SECONDARY CERTIFICATION GRANTED





The Ohio State Board of Education acted June 10, 1968, to grant full approval to Cedarville College for teacher education at the elementary and secondary levels. The high school program can begin with college seniors this coming fall.

Teaching fields have been approved in biology, bookkeeping, bookkeeping-basic business, comprehensive major in business education, elementary education, English, general science, history and government, mathematics, music, physical science, salesmanship-merchandising, comprehensive social studies, speech, and stenography-typing.

For the past ten years Cedarville students have been receiving their secondary teacher training at neighboring Central State University. Now all the work may be completed on the Cedarville campus.

The elementary portion of the program was approved by the State Board of Education two years ago. Two classes have completed their programs, and as a result over 100 young people are fully certified and are teaching in Christian

day schools and in public schools throughout the ration. It is interesting to note that the lack of regional accreditation has not been a large factor in most states when Cedarville graduates apply for certification.

Mr. C. B. Hurst, registrar, who acts as teacher placement director, indicates that administrators from many states regularly include Cedarville on recruiting visits. No Cedarville teacher education graduate experiences difficulty in finding placement. In fact, requests exceed available persons at least three to one. It has also been noted that many area administrators prefer employing Cedarville graduates.

Emphasis will continue to be placed on the exciting possibilities of service in Christian elementary and secondary schools. It is anticipated that the new certification will increase the number of students making application. The 1968-69 enrollment is expected to reach 850, surpassing last year's 822 students. Students interested in enrolling this fall should apply immediately.

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

Dr. James T. Jeremiah, President



Dear Friends:

As I write these lines we are in the process of remodeling the first floor of the Administration building. We are constructing two stair towers from the basement to the third floor. One of these towers has been completed.

Recently when some of our maintenance men were removing a portion of the building, they discovered among other things some old newspapers. A February 1, 1899, issue of the *Cincinnati Times-Star* carried the following news item from Chicago:

The Chicago Woman's Educational Union today adopted the following:

"Whereas, There is to be another World's Exposition to signalize the beginning of the new century to be held in Paris; and

"Whereas, the Bible, the world's supreme book has been for our own America the source and strength, the light and creative inspiration of everything best in our national life, character and hope for the future; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That we most heartily favor the proposition that under the auspices of the United States Government such an appropriate and prominent exhibit be made of the Holy Scriptures as will be an acknowledgement to the world of what America owes to the Bible."

In contrast to this item is one which appears in The *Parkersburg News*, Parkersburg, West Virginia, June 13, 1968. The headline reads "Ohio Valley College Hit By Federal Religion Ban." The government made \$76,000 available for this college to build a chapel, and then made it illegal to use the chapel for the purpose intended. Dr. J. M. Powell, president of the college said, "We have been instructed not to use the chapel any more for either Bible classes or chapel. As I understand it, under the interpretation we are not even permitted to say a prayer or mention God in that auditorium."

Dr. Powell further states that it is his understanding that it would be "perfectly permissible in the eyes of the government to teach evolution, communism, anarchy, civil disobedience or any of these things in the auditorium, but we must not mention God."

For some time many of us have been of the opinion that our privately-owned Christian colleges cannot accept government funds for either buildings or operation without submitting to government control. In our opinion there will be an ever-increasing number of church-related schools controlled in this manner if they seek and accept government aid for their educational programs.

In the days to come it will be difficult enough to maintain our Christian schools with a clearcut, uncompromising testimony for Jesus Christ without additional difficulty from government control. For this reason we are most grateful that the Board of Trustees of Cedarville College voted unanimously not to accept government funds for college facilities or faculty salaries.

In a day when many of the prophets of gloom are saying that private liberal arts colleges cannot long endure in this present affluent society, this decision is either courageous or disastrous, depending upon one's point of view.

It is, indeed, disastrous if our hopes of future success are based upon what man can do alone. It is courageous only as such a decision is born of God and leads us to depend upon Him as the great source of all supply. When God performs the doing of the work there is no room left for man to glory in the accomplishment.

Obviously, God uses His people as tools in doing His work. Cedarville College has taken the position that it shall not operate by the aid of government subsidies; therefore, we must essentially, as the only other alternative, depend upon our churches. Does your church have Cedarville College on its budget for your fair share of the operation and expansion of your college?

DEVELOPMENT NEWS

Topographical problems of grading and leveling land for the courts and a nearby lake simultaneously would cost an additional \$9000.
