China Teachers Happy to be Home, Eager to Return

Four Cedarville alumni returned to the States June 7 in the wake of internal problems in China. They looked forward to a time of rest and reunion with family and friends but expressed their desire to resume their teaching responsibilities at Peoples University in Beijing in the fall. Dr. Don Callan was in Beijing at the time to negotiate the new teaching contract with Peoples. When the teachers left Beijing, Callan flew to Manila to join Cedarville's MIS men's basketball team which was touring the Philippines.

During the 1988-89 school year, Diane Lichtensteiger, Julie Prentice, Scott Morgan, and Jewel Schroder served as teachers of English under Cedarville's Educational Resources

and Assistance Program for China. The teachers worked with about 120 Chinese students, top scholars at Peoples University who are majoring in international finance, politics, and economics. Only Cedarville and Princeton University provided this service to Peoples last year.

ERAP came into being as the result of the initial teaching efforts in 1984 of Sara (Beattie '84) Dixon and Myron Youngman '76. In 1986, Cedarville College contracted with Peoples to

provide teachers of English to the University as well as to facilitate the bringing of Chinese academicians to study in American institutions. Eight Cedarville graduates have taken part in the program.

China update! Departing in September for Beijing are 1989-90 ERAP team members Scott Morgan, Eddie Clifford '87, Diane Lichtensteiger and Julie Prentice .

Dear Alumnus,

As 1989 winds down, we mark the closing of a decade — a decade of expansion and achievement both for Cedarville College and for its Alumni Association. In each case, the expansion in constituency has been reflected in an expansion of services and programs. This has been a challenge, but under the able leadership of Gary Kuhn, the Alumni Association has responded admirably to meet the challenge.

First, alumni have responded to meet the needs of **students**. A seven-fold rise in annual alumni giving has helped build a library, a business building and dormitories; assists with the college's daily expenses; and now allows the Alumni Association to give scholarships in every academic department. Alumni are also personally involved in helping students by giving on-campus career development talks, career counseling, and entry level job or training opportunities.

Second, the Alumni Association has responded to the expanding needs of **alumni**. Through the encouragement of Gary Kuhn, the Association has involved more alumni in planning and in developing Association programs through the use of *ad hoc* committees. This has resulted in greater sensitivity to alumni needs, expansion of alumni programs, and revitalization of alumni gatherings.

But 1989 ends more than a decade; it also marks the end of an era. For the past 11 years, the Alumni Association has largely been a reflection of the capable leadership of Gary Kuhn. The Association advanced because Gary led by word and example. He prayed for us, he dreamed with us, he gently encouraged us forward, and he wore holes in his shoes making certain that things were done right. Now Gary has shared that he will not be entering the 90's with us as our director; rather, the Lord is leading him elsewhere. As Chairman of the Council, let me interject a personal message here: "Thank you, Gary, for 11 wonderful years of inspiring leadership. We will miss you greatly."

Please pray for Gary and Becky as they enter this transition in their lives. And pray for the Council as we and the College seek the person God has to lead our Association into the 90's. Pray that we would have wisdom and insight and that our actions and decisions would all be "For the Word of God and the Testimony of Jesus Christ."

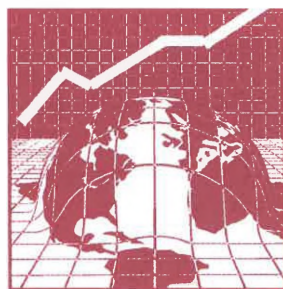

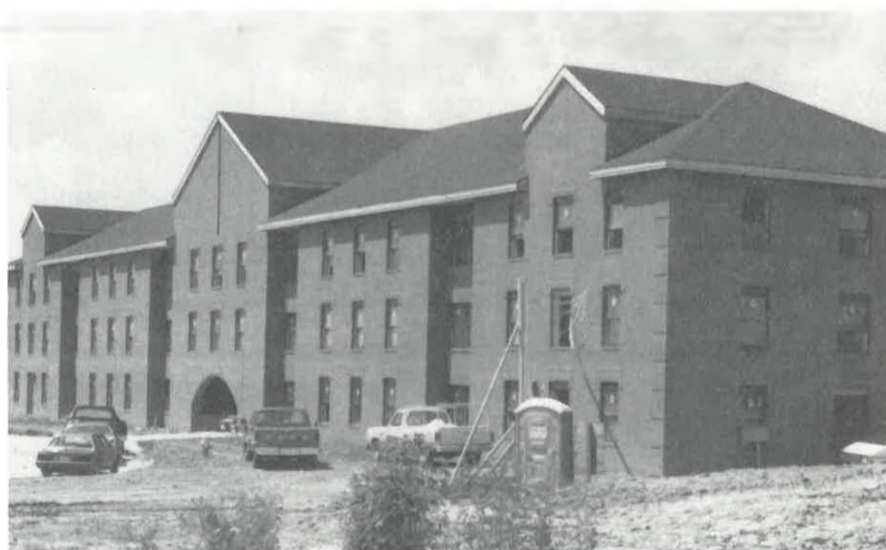

When our students return, 170 men will take up residence in spacious, air conditioned quarters which afford ample study and recreation areas and a commanding view of the campus.

