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
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
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Construction of the new William Brock Residence Hall (inset) is proceeding on schedule. Heavy excavation and construction equipment has been on the site since Fall Quarter.

Curtis **Doing?**

urtis ('83) and Carol (Stoltzfus '82) Hoke became parents of a baby girl on January 7 (see Alumnotes). Cynthia Elizabeth is a special gift from God because quadriplegics are not supposed to be able to father children.

Alumni of the early '80's remember Curtis Hoke well. God had saved sixteen-year-old Curt when Evangelist Paul Dixon presented the Gospel during services at Calvary Baptist Church in Meadville, Pennsylvania. Influenced by Dixon and by his youth pastor, Curt headed for Cedarville for his college education.

He fit right into the academics and the activities of Cedarville College and became a campus leader. It was a time of maturing for him, of learning about responsibility. As a mathematics major he learned to think critically which helped him later in his work as a computer programmer. He was student body president, student body project chairman, and worked in the Campus Activities Office. The cover of the 1983 Miracle is Curtis' design. It was at Cedarville College that Curtis began to take his faith seriously. He found that faith was a lifestyle to live, not just something to do on Sunday. His two years of Christian service ministry in an area nursing home gave him an appreciation for those who were not as well off physically as he was, and he really learned to care about them. Curtis and Carol Stoltzfus became engaged. She graduated and accepted a teaching job in Indiana while he finished his senior year at Cedarville. They planned an August wedding date following his graduation in 1983, but in July a diving accident left him paralyzed from the chest down. Curtis and Carol faced uncertainty and difficult times, and their wedding was delayed almost two years. But their faith in God and in each other did not waver. What seemed like shattered dreams offered many opportunities to share their faith.

with his family in Meadville. Then the Lord directed him into a computer programming course for the disabled offered by the University of Philadelphia. Carol transferred her teaching career to Morgan, Pennsylvania.

As job opportunities became a reality, the need for transportation for Curtis became pressing. If he had a job and could secure a van, the state of Pennsylvania would equip the van for him, a quadriplegic, to drive. Through Cedarville alumni, their churches, and other friends, the Lord provided the converted van in April 1985, just days before their wedding.

Curtis is a construction estimator, and Carol homeschools eight children in their home four hours each day. On Sundays they teach a class of 20 second and third graders in their Evangelical Free Church. They have a ministry showing the Joni Earickson Tada film "Let's Be Friends" in Christian schools and churches. The film suggests ways that the viewers can relate to handicapped people and gives the Hokes opportunities to testify of God's goodness in their lives. Curtis also has spoken at camps for handicapped children and in the Cedarville College chapel service. Before Curtis and Carol were married, they were told that quadriplegics could not father children. However, an article in a medical journal described a new procedure that seemed to fit their situation. They approached doctors in Thomas Jefferson Hospital in Philadelphia who were willing to help them. The procedure utilized their own reproductive cells, and Carol conceived on the first attempt. Cindy is only the fourth child to be fathered in this manner by a quadriplegic father and carried to term by the mother.



Torch Club: Helping to Pass the Torch to Our Students and Beyond

The Torch Club — doesn't that include all the people who receive the TORCH magazine?

That's one of the greatest myths of the 1980's. You may think that the Torch Club exists to publish the TORCH magazine, but the only things that the Torch Club and the TORCH magazine have in common are their name and Cedarville College.

"Commit thou to faithful men who will be able to teach others also." Paul's words in II Timothy 2:2 reinforce why the Torch Club exists: to help pass the torch of truth to each of our students so they, in turn, can take this truth into their careers and ministries. We want to give them a torch lit with the light of the gospel; a torch they can carry into the world of darkness.

Individuals or married couples who desire to join us in "Passing the Torch" give \$10 or more each month to the College through the Annual Fund. Dr. Frank E. Young, Commissioner of the Food and Drug Administration, spoke at a special Charter Day Chapel commemorating the 102nd birthday of the College. He also hosted an informative question and answer meeting later in the day.

When Dr. Young moved to Washington almost five years ago, his home church commissioned him a missionary to government. Serving as FDA chief during the Reagan years, he will continue in that position in President Bush's administration.

In his Charter Day address, he urged (1) students to synthesize their faith with their learning, (2) faculty to be involved in Christian and secular scholarship in the humanities and sciences, and (3) the College to stand for the truth in the state and the nation. He suggested that Christians write their Congressmen informing them of their prayer support and asking for specific prayer requests.

Holding both the M.D. and the Ph.D. degrees, Dr. Young publishes extensively in his field of biotechnology. He has received numerous prestigious awards including three honorary doctorates and has served on the faculty or administration of Case Western Reserve University, Scripps Clinic and Research Foundation, University of California at San Diego, University of Rochester, and several hospitals. Presently he is on the Executive Committee of the World Health Organization. Your greatest benefit from joining the Torch Club is knowing that you are involved in the lives of nearly 1900 students, helping them to carry the torch of God's Word. As a tangible reminder of your ministry, you receive a marble paperweight. We trust that it prompts you to pray continually for the ministry of Cedarville College and for your financial ministry.

