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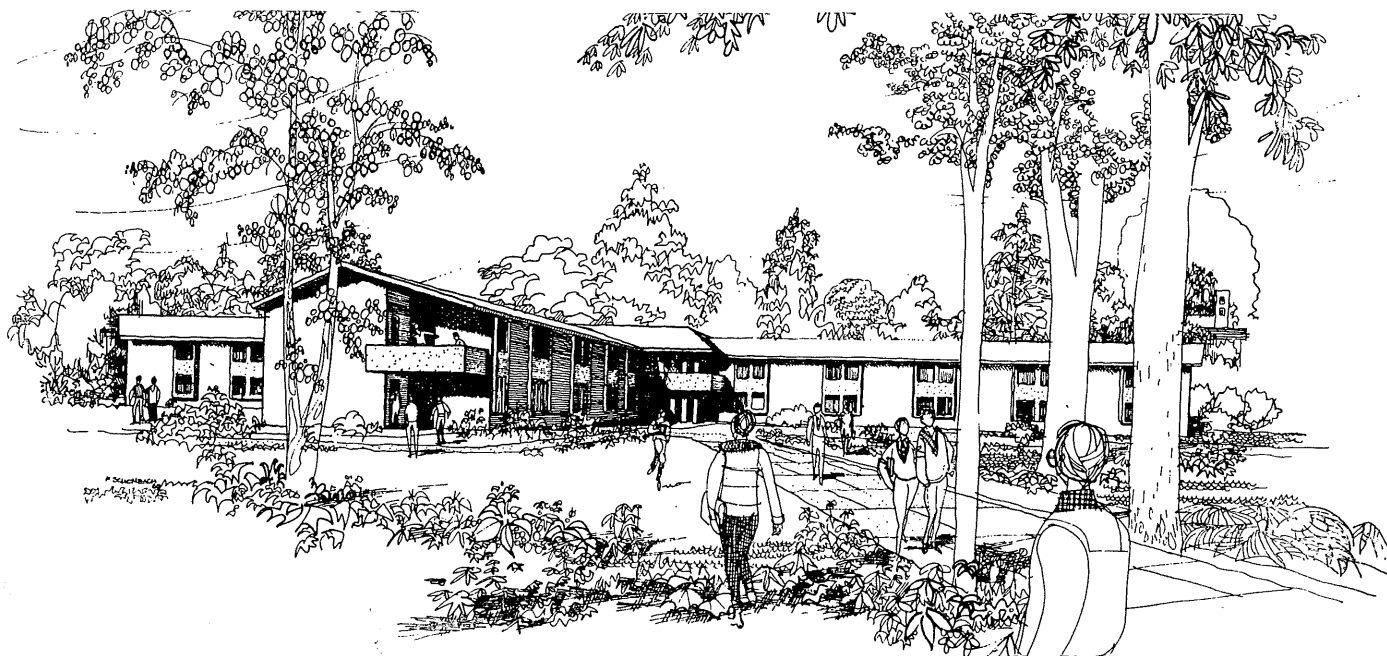

MEN'S DORMITORY PLANNED



A men's dormitory and a student center are two of the three new facilities that will become a reality when \$800,000 is received in gifts for the science center. These will be built through borrowed funds.

The "Three to Grow On" campaign was launched in Ohio during the months of November and December, 1969. Eighty-eight volunteer committee members have personally invited churches, individuals, and businesses to give toward this project. The Lord is blessing their efforts. The campaign total is, as of January 28, \$107,387.92.

Of the 927 students enrolled at Cedarville College, Michigan ranks second to Ohio with 87 students in attendance. Our second regional campaign will be located in Michigan during the months of February and March, 1970. In addition, Indiana ranks third with 75 students enrolled, and a regional campaign will be located there during the months of April and May, 1970. Four hundred filmstrips and records which explain the campaign are being circulated among churches outside the areas where regional campaigns are being held.

The men's dormitory (featured in this issue) is designed to meet many of the students' needs. A student spends more

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DR. MILNER IN HIS PRESENCE



On January 2, 1970, Dr. George S. Milner left this world to enter the presence of the Lord whom he had known and served almost eighty years. Soon after his conversion to Christ as a boy, he became a member of the church now known as Cedar Hill Baptist Church of Cleveland, Ohio. He had been a member of that church for 79 years.

Space in this bulletin will not permit us to enumerate all of the many Christian projects and activities which have interested Dr. Milner, and in which he has had a vital part in leadership and sacrificial financial contribution. We wish to emphasize in particular how much he has meant to Cedarville College.

