Educational Developments

The winter quarter enrollment at Cedarville College is expected to remain about equal to the 865 students enrolled at the beginning of the year. About 820 returning students are registered, and 40-50 new students are anticipated.

This is the first time in recent history of the college that the enrollment has not decreased after the first term. A major factor of this improvement seems to be the recently approved secondary teacher education program.

Prospective students for the 1969-70 academic year are reminded to mail their application and other materials in early as somewhat of a rush is expected due to the approval of the secondary education program.

Information can be obtained from: Director of Admissions, Cedarville College, Cedarville, Ohio 45314. Applications for next year are being received now.

The basic question of admission is, "Can this student succeed at Cedarville College?" Decisions are determined by evaluation of past academic credentials, required tests, and spiritual qualifications.

A new academic major, **PSYCHOLOGY**, has been approved for immediate inclusion in the college curriculum. The goals of the department are: 1) to aid students in their personal adjustment to everyday life through an understanding of human behavior; 2) to provide courses in psychology necessary for teacher certification; and 3) to provide a core of courses in the discipline that will enable students to gain an appreciation of the study of behavior and background necessary for further education.

Considerable student interest has helped initiate the development of the psychology major. Study of this field is of personal benefit as well as appropriate for such advanced training as seminary, guidance and counseling, teaching, etc.

It is expected that the psychology faculty will include: Mr. Roland Fleck, assistant professor, and Mr. Stanley Ballard, associate professor. Dr. Merlin Ag-

The program is a national basis of recognition for college students who rate high in scholarship, leadership, cooperation in educational and extracurricular activities, citizenship, and promise of future usefulness. The quota of nominees issued is based on current enrollment. The students are nominated by faculty of the academic divisions in which they are majoring. The Student Affairs Committee makes the decision on the local level.

The Who's Who program originated in 1934: 1) as a goal to inspire greater effort from those who may not otherwise perform to the best of their ability; 2) as a reminder that time must be used intelligently to bring the best results from one's college experience; 3) as a means of compensation for outstanding effort and achievement; and 4) as a standard of measurement for students comparable to other recognized scholastic and service organizations.

Each honored student receives a certificate of recognition, listing in the annual Who's Who publication, and free student placement service. A key emblem and a copy of the publication are optional purchases.

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

Dr. James T. Jeremiah, President



"Why don't you build an office in front of Old Main and modernize its appearance?" was a question asked a number of years ago by a friend of the college. In those days it was a question whether or not we could have financial assistance enough to keep the college in operation-let alone build a new building. Consequently, the answer to this friend was "Well, supply the money, and we will see what can be done to improve this old building."

In August, 1967, Old Main was nearly destroyed by fire. It was saved from total ruin by the quick response of the local fire department. To many of us, the destruction of this landmark would have been a tragedy. It has been, and still is, important to our campus, and to the community as well.

"Old Main" was constructed in 1895 as the first building erected on the Cedarville College campus. Bricks for a part of the building were made on the property from clay which was found there. The difference in color between the "home-made" brick, and those commercially made is still noticeable. Now that we have made two additions to the building, there is another slight difference in appearance.

It was estimated that the first college building would cost \$14,000 to build. The actual cost cannot be known because of contributed labor on the part of the community and the students.

Many young people have studied in the hall of what is now the administration building. Many others will be served in the years to come. This old landmark is now being given a real transformation. Two fireproof stairtowers, reaching from the basement to the third floor, have already been completed.

A reception lobby and new offices for the academic dean, the business manager, and the general office located on the first floor, will soon be ready for use. The president's offices have been completed, and the director of development has been using his remodeled offices for many months.

Seventeen faculty offices on the third floor are presently in the process of construction. The entire building will be electrically heated and air-conditioned.

This remodeling program will cost many thousands of dollars more than was originally spent. Most construction projects have at least one thing in common: Payments for the materials and labor must necessarily come from friends of the college. There are no government subsidies, foundations, or interested corporations paying the bills. We deeply appreciate all who have given and those who are planning to help in this latest building improvement on the Cedarville College campus.

