminding each one that the Lord works with most of us after we are broken.

Earning a BA in psychology at Ouchita (that's wash-a-ta) Baptist University in Arkansas and a master's degree in criminal justice at Xavier University in Cincinnati, she was a social worker in Kentucky before coming to Cedarville as dean of women in 1974.

She shares her home with three cocker spaniels, Holly, Annie, and Honey, canine adolescents who delight the Student Services staff with their antics.

Dean Bosworth

Dean of Men Tim Bosworth '71 is enthused about the maturation of the College and the opportunities to make a difference in the lives of students. He is dedicated to the absolute necessity of prayer and realizes the promise of Psalm 94:19, "When anxiety was great within me, your comfort brought joy to my soul."

Through the loss of both of his parents two years ago Tim was given a profound empathy for those touched by the death of loved ones. He plans to teach a class on death and dying at the College and hopes to share his insight with churches and hurting individuals in the extended Christian community,

Tim was an elementary education major and earned a master's degree from The Ohio State University. He taught fifth through eighth grades and served as principal and superintendent in two Ohio schools before becoming Cedarville's dean of men in 1984. He and his wife Rita (DeAtley '71) are the parents of Ben 13, Dan 11, and Suzanne 9.

Beatrice Printy, dean of women in 1973-74 and resident director from 1974 to 1987, currently resides in Hornell, New York.





or Dr. Wayne Dickason '62N of Olympia, Washington, plastic surgery is more than a profession; plastic surgery is a ministry.

He points to his Cedarville College experience as one that still influences him. The facilitator/friend mentality that he remembers is the approach he uses in his profession as a surgeon/friend to his patients.

Cancer patients, trauma victims, injured self-image patients ache with emotional needs. Wayne finds himself meeting and dealing with physical needs as a means of reaching the deeper needs inside the patient. He firmly believes that his ability as a surgeon opens a special door to ministry.

A plastic surgeon for 14 years, Dr. Wayne Dickason is a respected professional. He treats his patients in his Olympia office and is a clinical instructor at Washington Medical School. He has authored three articles for *The American Journal of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery*.

Wayne earned his way through 14 years of preparation for his field: one year at Cedarville, six years of premed and medical school at Flint Junior College and the University of Michigan, one year of internship, four years of general surgery residency with the Blodgett Hospital of Michigan, and two years of plastic surgery residency at West Penn Hospital in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He served as a general surgeon during the Vietnam War.

Wayne, his wife Joan, and two children are actively involved with Westwood Baptist Church in Olympia. He often uses his vacation time to minister in Latin and South America. As a result of his heart for missionary service, outreach opportunities are available for the teens in his church. He also was involved in People to People and traveled to Russia to meet with fellow plastic surgeons.

Believing that every Christian must carry out his responsibilities to the best of his ability, Dr. Wayne Dickason, Christian plastic surgeon, strives daily to meet this goal.

## H elping through Difficult Days



As a junior business administration major, Beth (Latorella '88) Chapman didn't realize how the Lord would continue to use her involvement with her Christian Ministry team. She joined a group of Cedarville students who volunteer their services at the Ronald McDonald House in Dayton, Ohio. The Ronald McDonald House offers temporary lodging and meals at little or no cost to families whose children are hospitalized at Children's Medical Center. It is a true service opportunity involving anything from answering the phone or cleaning rooms to taking the time to listen to hurting families. Beth recalls preparing dinner for families who had spent the day at the hospital and baking cookies for the nurses. The Cedarville team also plans parties twice each year for the children and families who stayed at the House during the previous six months. Beth says it gives them a chance to celebrate a happy time with these friends with whom they shared difficult days.

During her senior year Beth and fiance Phil Chapman '88 worked closely with the manager, often helping as weekend relief managers. As commencement drew closer the Board of Directors of the Ronald McDonald House needed a new manager. Beth applied for the position and was hired shortly before graduation.

Her two years of volunteer work had acquainted Beth with the inner workings of the House, but it was her training in business ethics and problem management as well as composition and communication that really prepared her for her responsibilities as manager. During the past six months Beth has reinstituted a newsletter and broadened the donor base for the Dayton House. She is responsible for preparing monthly reports for the Board of Directors, keeping the books, and raising operating funds, as well as public relations, volunteer management, and correspondence with past guests and members of local community. But for Beth the most important task she has is interacting with the families who come to the Ronald McDonald House. Guests quickly become aware of the Chapmans' Christianity, and they usually initiate conversations about God and what Beth and Phil believe. Many families come to the House believing there is no God, but by the time they leave, that has changed. Beth recently had the privilege of leading one guest to faith in Christ. Beth says, "This type of job allows me to build into people's lives. That is my ultimate goal--to touch people's lives." It has been a time of personal growth for Beth and she challenges students and alumni to take advantage of service opportunities. "Sharing yourself in service to others brings opportunities to share
