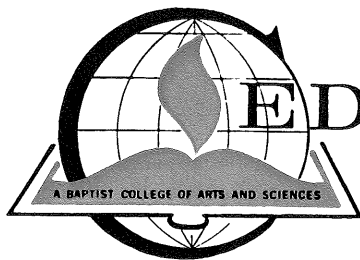

## QUARTER STARTS FOR 950

I think one of the greatest thrills I've had this past summer has been in my traveling from coast to coast and finding alumni who are actively involved in the local church." "... We are seeking to up-grade standards for accreditation . . . but without compromising any Christian commitment of Biblical fundamentalism." "... Our staff will endeavor to promote a climate conducive to the total development of the student and especially the development of healthy attitudes and appropriate priorities. We are expecting God's blessings as together we work for His glory."

The thoughts behind the busy lives of Cedarville College's administrators . . . person to person comments with heart commitments to the cause of Christ and, in particular, Cedarville College.

As this school year opens October 1 for the 1970-71 season, approximately 950 students are expected on Cedarville's campus. Close to 350 new students will be among the total enrolled with 60 of these being transfers.

The spiritual tone of the fall quarter will be set as the annual Fall Bible Conference opens on October 5 and continues

through the 9th. As an appropriate opening, a Day of Prayer has been set aside on October 6 and will then be followed by the remaining three days of meetings with guest speaker Dr. Paul Tassell, National Youth representative for the GARBC in Des Plaines, Illinois.

Also announced by the Christian Service Department is the Swordbearers Youth Rally on November 7 (noted elsewhere in Bulletin) in which over 1000 high school students are expected to participate. Don Lonie of Detroit, Michigan, will speak at this time.

Christian Service will concentrate efforts throughout the year on the need of penetrating into the rest homes, jails, schools and churches and canvassing of several communities to help existing churches and start new ones.

Among the many educational innovations, Dr. Merlin Ager, Chairman of the Education and Psychology Departments at Cedarville, has announced the purchase of a portable video system with instant playback capability. The system will be used primarily for evaluation of the student-teacher in the Miami Valley area public schools. Operated by rechargeable batteries, the portable system has microphones built into the camera for synchronization with the video as well as a built-in viewfinder that functions as a verification monitor. By using this TV screen viewfinder, the Education Department staff member can immediately play back each tape segment. A dual microphone arrangement makes it possible for the cameraman to narrate his own tape program while recording. Weighing less than 15 pounds, the one-half-inch recorder has a 20-minute recording time capacity.

## NEW DEAN APPOINTED



Dr. James T. Jeremiah, President of Cedarville College, has announced the appointment of Donald W. Rickard to the position of Dean of Students at Cedarville. Rickard succeeds Richard T. McIntosh who is pursuing his doctoral program at Grace

Theological Seminary

Prior to his appointment here, Rickard served as Counselor and Assistant Dean at Eastern Michigan University but was serving, at the time of his departure, as Institutional Examiner for the school.

Dean Rickard attended the University of Toledo and Cedarville College and graduated from Central State in 1963 with an A.B. in Psychology. In 1968 he earned his Master's Degree in Guidance and Counseling from Eastern Michigan University and is anticipating post-master's work in student personnel.

Rickard and his wife Margaret Anne are residing in the Cedarville area with their sons Donald, Brian, and Brad.

In the past few weeks the news media has informed us of the chaos existing on the American college campus. Students have been killed and law enforcement officers have been injured. Rebellion and anarchy have been rampant. These terrifying experiences bring grief to all of us, and the expression of sympathy to those families who are suffering because of death and injury.

Why all of this turmoil? The question has been asked a thousand times and probably answered with as many dogmatic responses. Perhaps one more will not add much to the solution of the problem, but for what it is worth, here it is.

One wonders if the educational philosophy of the past thirty or forty years has not come home to roost. You can count on it that when the depraved nature of human beings is encouraged to express itself and every limitation is removed, nothing else but rebellion can result. "The heart is deceitful above all things and utterly corrupt. Who can know it?" (Jeremiah 17:9). "Because sentence against an evil work is not executed speedily, therefore the heart of the sons of men is fully set in them to do evil" (Ecclesiastes 8:11).

Further, when one is told that he is inately good and needs only to improve his environment, he will naturally seek to overthrow preventatives which stand in the way of entering his promised Utopia. The denial of the reality of personal sin and the total depravity of the human race are characteristic of the humanistic philosophy which makes man the total answer to all of his problems. The expression of this philosophy of life is witnessed on many college campuses today.

At the risk of being called an authoritarian and having a willingness to be so charged, I want to express my personal conviction that parents, students, faculty, administration—the whole lot of us—need to be in submission to authority. This is a Biblical principal demonstrated to be quite necessary and successful in generations gone by. "Let every soul be subject to the higher powers for there is no power but of God. The powers that be are ordained of God" (Read Romans 13:1-7). Of course, one who accepts this position must first of all be willing to subject his entire life to the authority of Scripture and unto the God Who gave it.