Follicle Follies — the only time in Cedarville College history when faculty and staff men were encouraged to grow BEARDS?

Painting The Rock — perhaps you and your buddies were the fourth group in a single night to spray paint the declaration of your allegiance to YOUR team the night before the Ohio State-Michigan game. **Cedar What?** — that ridiculous spoof on our nation's presidential campaign, held only once during your

college career, fortunately! CZ's antics — designed to encourage you and to point out specific events. The unveiling of the members came only when they graduated. Artist Series — that quarter you took "Man and the Arts" and were required to attend. Walker asserts that much of the college experience takes place outside the classroom — character and personality development, friendships, spiritual edification, and cultural awareness. A Campus Activities event must enhance that part of the college environment.

Walker says he relies heavily on his "3 M's" (Mark Mathews '82, Michelle Longo '86, and Melissa Basler '88) to make the Campus Activities program "go."

Mathews directs the popular Intramural/Recreation program. Most quarters 60% of the student body is involved in some sport or activity.

Michelle Longo coordinates the use of the Student Center, the Gavelyte Deli, the concert series, and the hosting of off-campus organizations who wish to use college facilities.

Coordinate and Complement. According to Campus Activities Director Dick Walker '74, these words best describe the work of his office. The CA staff coordinate all the non-academic events of the college, including those generated by their own office. A key project of Walker's office is the Activities Calendar. The CA staff is the central control for the balancing and spacing of events throughout the school year and for publishing a calendar of these events. They also help other departments and organizations with specific activities and arrange for outside groups to use college facilities.

Their own office seeks to provide a variety of programs and activities which complement the educational goals and the spiritual emphasis of the college. Melissa Basler is office manager and calendar coordinator. She also schedules meeting rooms for campus organizations and disseminates general information.

The Office sponsors special events such as Orientation Week, Homecoming, Li'l Sibs Weekend, Parents' Weekend, Residence Hall Week, and Grandparents' Day. Contact with parents is maintained and encouraged through a newsletter from the CA Office.

The CA Office encourages leadership development and communication through the President's Council which is comprised of the presidents of all the student organizations and classes.



Law Enforcement Chief Mark Evans

he might say that Mark Evans '64N was born with law enforcement in his blood. Two grandfathers were in police work and an uncle served as a warden in a penitentiary. For the past 22 years, Evans has come up through the ranks of the Woodhaven, Michigan, Police Department and in February 1988 was appointed Chief of Police.

During the two years he was a Cedarville student, Evans had a busy Christian ministry in Xenia and Clark County jails and in the Lebanon Correctional Institute. The concern and special interest shown him by faculty member Miriam Maddox laid a foundation for his own concern for young people. He credits Cedarville for helping him develop spiritual thought patterns and a consistent devotional life.

Evans continued his college work at Oakland University in Pontiac, Michigan, Wayne State and Michigan State Universities. He then went to the Detroit Metropolitan and Michigan State Police Academies. Special training followed at the Smith & Wesson Firearms Academy and the National Police Firearms School. Through the years he has served in crime prevention and surveillance and as vice, juvenile, and command officer. He has received several commendations and, in 1975, the U.S. Jaycees named him Distinguished Policeman of the Year.

Each year Evans teaches law enforcement courses at Woodhaven High School. He educates students about problems they will confront -- alcohol, drugs, crime, domestic violence, and abuse. Evans also speaks to middle and elementary students about law enforcement and good citizenship.

Evans' interest in the out-of-doors and big game hunting also has provided opportunities to work with young people. As a Scout Master, he is able to teach his scouts not only about wildlife but also about firearms safety. Woodhaven also sponsors a law enforcement explorers program for youth with which Evans is involved. These experiences may not only foster good relations between the police department and the young people, but also have opened many opportunities for Evans to pursue friendship evangelism.

Evans is a trustee and Sunday school teacher at First Baptist Church in Lincoln Park. He and his wife Joyce have two sons, Bryan 19 and Brad 16.

A verse which has been an encouragement to him throughout his career is Philippians 4:13: "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me."

oor to Door Via Telephone



hen Good Shepherd's Baptist Church in Sidney, Ohio, opened its doors on October 2, 165 people came to the first service. About 40 were friends and family members. The others were present because of an intensive telephone campaign conducted in the area by Pastor Earl Shaffer '77, his wife Marilyn, and about 100 volunteers from nine churches in western and northwestern Ohio.

The Shaffers are church planters with Baptist Mission of North America. On the basis of surveys, Sidney was selected as a city in which to plant a church whose ministry would be Bible teaching, outreach, and discipleship.

In early August, the Shaffer family moved into a home in Sidney, installed 10 telephone lines, and with the help of their volunteers started the calls.

