# 1st ANNUAL PASTORS' CONFERENCE





The 1st Annual Pastors' Conference was held September 9 - 12 on campus. The conference was offered free of all charges to interested pastors because of their support of Cedarville College over the years.

Total registration reached 142. Ohio led the delegations with 77 representatives. The remaining distribution was: Indiana (20); Illinois (11); New York (9); Michigan and Pennsylvania (8); Iowa (3); New Jersey (2); and West Virginia, Kentucky, Connecticut, Brazil (1).

The features speaker was Dr. Kenneth W. Masteller, pastor of the Haddon Heights (New Jersey) Baptist Church. His messages were entitled: "Submerged Axeheads or Be Careful With Your Tools;" "The Pastor and His Pulpit Ministry;" "The Pastor and His People;" "The Pastor and His Youth Program;" "The Pastor and His Evangelistic Outreach;" and "The Pastor and His Missionary Vision." Dr. Masteller is an honorary alumnus of Cedarville College.

Four workshops were conducted by competent authorities on relevant issues. Rev. W. Thomas Younger, pastor of Immanuel Baptist Church of Fort Wayne, Indiana and trustee of Cedarville College, presented a workshop on Church Extension. Dr. George L. Lawlor, professor of Greek and Bible at Cedarville College, headed a workshop on Contemporary Theology. He was assisted by: Rev. Mead C. Armstrong, associate professor of Bible and Christian service director at Cedarville College. Dr. William J. Hopewell executive secretary of A.B.W.E. and honorary alumnus of Cedarville College; and Rev. Darris M. Hauser, pastor of the Independent Baptist Church of Towanda, Pennsylvania.

Dr. John W. Reed, professor of speech at Cedarville College was assisted by Rev. William A. Brock, pastor of Maranatha Baptist Church of Columbus, Ohio and college trustee, and Mr. Paul Gathany, instructor in radio at Cedarville College and manager of WCDR-FM, in a workshop entitled, Communicating Christ. Dr. Robert Gromacki professor of Bible and Greek at Cedarville and author of "The Modern Tongues and Healing Movement" conducted sessions on the Tongues Movement.

#### STUDENT BODY PROFILE

Cedarville College is expecting the largest enrollment ever. It is estimated that 860 - 865 students will matriculate surpassing the 822 of last year. The estimate includes 280 - 285 new students, 75 transfers, and 505 continuing students.

Approximately 100 married students will be enrolled. New Student Week will be conducted September 22 - 28 with classes beginning September 30.

Upcoming events on the college calendar include the Day of Prayer October 8 when the entire college family unites in prayer for mutual concerns. The Fall Bible Conference will be October 7 - 11 with Dr. David Allen, Pastor of Calvary Baptist Church of Hazel Park, Michigan.

The annual homecoming activities will take place on October 18 - 19. Miss Irene Bewley will present "Southern Characterizations" as the first Artist Series of the year October 26.

#### FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

Dear Friend,

There is a unique relationship between Cedarville College and the many churches to which we are dependently related. More than 85% of the young people who enroll in this college do so because of the recommendation and influence of some pastor or church. This emphasis has been from the beginning of the present administration of the college and will continue since Cedarville exists primarily to provide a Christian education for Christian youth. There are hundreds of institutions of higher learning which are serving the non-Christian student.

All of us who serve on campus and each member of our constituent churches who are concerned about the future program and progress of Cedarville College must recognize the great financial responsibility these churches must continually bear. Since Cedarville exists for the churches, it must be maintained by the churches. Many colleges today are trusting comparatively uncertain government appropriations for their operation. We prefer to trust the reliable promises of God, the united concern of many churches, and the prayerful, sacrificial interest of many, individual Christians.

The Pastors' Conference held on campus September 9-12 was an attempt to express our deep appreciation to these men and churches for their support of the college through the years. Evaluations of the conference indicate it was a means of great encouragement to the 142 pastors who attended this time of study and fellowship.