The utter frustration on the secular campus and the Biblical basis for authority are two good reasons why the uncompromising Christian college has the greatest opportunity ever to provide the needed and desired education expected of it. This should be our distinctive in a day such as this.

#### "THREE TO GROW ON"

Summer is past, fall is upon us and churches are humming with new vitality now that vacation time is over. It is also time for churches and friends of the college to prayerfully consider afresh what they can do to make our new Science Center a reality.

The 1971 edition of the college film-strip "The Case for the Christian Liberal Arts College" has been mailed to churches in several states. They will be circulated to other states as rapidly as possible. Pastors are encouraged to show this presentation in their churches so their people can rejoice at what God is doing at Cedarville.

The "Three to Grow On" program involves three new facilities totaling over \$2.2 million: a new Science Center, a Student Union, and a men's dormitory. Churches and individuals are encouraged to pledge \$1,000 over a three year period toward the \$800,000 needed for the new Science Center.

### WORD OF LIFE ON CC CAMPUS

The Fall Conference for Word of Life was held Saturday, September 12, on the Cedarville College campus. Over 300 Christian Education directors and youth workers assembled for "Blueprint for Youth Leadership," a two-fold program to 1) teach Bible doctrine and 2) challenge the leaders in their work.

Speakers at the gathering included Harry Bollback, co-director of Word of Life, and Dr. Charles Ryrie, well-known author and associated with Dallas Theological Seminary.

## FACULTY FACTS

Dr. Merlin Ager, Professor of Education, has had published an article in the 1970 summer issue of *Journal of Teacher Education*. Found in Volume 21, his writing is entitled "Dogmatism and the Verbal Behavior of Student Teachers."

Dr. Donald Baumann, Professor of Biology and Chemistry, attended the American Institute of Biological Sciences, August 24-27 at Indiana University, Bloomington, Indiana. He also participated in a short course in Genetics sponsored by the National Science Foundation June 22-July 17 at Albion College, Albion, Michigan.

Dr. Don Callan, Chairman of the Athletic Department, has again been elected chairman of the Affiliated Conferences Committee, a national committee of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.

L. Bert Frye, Associate Professor of Physical Science, has just recently returned from 4 weeks at the Fourth Annual Institute of Astronomy and Astrophysics sponsored by NASA at Stony Brook, New York, and one week at the International Conference of Astronomers in Brighton, England. The meeting in England hosted nearly 3000 delegates at the University of Sussex and provided sessions dealing with photoelectric instrumentation, interstellar molecules, stellar spectra, x-ray astronomy, etc. While in England, Mr. Frye, accompanied by his wife, had the opportunity of visiting nine other countries in Continental Europe . . . from Trondheim, Norway, to Rome, Italy.

Edward L. Greenwood, Associate Professor of English, recently warranted publication of a poem in the 1970 edition of the *National Poetry Anthology* series. His entry is entitled "Evening Hour."

Dr. Robert Gromacki, Professor of Bible and Greek and Chairman of the Biblical Education Department, has written a book on prophecy for today. Entitled *Are These the Last Days?*, it is published by the Fleming H. Revell Co. of Old Tappan, New Jersey, and contains 190 pages. An exposition of twelve prophetic themes, the book contains questions such as "Is Jesus really coming again?", "Could He come today?", and "What are the signs of His coming?"

Brad Moore, Associate Professor of Education, is presently at the University of Illinois where he is working toward his doctorate in Elementary Education. A year's leave of absence is planned.

## NEW FACULTY

Howard Burt, former superintendent of schools and high school principal, has accepted the position of supervisor of student-teachers in the fall and spring sessions at the College. Burt comes from Walled Lake, Michigan, where most recently he served as student-teacher coordinator for Michigan State University.

James E. Seaman will be teaching Business Education this coming school year at Cedarville. A graduate of Cedarville College in 1968, Mr. Seaman received his M.B.A. in Marketing from the University of Dayton in 1968 also and is presently working on his doctorate in Business Education and Management at Ohio State University.

## DOCTORATES RECEIVED

Two Cedarville College faculty members were recently conferred doctorate degrees. J. Roland Fleck, Associate Professor of Education earned his doctorate degree in Research Design in Educational Psychology on August 21, 1970, from the University of Georgia. His dissertation theme was "Cognitive Controls in Children and Performance on Piagetian Conservation Tasks." In 1965 he had earned his Master of Education degree from the University of Georgia.

Allen L. Monroe, Associate Professor of Social Science, was conferred his doctorate degree in Political Geography and Social Studies Education on September 4, 1970, from the Ohio State University. "The Study of Voter Response within a Special Context" served as his dissertation theme. He received his Masters degree from Montclair State College in 1965.