Called the flagship of the residence hall program, Brock Hall is an attractive, three-story brick structure with proximity to the Student Activities Center, Athletic Center, intramural fields, tennis courts, and three other residence halls.

The comfortable student rooms have wood furniture and wardrobes, individual thermostats, and the capability of accessing other rooms as well as the VAX computer through students' pc's.

Two social/study rooms at the end of each corridor on the second and third levels (four in all) are furnished with study carrels, a round conference table, and "soft" furniture to accommodate group and late-night study. Two additional social lounges on the first floor and a large recreation area in the lower level provide for additional activity.

With ample parking space for residents behind the building, the front will be landscaped around a circle drive.

Upperclassmen were given first chance to live in Brock, but many freshmen also are included in the first group of men to use this fine new residence hall.

He remained a friend of the College until his death, but the evidence of his love continues by remembering his alma mater in his will.

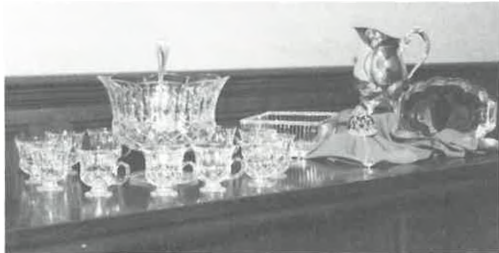
The December 1985 issue of the AVISO carried an extensive article entitled, *Ralph Tindall: School Psychologist*. Dr. Ralph H. Tindall



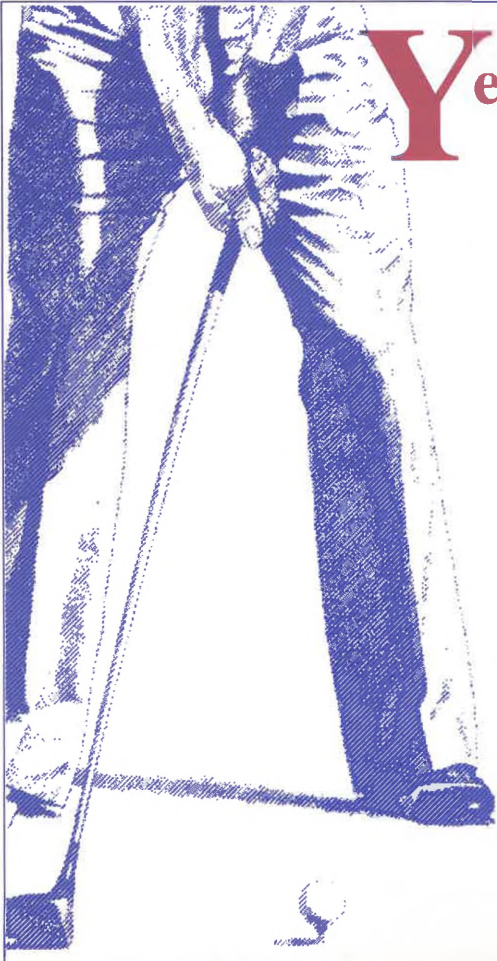

Alumni Scholarships Awarded



At the May 5 Honors Chapel the Alumni Association awarded a \$500 scholarship to a student from each of the academic departments, a total of \$5,500 from the Alumni Scholarship and Grant Endowment Fund.

This fund was established in January 1978 as a true academic scholarship in that the awards are based on academic prowess without consideration of financial need. Because it was initiated as an endowed scholarship fund, only interest income is awarded to students. Recipients of the Alumni Scholarships are selected by the faculty of each academic department.

The first award was presented in 1980 to John Hart '81 by the Education Department in honor of Jack Willetts '58. Since then 63 other students have received awards from this scholarship fund totaling \$31,500.

Other scholarships established by the Alumni Association are the John W. Bickett Heritage Alumni Fund, the Missionary Kid Loan/Grant Fund, and the Second Generation Investment Fund.

Ministering Through Sports



Ron Hobar

When Ron Hobar '82 was led to a ministry with Athletes in Action in 1985, he already had been involved in a church-planting work, had been employed as a bank teller and as an executive courier, and had started a successful landscaping and lawn maintenance business. During that time he had umpired high school and college baseball, met and married his wife Linda, and started a family.

Traveling with the 1985 Athletes in Action baseball team to the Orient as their umpire convinced Ron that this was the full-time ministry that God had for him and his family. They applied and were accepted as Campus Crusade for Christ staff members.

Six weeks of staff training and 11 months of support development followed, and the family moved to Colorado Springs, the international headquarters for Athletes in Action.

Ron sees his ministry as an opportunity to be involved with the Great Commission through the platform of sports, one of the great international languages. No matter what the game or where it is played, crowds gather to experience the drama of competition. AIA teams compete well and use the opportunity to tell others about the good news of God's plan of salvation through Jesus Christ. The players speak about their Christian faith at half-times, between matches or after games, during sports clinics, through radio, newspaper and television interviews, and in individual and group meetings.