We have many written statements concerning the pastors' reactions to this first conference. One man wrote, "This has been a blessed time. The fellowship has been wonderful; the messages and workshops inspiring and informative; and the food excellent. It has and will fill a need for the pastors in our Fellowship."

We are preparing for the largest enrollment in our history. In a few days this fine group of youth will be on campus to begin or further their education. For their sakes we must always plan for a still greater Cedar-ville College. We must be thinking constantly about new and better facilities.

Recently a 5.62 acre property was purchased by the college which brings the total acreage holdings to 170. There is adequate land to provide sufficient space for soccer, baseball, tennis, track, and other needed recreational facilities for our physical education program. Immediately, \$30,000 must be raised to prepare the land to meet this need.

This program may not appeal to many friends because it does not involve the construction of any buildings. However, it is most important for the physical good of our students, and also for the achievement of secondary certification for our academic major in physical education.

Last year our championship tennis team excelled with only one tennis court on which to practice. New tennis courts will be a fine tribute and incentive for this fine team.

This opportunity of service in the expansion of the college can and will be met in the same manner as have the others which preceded it. If this is a need—and we believe it is—we can rest upon the Word which states, "But my God shall supply all your need, according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus." (Phil. 4:19) If like the Philippian church each of us will give our best to the Lord, we then may claim His promises that the ministry He intends for the college will be fulfilled.

#### **FACULTY FACTS**

Mr. Edward E. Spencer, associate professor of English is at Kent State University on one year's leave of absence pursuing a doctorate in English.

#### **DEVELOPMENT NEWS**





All the ingredients appear to be on campus for the greatest year ever at Cedar-ville College. A bumper crop of 860 - 865 students are anticipated who will be cultivated by 55 faculty members.

The Lord has graciously supplied an abundance of rain this summer and our campus now has beautiful, green grass "wall to wall" carpeting. The maintenance department has patched, painted, and polished every building in readiness for active teenagers. Even the stair towers on the Old Main are nearly completed. (See photos)

Our new library, dormitories, dining facility, and chapel give the students of Cedarville College pleasant places in which to study, live, eat, and worship. However, there is one missing necessity — a place outside to exercise. This means athletic fields and especially tennis courts for our championship team.

It has always been the college policy to keep its friends informed of opportunities to invest in the ministry of Cedarville College, and trust the Lord to motivate their giving potential. You can have a significant part in providing for the physical needs of our students-many of whom are also your students.

Along with the athletic fields, a lake is planned. There is a low area on campus which can be made into a lovely lake at relatively small expense. The dam needed at the southwest corner of the lake will cost approximately \$9,000. The athletic fields including the deserved tennis courts will necessitate an expenditure of \$21,000. This package price of \$30,000 for the athletic fields and lake must be negotiated simulataneously so the water level can be determined.

The student body has initiated efforts to make this project a reality. Championship soccer and tennis teams have been produced. During the previous two years, over \$2,000 has been donated by Cedarville College students. This is a challenge for those of more capable means to participate.

We now have \$4,600 toward the needed \$30,000. It is imperative that some landscaping be done this year, so that the ground may be seeded for grassy athletic fields growth. Will you invest in this worthwhile project? Talk to God about it! Gifts should be designated "Athletic Fields" and sent to the Development Office, Cedarville, Ohio 45314.

#### **BOND REPORT**

It is exciting to see the response to our bond sales. In one week recently Cedar-ville College received over \$35,000 in bond orders. Over \$622,000 worth of bonds have been sold. Truly, God is good.

The State Security Commission authorized the college to sell one million dollars in bonds to be issued in three separate series. The sale of the first two series is complete, and the third series is now available.

This means that friends of Cedarville College have a wide selection of denominations and retirement dates from which to choose. The interest rates remain 5% for 1 - 5 years; 6% for 6 - 10 years; and 7% for bonds maturing in 11 - 15 years.