Since its founding, Dr. Milner served as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Baptist Bible Institute of Cleveland. When the school grew and sought a larger campus for its activities in 1953, Dr. Milner was chosen as chairman on the committee to find a place

for expansion. The committee was instrumental in bringing about the transfer from the Baptist Bible Institute of Cleveland to the campus of Cedarville College in 1953. He served as chairman of the Board of Trustees for many years, and in recent years was given the title of Chairman Emeritus. He faithfully attended board meetings whenever his health would permit him to do so. On October 18, 1969, he was present for the last meeting and participated in the Homecoming program.

The Word of God meant a great deal to Dr. Milner. He depended upon it for guidance in his business, as well as in the Christian activities in which he had a vital interest. It was an encouragement to him, and often throughout his life it brought comfort to his soul in the times of trial and sorrow.

On March 6, 1953, at the time when the Baptist Bible Institute was seeking the will of God concerning moving to the Cedarville College campus, the Milner's were having their devotions. Verses from Daily Light, a devotional book, gave him the encouragement to lead his committee to proceed with the trans-

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FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

Joining a church does not make a person a Christian. "The disciples were called Christians first in Antioch" (Acts 11:26). They were given this title, not because they joined a Christian church, but because they acted like Christians. The convictions, conduct, and conversation of these early believers reminded even their enemies that they were Christ-like. Probably, the word was used originally as a term of derision and ridicule. Today, however, we understand a Christian to be an individual who has had a personal experience with Jesus Christ. Having received His life, he is one who has been born from above. With this experience as a reality, he must depend upon divine strength to express it in daily living in these difficult days.

It is also true that a church-related college is not necessarily a Christian college. In some cases the same anti-God philosophies and Christ-denying theories are advocated to students as one would find in colleges which do not profess to be Christian. Professors openly deny the truth of the holy Scriptures and ridicule the students and colleagues who believe it. There are occasions when students would probably be able to hold their faith with less difficulty at a college or university where no pretense of Christianity is ever made than to attempt to do so where a profession of Christianity is expressed by church relationships, but denied in the classroom and activities on the campus.

What makes a Christian college Christian? A great deal of the responsibility for the Christian testimony on any college campus must rest with the faculty. To begin with, faculty members must be Christians themselves and firm believers in the trustworthiness and authority of the Bible. Daily conduct must correspond with profession of faith in Christ so that by example the reality of Christ may have meaning for the students.

It is unlikely that Christian teachers will be chosen to teach in Christian colleges unless there are Christian trustees who believe that this is a primary consideration when professors are employed. Obviously, this matter is of no importance to the majority of colleges in our day, but must be a primary consideration to any school which began as a Christian institution and intends to perpetuate the purpose for which it was founded.

Unquestionably, there are other important points which must be considered, but the Christian college must have personnel with Christian conviction and concern who will carry out well-defined Christian purposes. The first two as stated in the Cedarville College catalog emphasize these convictions. "The purpose of Cedarville College, a Baptist college of arts and sciences, is to offer its student an education consistent with biblical truths. To achieve this purpose, the college seeks to accomplish the following objectives: to undergird the student in the fundamentals of the Christian faith and to stimulate him to evaluate knowledge in the light of scriptural truth, and to encourage growth in Christian character in each student and help the student to accept

fer of the institute to the Cedarville College campus. He read, "The Lord your God led in the way before you to search out a place to pitch your tents" (Deuteronomy 1:23). "With us is the Lord our God to help us and to fight our battles" (II Chronicles 32:8). "The steps of a good man are ordered by the Lord and he delighteth in his way" (Psalm 37:23). Other verses in this devotional time were Deuteronomy 32:11 and Romans 8:28.

