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

NEW \$1.5 MILLION BOND ISSUE LAUNCHED



CEDARVILLE COLLEGE BOND PROGRAM

Growth, expansion and improvement are three key words at Cedarville College as it moves into a new stage of its development. On June 4, 1971, the Board of Trustees authorized the sale of a 1.5 million dollar bond issue, Series "D," to go into effect on July 1. Strongly feeling the Lord's guidance in this project, the Trustees view this method of financing as most suitable for the campus.

The overwhelming success of past bond issues, is most evident in the physical expansion of Cedarville. Many buildings on campus, those providing a financial return, were built as a result of bond issues, "A, B, C." Income-producing buildings such as residence halls — Faith, Patterson, Cedar Park and Williams and the cafeteria addition are realities of past efforts. Concurrent with the construction of bond financed facilities, structures built from gifts, such as the Gym-Student Center in 1962, the library in 1967, Administration building improvements in 1968, and the new Science Center, with ground-breaking this fall, complete the present college expansion picture.

Anticipating the Lord's help in every direction, the Administration is looking enthusiastically to the future and the building prospects ahead. As a result of the proceeds from the Series "D" bonds, three additions to the campus facilities will be made. With a new six-acre lake completed in 1969, a new Student Union is planned for lake-side. As student enrollment increases, facilities must grow, and a new dormitory is proposed for the north end of campus. The mobile home park, presently situated near the center of campus will be improved as it is moved to the north end of college property.

To meet the cost of physical expansions, the Trustees have chosen the bond program rather than borrowing the money because they feel this type of program will be more

Mr. James Bucholtz, 20, a junior at Cedarville College drowned July 3, 1971, in Quito, Ecuador, where he was participating in the College's Missionary Internship Program.

Born October 1, 1950, he was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Bucholtz, Arcanum, Ohio. Memorial services were conducted in the Christian Missionary Alliance Church in Greenville, Ohio, on July 25, 1971. Burial was in Quito, Ecuador.

Portrait of a Benefactress



Sensitive, yet decisive, gentle, yet outspoken, simple, yet a millionaire — all these characteristics paint a descriptive portrait of a consecrated servant of God, Miss Ruby Lamb, benefactress to Cedarville College.

As a child, born into a poor family in Lisle, New York, Miss Lamb

New York, Miss Lamb learned, from the very beginning of life, the tragedy of illness, the hardship of poverty and later, the love of the Lord. At the age of six, she suffered a tragic fall which injured her back permanently, leaving few moments free from pain. The daughter of a crippled father, she learned the conservative ways of spending, a lesson that followed her throughout life. In her search for security and peace as a youth, she found the Lord in a small Baptist church in Castle Creek, New York.

Recalling memory-filled years, Dr. Arthur Wolsey of Spurgeon College in Florida, spoke of Miss Lamb's background as a school teacher, when small but strong-willed, she handled bullies and ruffians for \$6.00 a week. Experiencing numerous jobs throughout her professional life, she worked in a shoe factory before entering the business world — a world in which the Lord would ask for her stewardship.

During the late 1920's, Miss Lamb began a career as a secretary for the I.B.M. company in New York. It was during the next eleven years that she began securing stock in that company. Practically starving hereself, she invested in over \$5,000 worth of shares, which have matured to a value of one million dollars.

To begin a letter with a reference to money is undoubtedly the secret way to lose an audience. I dare to do that, however, because I want to discuss an opportunity for a sound and rewarding INVESTMENT.

For many years Cedarville College has been constructing income-producing buildings by means of bonds which have been purchased by our friends. This has been beneficial to many individuals and has enabled the College to erect dormitories and other buildings without government loans or subsidies.

The first Series A bond was sold on July 1, 1959. This issue was retired by the College on October 15, 1970. Series B and C will be retired on schedule. Through these years we have not missed one single payment to any of our bond investors. Our bond reserve is invested in bank certificates of deposit.

Recently the Board of Trustees authorized the sale of Series D bonds. This is a \$1,500,000 issue which has been approved by the Ohio Security Commission. Because this entire amount must be sold within one year of its approval, it is imperative that we do everything possible to complete this goal.

One of the major projects financed by these bonds will be the student center which will have a new cafeteria and other student facilities. Since this will also free the present cafeteria for classroom use, your investment in the bonds will be appreciated by our students.

As you know from other references in this issue of the Bulletin, Series D bonds have a 7% return on your investment. In addition you will be investing in the future of our young people. It seems to be that this is a two-fold way to "lay up treasures in heaven" (Matthew 6:19-21).