Ron arranges for the summer baseball projects in Europe. This involves recruiting athletes, planning itineraries, securing passports and visas, making airline reservations, and coordinating other aspects of the seven-week-long project. Ron accompanies one of the Europe-bound groups as team director and takes his family along on at least half of each trip.

The Hobars have ministries in their local church. Ron works with teens and directs a puppet ministry while Linda is active in women's ministries. He seeks opportunities to make Christ known as he officiates high school and community sports, as does Linda as she counsels at the Crisis Pregnancy Center.

The Lord has given Ron Hobar a fruitful ministry and has allowed him to use his love of sports to accomplish great things for Him.

Coach Connections



John Rooke

At Cedarville College, sports involvement can lead to a non-sport career — and a sports-related ministry. John Rooke '72, a divisional controller for Wm. Bolthouse Farms, Inc. knows this firsthand.

The "coach connection" started when John's Cedarville soccer coach, Paul Berry, accepted a position at Los Angeles Baptist College. The owner of Wm. Bolthouse Farms was attending a church in the area and told his pastor that he was looking for a Christian accountant. The pastor then mentioned it to Paul Berry who called John, a business major with an accounting emphasis. Within six weeks, John and his wife Connie (Walker '71) sold their house in Cedarville and left for Bakersfield, California, to join Wm. Bolthouse Farms.

The Rookes became active at Heritage Bible Church where John has served as deacon, stewardship chairman, and Sunday school teacher.

The "coach connection" developed into something very close to John's heart: coaching children in community sports. For nine years he coached in the American Youth Soccer Organization, but now he is part of "club soccer," where the team is personally hand-picked and enters tournaments. During the past 11 years he also has coached girls' softball and little league baseball as well as following his own children, Susan 14 and David 12, as they have participated in various sports.

On every team John has coached, at least one and up to five of the 15 or so team members have come from a broken home. He sees this as an opportunity to show the youngsters a positive male leader, a good family relationship, and the proper attitude about team and self even if they don't always win. Kids from different backgrounds don't immediately understand his lifestyle; however, with time, he usually establishes a good relationship with each player.

God used John's career preparation to place him in productive work and church situations. Through the "coach connection," He is using John in a ministry of influence to the next generation.

From the Heart

Waiting on the Lord

Homecoming. A time to reach back into memory banks and recall cherished friendships.

As I stood beside the familiar College Bookstore on Saturday afternoon of Homecoming 1987, I was overwhelmed by a flood of memories of a special alumnus, Cory McDaniel. Cory was my husband, my closest friend, and the father of our two girls when the Lord took him home in July of that year.

Our trial began on a cold evening in December 1984. Cory had come home from the neurosurgeon's office with news of his CAT Scan. It revealed that what we thought was simply a pinched nerve in his neck was actually many large benign tumors in the brain and spinal cord. Major surgery was scheduled after the holidays. The initial shock of Cory's condition left me numb, yet I knew that God was in control of every aspect of our lives — Cory's, mine, and that of Melissa, our 19 month-old daughter.

A few weeks later I sat quietly in the surgical waiting room earnestly praying for Cory as he underwent his first delicate microlaser brain surgery. Little did I realize that my waiting on the Lord for His strength was only beginning. One operation led to seven others during the next two and one-half years.

Cory's great sense of humor, along with his complete trust in the Lord, touched the lives of many. Intertwined in those difficult but special years were exciting opportunities to share Christ with doctors, nurses, hospital patients, and their family members. A new joy was added to our lives in February 1986 when our daughter Megan was born.

On the day before Cory's eighth brain surgery, our pastor's sermon confirmed the many truths the Lord was etching in my heart and mind. The text was Psalm 62:1-2: "My soul waits in silence for God only; From Him is my salvation. He only is my rock and my salvation, my stronghold; I shall not be greatly shaken."

I felt the full impact of those verses a few days later. Cory never awakened from surgery and went Home to be with the Lord.

God was my helper, strength, and comfort as I, at the age of 27, became a single parent with two small girls. Two weeks after the funeral I discovered that I was expecting our third child. God gave me joy and encouragement through His Word, our families, and special friends. Melinda, an extra special gift of love from the Lord, was born in March 1988.

As I recalled my life with Cory on that afternoon in 1987, God was arranging for additional care for me and my girls through my providential reacquain-

tance with a 1983 alumnus, Mark Pinkerton. Little did Mark and I realize from our brief, casual talk on the sidewalk next to the College Bookstore that our friendship would blossom over the next 20 months into a deep love relationship.

We cautiously and prayerfully asked God for His wisdom in weighing our hearts' motives and desires. Through various circumstances that only God could accomplish in our lives and through His peace in our hearts, Mark and I joined together for life on June 24, 1989.

Today we are serving Him as a family in Toledo, Ohio, where Mark currently is completing his program in medical college. It is our desire to help those who are in God's many "waiting rooms of life." Our prayer, as God brings us and many of you through those "waiting room experiences of life," is that these verses will remain as fresh and real in our hearts and minds as they are today: "I would have despaired unless I had believed that I would see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living. WAIT for the LORD; Be strong, and let your heart take courage; Yes, WAIT for the LORD!" Psalm 27:13-14.