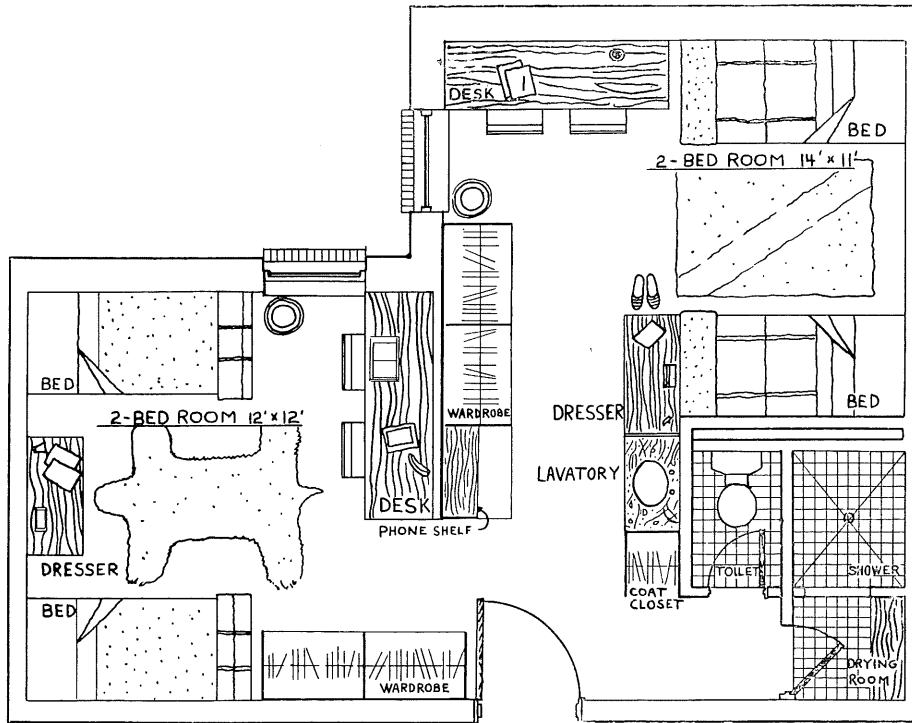
It is impossible for any of us to do justice in reporting all that George S. Milner did to aid Cedarville College in attaining its present status. His great burden for this Christian Education ministry; his prayer in behalf of its needs; his wise counsel to those of us who serve here; and his sacrificial giving to make it possible for the college not only to continue its operation, but to expand its facilities, will be remembered by many for years. In June, 1961, Cedarville College conferred the honorary degree of Doctor of Humanities upon Mr. Milner.

The testimony of his godly life will long be an inspiration and challenge to many of us. Long ago the Apostle Paul wrote, "It is required of stewards that a man be found faithful" (I Corinthians 4:2). Dr. Milner was a faithful Christian with a vital interest in things which matter most. Characteristic of his testimony was the statement of the Psalmist, "The steps of a good man are ordered by the Lord: and he delighteth in his way" (Psalm 37:23).

For many years he was the president of Milner Electric Company in Cleveland. In 1940, he with others organized the Building Expositions, Inc., a non-profit corporation which conducted the Greater Cleveland Home and Flower Show. Dr. Milner served as the president of this organization from its beginning. For a number of years he was the president of the Cleveland Baptist Association. When this association drifted under the control of modernism he found it necessary to sever his relationship with it and took an active part in the formation of the Baptist union. When the Ohio Association of Regular Baptist Churches was formed and the General Association of Regular Baptist Churches became a reality, he gave his support to the various interests approved by them.

In 1937, Dr. Milner was elected to the General Council of Baptist Mid-Missions. He served faithfully as a member of this Council. Only days before he was hospitalized, he attended an administrative meeting of this mission.

His friends from many organizations, both Christian and secular, will greatly miss George S. Milner. Those of us who are acquainted with his Lord through personal salvation have the glorious hope of a future reunion.



time in a dormitory than any other building - sleeping, studying, dorm prayer meetings, popcorn parties, and gab sessions.

The dormitory may be constructed in separate three-story units each having a guest lounge on the first floor and a recreation lounge on the second floor.

Each dormitory will have duplex bedroom units housing four men. Rooms will have furniture for two men including beds, desks, dressers, and individual wardrobes. Bathroom facilities will include a lavatory, toilet, and shower with a drying room. Since each unit is self-contained, it will be more convenient to the occupants and reduce unnecessary traffic in the halls. Carpeting is expected to be used in each of the resident rooms to add home-like comfort. Present plans call for thirty-two men on each floor of the three-story dormitory. Each floor will have two student personnel assistants.

Prayer and support are requested in attaining the \$800,000 needed for the new science center. Your support will enable the expansion program to include the men's new dormitory as well as the new science center.

RECORD ENROLLMENT

Winter quarter enrollment of 927 students at Cedarville College is the largest in the history of the school. One year ago 856 students attended classes in the winter quarter and two years ago there were 809. The autumn quarter enrollment for the current school year was 925. The 84 new and returning students who entered this quarter replaced those who completed their degree requirements or withdrew from the College.

The steady increase in the number of students attending Cedarville since 1954 is a tribute to the excellent cooperation shown by the pastors of our supporting churches, as well as the dedication and foresight of the College trustees, administration and faculty. The current situation relative to limited campus facilities presents a new challenge to all concerned with Christian higher education. Everyone is encouraged to support the "Three to Grow On" expansion program so that an increased number of students may prepare for a productive career and effective service in the local church.

Young people desiring to attend Cedarville College should not delay in making application. If the present enrollment trend continues, some late applicants may be disappointed because they cannot be admitted in the autumn quarter and admission for some may be deferred until the winter or spring quarter.