FALL CONFERENCE CHALLENGES YOUTH WORKERS

"Blueprint for Youth Leadership" the annual Word of Life Bible conference was held on the Cedarville College campus on September 10-11, 1971. Approximately 300 Christian Education directors and youth workers gathered for the two-day event. The conference centered on the teaching of Bible doctrines and sought to challenge the Christian educators in their work.

Featured speakers for the conference included Paul Bubar, the National director of Word of Life Clubs, Lou Nicholes, Midwest Regional director, William Fortner, a businessman and head deacon of one of the largest churches in the nation, and the author of None Dare Call It Treason, John Stormer.

NEW FACULTY

Two Cedarville alumni are among the six new faculty members appointed to various positions on the Cedarville College campus, President James T. Jeremiah has announced.

Assuming the position of assistant professor of Marketing and Management, Mr. James Seaman received his B.S. degree in Economics from Cedarville in 1968. His Masters degree was earned from the University of Dayton and his dissertation is pending toward his Ph.D. in Business Education and Management from the Ohio State University.

A graduate of Cedarville in 1970, Mr. Lyle Anderson, Instructor of Music, served in the music department of Ambassador Bible Institute in London, Ohio, for one year. While at Cedarville, he worked as student director of the College Choir and assistant in the music theory department.

Another new faculty member in the Music Department, Miss Judy Strickland comes to Cedarville upon completion of her Masters degree in piano from North Texas State University. She received her undergraduate degree in 1969, from Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama.

An addition to the Speech Department at Cedarville is Associate Professor of Speech, Mr. Marlin Rayburn. Mr. Rayburn attended Philadelphia School of the Bible before continuing undergraduate work at Wheaton College. He received his Masters degree in speech from Wayne State University, Detroit, Michigan. Mr. Rayburn comes to Cedarville from Baptist Bible College, Clark Summit, Pennsylvania.

Mrs. Pat Dixon, from Chattanooga,

Mrs. Pat Dixon, from Chattanooga, Tennessee, will begin her teaching duties in English Department at Cedarville. As assistant professor of English, she completed her requirements for a Masters of Education in Secondary English from the University of Tennessee.

Joining the faculty of the Psychology Department as associate professor of Psychology, Mr. Robert Abbas holds undergraduate degrees in music education and biology. He received his Masters of Educational Psychology and Guidance from the University of Northern Colorado in 1965.

These six new faculty members became part of the sixty member faculty group at Cedarville and met their students when approximately 1000 under-graduates returned for classes on September 30.

SWORDBEARERS' RALLY SLATED FOR FALL



Characterizing this business-minded woman, Dr. Wolsey and her home church pastor, Rev. Lawrence Roland of the First Baptist Church, Johnson City, New York, both remembered her determination and her frugalness. "She was one of single-mindedness," Dr. Wolsey recollected, "She saved everything."

A woman also gifted with a quick sense of humor, Pastor Roland called to mind one particular incident involving both Miss Lamb's traits of frugalness and humor. One Easter morning, Miss Lamb arrived at church dressed in her spring outfit, proudly displaying a new hat. Approaching the pastor's wife, she inquired of Mrs. Roland if she liked her new purchase — a second-hand Easter bonnet, bought from the Salvation Army for fifty cents.

Pastor Roland, reminiscing the six years in which he served as her minister, commented on her most sensitive nature. A poet, with an alert mind, she sensed beauty in an autumn afternoon, felt gentleness in a budding flower and experienced her Heavenly Father's love, all of which she communicated in two volumes of poetry.

Miss Lamb lived within the business world for 12 years. During that time, she accumulated enough wealth to make a hobby of missionary support and to help hundreds of people through financial crisis. Yet, this servant of God shunned the limelight, giving most often, anonymously. In her words, she said, "the Lord has given me this, all belongs to Him, I am only a steward."

Miss Ruby Lamb went to be with the Lord in 1969. Her call of stewardship was further exhibited in a gift of 20 per cent of her estate to Cedarville College. Presently the college has received a partial settlement, totaling \$90,000 and in October will receive the final settlement of another \$90,000.

New Dean Assumes Position

While in Michigan, she instituted a practical studies program for exceptional children was instrumental in establishing a neighborhood committee core and was involved in a structured counseling program on the college level. For the past two years, she has been involved in guidance counseling at Middletown Freshmen High School.

Not only devoted to the field of education, Mrs. Ertle has been active in her church, Grace Baptist Church in Middletown, Ohio. She has served as church organist and pianist, as primary Sunday school superintendent and has worked on the Christian education board.

Mrs. Ertle joined the Student Personnel Department of Cedarville College in mid-September.