Shaffer reports, "Our folks 'visited' 17,322 homes." To the 950 who expressed interest, they mailed brochures outlining the purpose, goals, and programs of the church, and made follow-up calls. They found that God had prepared ten families as the core of His church.

Arrangements were made to meet in a local elementary school. Prepared with a nursery (staffed by Cedarville College students), Sunday school teachers, a youth pastor (Cedarville senior Jeff Oswald), and pianist (freshman Linda Thompson of Troy), the church planters were expecting 90-100 for the first service.

That first Sunday two decisions were made for salvation, four people made recommitments to Christ, three desired baptism, and two said they wanted to join the church.

The expected drop in attendance was not as great as they had anticipated: the fifth week there were 110 present and two salvation decisions.

"Now to Him Who is able to do exceedingly abundantly above all we ask or think, according to the power that works in us, to Him be glory in the church by Christ Jesus throughout all ages, world without end. Amen!" (Ephesians 3:20).

It was through the ministry of Blackhawk Baptist Church in Ft. Wayne, Indiana, that Shaffer was saved in 1973. Blackhawk also introduced him to the concept of church planting.

He cites his Bible training at Cedarville, discipling underclassmen, and his work with OVCH children as good preparation for his ministry.

Before going to Sidney, he took graduate work at Bowling Green State University and Winebrenner Seminary and pastored First Baptist Church of Forest, Ohio. Earl and Marilyn Shaffer have two children, Grant 3 and Leya 2.

Sufficient for Today

August 8, 1988 — Another hot summer day. After a hectic week of VBS at church in addition to our normal commitments, I am looking forward to staying home and keeping our four little ones as cool as possible. Amber is four, Adam, almost two, and the twins Hayley and Justin, almost four months.

7:00 a.m. — Justin awakens with a temperature of 101. I am not alarmed, but think I should call Dr. Delapaz anyway. She wants to see him.

11:00 a.m. — Justin has no other symptoms, but she tells me what to watch for and says to call if any occur.

4:15 p.m. — I call the doctor. She says if his temperature does not go down by 5 p.m. she will admit him to the hospital for observation. I have no car...Mike is still at work...who will stay with the other children?

5 p.m. — A friend comes to help with supper, and she will stay with the children. Dad stops by. He will take Justin and me to the hospital. I look at Justin. His lips are turning blue, and one eye is starting to cross. The doctor calls and tells me to meet her at the hospital.

At the hospital — The doctor orders a spinal tap to rule out meningitis. Mike joins Dad and me in the waiting room shortly before Dr. Delapaz tells us that Justin indeed has meningitis. We have heard of it and know it is serious. Our son will be taken to the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit of the Hurley Medical Center in Flint.

In the ambulance — I think the ambulance will never arrive at Hurley. Justin lies almost lifeless, and my heart aches for my precious baby. I feel so helpless. There is nothing I can do.

At Hurley Medical Center — The doctor says the first 24 hours are the most critical. Justin has a seizure at

midnight and again at 3 a.m. He goes into septic shock and is attached to a ventilator.

August 9, 7 a.m. — With tears streaming down his face, Dr. Zureikat (head of PICU) tells us that Justin is dying and they are doing all they can. Now it is up to God. Mike asks me if I am ready to give Justin to the Lord. "No!" I mean it with all my heart. *No one* is going to take *my* baby! Later — as I look at my baby attached to ventilator and oxygen, I realize I have to give him to the Lord. All of a sudden it is easy to do.

Many have been praying for us. Our church family has drawn very close to us through their prayers and through the ways they have helped us.

August 10 — The doctors say Justin will live, but he will be incapable of voluntary functions. The septic shock has caused the loss of circulation to his hands and feet. His fingers and toes have turned black, and the doctors say he will probably lose some toes and maybe a finger.

August 15 — Justin is off the ventilator. His hearing seems normal; his vision does not. He has lost the suck-swallow reflex and we are learning to tube-feed him.

August 28 — Justin is back on a bottle and some solid foods. The CAT scan shows some brain damage, but he is too young for the doctors to determine the extent.

August 30 — Justin is home! He is like a newborn; he has no head control, but we will continue to work with him, and a therapist will come twice a week.

September 10 — The pediatric opthalmologist says Justin is not blind, just visually delayed.

November 10 — Justin's fingers and toes are now healthy pink again. The black is gone. He lost only the tip of a baby toe and his fingers are fine.

November 19 — Justin's vision still is not normal, but it is better, and the doctor feels it will continue to improve.

December 12 — Justin is eight months old now. He has made much progress. He smiles a lot and is a happy baby. We have high hopes for him.

We are so very thankful to our Lord for giving Justin back to us. We told Him we would take him back however He chose to give him to us. We have learned a valuable lesson. Our children are not ours — they are lent to us for a time. I never would have believed I could make it through an experience like this, but God gives grace and it is sufficient for today. Tomorrow He will again give me what I need.