Prospective students should also realize that a good high school scholastic record is increasingly important. The applicant's record of Christian service in his home church, his scholastic aptitude as shown by the scores on the American College Test, as well as his spiritual commitment (John 3:3) and his personal development (as reflected in his autobiography) are also considered important factors related to admission.

The Director of Admissions recommends that every college-bound sophomore or junior high school student decide which college he wishes to attend. The decision can be made with greater ease if he can visit the campuses under consideration. At Cedarville College we have found that those students who have visited the campus and attended chapel, classes, and weekend activities are in a good position to make an intelligent choice. If you, as a prospective student, or your youth group would like to visit the campus, you should write or call the Director of Development and let him know when you plan to arrive and ask for a schedule of activities that will be available to you during the time you would like to visit. In this way, the Director of Development can send you all the necessary information you will need to plan your visit.

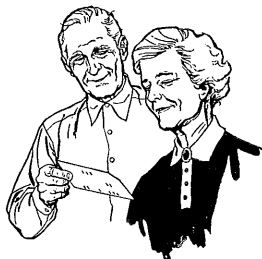

ALUMNI NEWS

ALUMNI RESPONSE TO THREE TO GROW ON

On November 1, 1969, the largest building program in Cedarville's history was shared with churches, businesses, friends, and each member of the alumni association. Each alumnus (1,413) was mailed a brochure describing the scope of the undertaking to build three new buildings.

The following letter was received by the Alumni Office and is typical of the excitement as the campaign plans were announced.

October 20, 1969

Dear Sir,

I have just received from my wife a copy of the College bulletin. In the Bulletin was mentioned the idea of a \$1,000.00 pledge. Since graduating from Cedarville in 1968, I have been looking for opportunities to help the college.

Complete information was sent to Mr. Hamilton who is now serving in the armed forces. Mike's wife, Carol, is also an alumna of '68 and lives in Columbus, Ohio.

The response from 149 alumni to date, has given the campaign a total, contributed or pledged, of \$19,963.71, as of January 9, 1970. The largest pledge was \$6,000, and the smallest \$500. Total gifts received is \$8,700, which is credited to "Three to Grow On" from the Alumni Annual Giving IV campaign now in process. The annual fund which goes entirely toward the science center campaign, as of January 9, 1970, has received over \$10,000 and is almost \$1,000 ahead of last year AAG III.

Many alumni have served on the Ohio area "Three to Grow On" rolling campaign committees. Others have volunteered their service in Michigan and Indiana for the next several weeks. The alumni, pastors, and friends, through their support and enthusiasm have enabled the first three months of the campaign to net over \$100,000 in gifts and pledges.

Pre '54 alumni have been a significant factor in the total contributed to date. The classes of '24, '28, '34 and '51 have participated thus far. The 203 pre-'54 alumni have, or will have been, either through literature or a personal call, been contacted concerning the growth of their alma mater during the "Three to Grow On" campaign.

BASKETBALL NOTES



After breaking out with two wins and one loss at the Thanksgiving tournament at Grace College, Yellowjacket basketball fortunes have slowed to a 3-6 won-loss record in the face of strong competition from opposing cage squads. Nine of the remaining nineteen games will be with the Mid-Ohio Conference colleges.

Playing without the services of high-scoring guard, Bruce MacDonald ('69), the Yellowjackets are a young and relatively inexperienced ball club for the '69-'70 season. The addition at the first of the year of Gary Holbrook, a 6'-4" transfer student from Eastern Kentucky, has added some depth to the forward line.

The squad has produced some strong efforts against ball clubs with greater depth in a tough schedule which includes Central State University, Otterbein, Wilmington, Urbana, Rio Grande, Ohio Northern University, Wilberforce, Walsh, and the teams of the Mid-Ohio Conference.

The starting lineups generally involved 6'-1" senior Loren Reno, 6'-0" senior Darwin Boertje, or 6'-2" freshman Dave Branon in the guard slots; 6'-9" junior Don Atherton, 6'-4" junior Gary Holbrook, 6'-3" senior Gary McDowell, or 6'-2" junior Bill Trefzger in the front line.

Top efforts for the year include Darwin Boertje with 33 points in a 94-77 win over Bethel, 26 points in a 78-75 loss to Walsh, 26 in a 76-74 loss to Ohio Dominican, 25 in an 84-74 loss to Wilmington; and Gary Holbrook with 27 points in his first game with the Cedarville five against Wilmington.

Dow Chemical Repeats Gift

Dr. Donald Baumann, professor of bacteriology and chemistry, and the science division chairman reports that a gift in kind has been received from the Dow Chemical Corporation of Midland, Michigan, on December 17, 1969. The new chemicals and glassware amounted to \$2200. Dow, earlier last year, had made a similar contribution.