## CEDARVILLE DISASTER TEAM

A "first of its kind" is found on the campus at Cedarville College. The Red Cross pilot project has performed so smoothly and well since its inception in November 1968 that originator and chairman, Harold Rodin ('63), says the Red Cross Eastern Area Headquarters at Alexandria, Virginia, which encompasses 18 states, is using the Cedarville College squad as a pilot project to challenge others to begin their own.

The team, consisting of 20 members who all live together as one group in the Alpha Chi dormitory (West Hall) on campus, is on 24-hour standby, ready to be called out for any kind of disaster. Each member has had basic and standard first aid training. Some have had advanced national disaster training courses under the director of the Dayton, Ohio Area Chapter of the American Red Cross.

In addition to mock disaster drills, the team has aided several large natural disasters in the area—the May 8, 1969, tornado in the eastern Kettering and Beavercreek, Ohio area; the spectacular \$300,000 industrial plant fire in September 1969 in Beavercreek; storm and flood victims in Huron County in July 1969; and various family residence fires, airplane crashes, and drownings.

A new feature of the team which promises to make its operation even more comprehensive and effective is its Readiness Emergency Action van, a shelter warehouse on a semi-trailer truck. Equipped with cots, blankets, first aid kits, and other necessary items, it is able to shelter 300 people immediately.

Mr. Rodin says the outreach benefits of this unique program reach much further than just to Cedarville College, but all over the country. Senior members upon graduation go to their respective home areas where they will serve as county and district disaster chairmen.

Alpha Chi is an honorary society for men and has the aim of cultivating Christian personality and leadership on campus and in the community.

## Cedarville College's SWORDBEARERS Present . . .

"The Relevancy of Christ," the Fourth Annual Campus Youth Conference for the youth of mid-western America at Cedarville College with guest speaker Don Lonie of Detroit, Michigan. Presenting workshop sessions dealing with sex, science, and the establishment, the students of Cedarville will assist in the day's presentations.

With nearly 300 young people attending last year's conference, making it the most successful to date, indications strongly suggested a mark of 1000 for 1970.

Pre-registration should be sent directly to Mr. Ralph Perkins, Cedarville College, by October 23, 1970. Group registration will begin at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, November 7, 1970, on the College campus.

The concluding rally of the conference is scheduled to be held in the College gymnasium that holds a capacity 2,000. Youth speaker, Don Lonie, will present the final challenge.

# ALUMNI NEWS

## POET LAUREATE

### CEDARVILLE ALUMNUS

"To all to whom these presence shall come, greeting. Know ye, that I, Cecil H. Underwood, Governor of the State of West Virginia, reposing special confidence in the intelligence, integrity and discretion of Vera Andrew Harvey of Huntington, Campbell County, do in the pursuance of authority vested in me by law hereby constitute and appoint Vera Andrew Harvey "Poet Laureate of the State of West Virginia" to serve at the will and pleasure of the Governor . . . given under my hand . . . this 24th day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and sixty . . ."

Recently two members of the Cedarville College staff visited Mrs. Vera Harvey, a 1903 graduate of Cedarville College, and were extremely impressed to learn of this significant tribute conferred upon her. Mrs. Harvey, in the past years, has written many works of poetry and has been recognized by the West Virginia Poetry Society as having writings that "sparkle" and possess "depth and originality." Mrs. Doris C. Miller, Poetry Editor of *Echoes of West Virginia* states: "Written by one well-grounded in the culture of the past and richly experienced in that of the present, this could not be called modern poetry nor could it be classed with any school of the older writers. Here are observations of a personality keenly alert to values based upon the best of the old, rich in imagery and implication. It is poetry which calls for careful study and rewards with the new facets of thought it discloses." Mrs. Harvey is said to "reflect an intimate acquaintance with life on practical, social and spiritual levels, and portray exceptional skill in depicting her impressions." She has served as Executive Director of the West Virginia Cancer Society and has been repeatedly elected to the laureateship of the Federation of Women's Clubs, with some 20,000 members, attesting a high appreciation of her poetic talents.

One selection from Mrs. Harvey's book entitled *Touching the Stars* has been reproduced below for the readers' pleasure:

#### A PRAYER FOR YOUTH

O God, for those whose infant feet  
Our love has guided to the brink  
Of this atomic age, replete  
With jeopardies from which we shrink,

In contrite spirit we would pray  
They may have minds alert and bold  
To grapple problems of their day,  
To find amid earth's dross the gold.

Grant them hearts to love all living  
Formed in Thy image by Thy grace;  
In that love may they be giving  
Radiance to each darkened place.

May their souls yearn to see Thy light,  
Thy beauty as in each frail flower,  
And nation's healing through Thy might  
Released in atom's cryptic power.
