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
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



Students Aided by Alumni Scholarships

L stablished by Cedarville College alumni in 1978, the endowed alumni scholarship fund has provided financial assistance to a total of 145 students. Vini Jaquery: Ministering to Abandoned Children



God has given Vini Jaquery '82 the ministry of rescuing abandoned Brazilian children through International Reach, Inc. (IR), an organization which he founded and serves as executive director.

The directors and advisors of International Reach are U.S. and Brazilian Christians. The goals of the organization are "to address immediate needs of abandoned Brazilian street children and to lead the entire Brazilian society toward making righteous decisions concerning these children." IR has the blessing and cooperation of the Brazilian government.

IR is the fund raising and support group for an enterprise called Home for the Little Children. IR also secures legal adoption of street children by private couples, assists a rehabilitation center, and provides support for a Christian hospital.

In the country of Brazil, 39 million youngsters (roughly one-fourth of the population) are left to raise themselves in the streets by parents who have died, abandoned them, or neglected their care.

Home for the Little Children (HLC) helps create new Christian Brazilian families: a mother, father, and up to 15 legally adopted street children. HLC funds and constructs new homes, the first six of which will be in Atibaia, a village about 60 miles from Sao Paulo. HLC locates young, energetic Christian couples who will commit at least 10 years to the project as parents. HLC also finds the children who wish to be part of a family, arranges for their legal adoption, then helps the family get started and provides ongoing assistance, including help with spiritual

needs of the children. More than 25 children have been placed in the three existing homes. Vini and his co-workers are trusting the Lord for the next three homes by the end of 1990.

The Rehabilitation Center in Ribeirao Preto helps hundreds of abandoned children who have chemical addictions, criminal records, and diseases. The children receive health, emotional, and spiritual care.

IR also provides support to Curitiba Hospital, a Christian hospital which serves many disadvantaged communities.

Christian ministry is not a new experience for Vini. He grew up in a Christian home in Sao Paulo, and, as a teenager, he preached in churches, at conferences, on radio, and even on the streets. He also organized rallies and retreats for high school youth. After receiving his B.A. in psychology at Cedarville, Vini went on to graduate from Trinity Divinity School in Deerfield, Illinois, in 1986. It was while he was home for the summer between his years at seminary that God burdened his heart for the work with the street children.

Vini presently works full time in a large Brazilian bank, but he devotes much time to raising funds for International Reach projects.

On February 5, 1990, Vini married Alexandra Soares, who will graduate from dental school in June of 1990.

The Brakes went to Ethiopia as missionaries with Sudan Interior Mission (S.I.M.). Don was teacher and director of Soddo Bible Schools and dean of Grace Bible Institute in Jimma. As pressure from the new Marxist government increased, they left the country in 1977.



Don earned his Th.D. at Dallas and began his ministry at Multnomah as professor and administrator. He served as a visiting lecturer at the Institute of Holy Land Studies and was appointed president there in February of 1990.

Of the Institute he says, "Where else can one walk out the front door and stand on the walls of historical Jerusalem?"

Don and Carol Brake have three grown children. Michael teaches high school in Paris, France; Deborah is a missionary in Niger, Africa, and Donnie lives in Beaverton, Oregon.

As Ruth Fareno '83 packs her lunch for another day at the Institute of Islamic Studies in Philadelphia, she is reminded of packing experiences of other summers. Ruth has packed duffles for Australia, suitcases for Brazil, and trunks for Africa. Traveling abroad during the summers to take part in missionary endeavors is a cherished part of her life.

Since her position as an elementary public school teacher in Hatboro, PA. affords her summers off, Ruth uses her time, talents, and finances to experience missions around the world. This summer, however, Ruth is studying in preparation for future trips abroad. Her desire to learn how to combat fallacies in other religions with scriptural truth is the primary purpose for remaining in the United States.

Ruth began her missionary travels with Cedarville College's MIS program after graduating in June 1983. "This missionary internship taught me to work with many personalities in high pressure situations," Ruth reflected. Ruth would freely admit that her trip to Liberia, Africa, during August 1989 was the most challenging and eyeopening. She encountered new foods, language, diseases, team dynamics and schedules. But she returned from her trip confident that she could adjust to the African culture both in the cities and bush country.

The one personal trial that Ruth had to conquer was crossing a long, narrow footbridge over several swamps to get to villagers who needed to hear the gospel. She remembered all her childhood fears of falling off the balance beam in gym class; that's how narrow the bridge was! This one-mile trial which required her to tote backpacks loaded with Bibles, projectors, screens, and a gospel film, was a challenge Ruth conquered, and she rejoiced that only four trips were

The joys and concerns of her trip to Africa are still fresh in her mind as she prays daily for the missionaries being persecuted in Liberia. One family which housed the team has fled their home and is searching for a safe passage to the United States.

Ruth's heart for missions and love for the Scripture began at Cedarville College, and she seeks to develop that love and burden for others as she follows her Savior daily.

Pending final approval by The Ohio Board of Regents, Cedarville College will launch a B.S.E. (Bachelor of Science in Engineering) program in the fall of 1990.