Do I hear someone say "Why go to such expense to remodel an old building?" The answer is simple. It costs much less to improve an old building than to build a new one. The growth of the college demands that adequate office space be provided for the administration and the faculty. No one will argue against the need for improving the interior of Old Main. Everything is being done to make this unit a first-class office building. Probably more of our visitors enter this building than any other, and they deserve a good reception by our environment as well as by our personnel.

"Whatsoever ye do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus" (Colossians 3:17) is another way of saying "Give Christ first place in all things." This is not only a Biblical principal to be practiced by the individual Christian, but by Christian institutions. We must do the best we can, and do it for Him and His glory. This is one of the main reasons why we want Cedarville College to have quality buildings. We believe our students deserve the best facilities we are able to provide, and this is a goal pleasing to the Lord.

The courses to be offered under the Division of Education and Psychology are: General Psychology; Human Growth and Development; Psychological Statistics I and II; Psychology of Abnormal Behavior; Educational Psychology; Psychological Measurement; Psychology of Learning; Fundamentals of Counseling; Experimental Psychology; History and Systems of Psychology; Developmental Psychology; Seminar in Psychology; and Independent Study in Psychology.

Seventeen students have already selected psychology as their major. The 1970 commencement will include graduates with the psychology major who have had their coursework at Cedarville College.

DEFERRED GIVING COMMITTEE SEMINAR

The first meeting of the Cedarville College Deferred Giving Committee was held on campus January 18, 1969. After touring the campus, the group had lunch with Dr. Jeremiah and the Administrative Committee of the college. The afternoon was devoted to a seminar designed to evaluate the Deferred Giving Program of the college. The seminar was conducted by Lee Turner, director of development, and Henry Phillips, development officer in charge of estate planning.

The Deferred Giving Program was started two years ago for the purpose of helping friends of the college in the area of Christian stewardship and estate planning. This free service to friends of Cedarville can help determine the most advantageous way a gift, large or small, will fit into an estate plan.

The college has sponsored 140 "Will Clinics" in churches, counseled with interested individuals, and supplied free literature on wills, trusts, annuities, life-income contracts, and other areas.

In addition to the training and professional counseling received by Mr. Turner and Mr. Phillips, it was felt the professional men represented on the Deferred Giving Committee could add a new dimension to the services now offered by the college.

Generally, estate planning involves the services of men in different professions. Therefore the Deferred Giving Committee is made up of Christian professional men such as: attorneys, bankers, accountants, insurance underwriters, investment brokers, and real estate brokers.

During the seminar, each part of Cedarville's Deferred Giving Program was discussed in detail. Members of the committee evaluated the program in the light of their vocation and suggested improvements and useful applications. Because of the work of these dedicated men, the college will now be able to offer more effective services to friends of Cedarville.

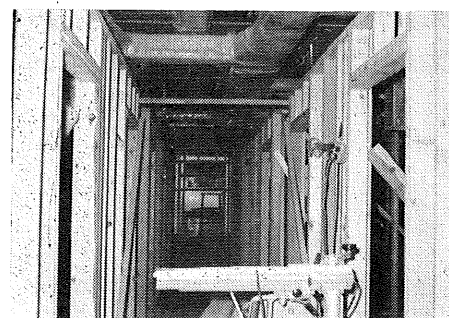

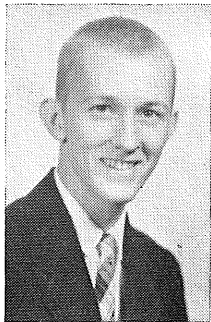

ALUMNI RELATIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

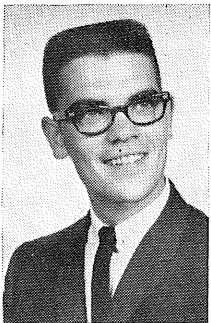
