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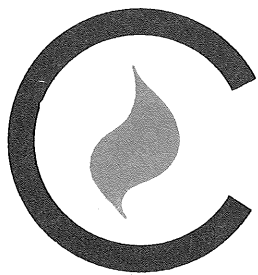

GROUND BROKEN FOR SCIENCE CENTER



Homecoming 1971 was a day of togetherness, a day of history and a day of victory for over 2,000 alumni, friends and students of Cedarville College on October 15-16.

The fall weekend excitement began Friday night with a reunion of the class of '66 and for the students, a pep rally and bonfire near lakeside. On Saturday, the campus sprang to life early with the annual Homecoming parade, kicking off the day's activities. Perhaps the largest parade ever, participants included the Ohio State Scottish Pipes and Drums, the OSS & O Home High School band as well as the Cedarville College band.

After the parade, all attention shifted to the southwest corner of the campus where ground-breaking ceremonies were held for the new Science Center. Master of ceremonies, Dr. James T. Jeremiah, Seventh District Congressman, Clarence J. Brown and College Trustee, Rev. Thomas Younger were just a few involved in the history-making ceremony.

Noon-time brought the alumni together under the "big top" for an afternoon of fellowship and awards. A major event for the Alumni Association was the election and installation of officers for the next two years. Installed as Association president was Ron Grosh ('67); vice-president, Ron McDugle ('65); Sandy Entner ('59) secretary; and Jim Engelmann ('66), treasurer.

Highlighting the award presentation was the Honorary Alumni Award. The recipient was Inez Milner of Cleveland, Ohio, a long-time friend of the college. Rev. Robert Rogers ('55) was chosen as the *Alumnus of the Year*.

Excitement still filled the air as the Cedarville Yellow Jackets clashed in soccer competition with the University of Cincinnati, defeating them in a 5-4 decision. During the half-time ceremonies, Senior Sally Miller of

Anticipation of a new building, excitement over ultra-modern facilities, pride of a new look on campus—just three emotions characterizing the Cedarville College family as they anxiously await completion of the new \$650,000 Science Center by the fall of 1972.

Tripling present available space, the proposed 20,000 square feet structure will house two specific areas of the science department. The departments of chemistry and physical science will be moved from the present science building to the new center. Biological science will remain the central emphasis in the older facility, which is to be remodeled.

Floor space in the center, which will be located in the southwest corner of the campus, is to be distributed according to student need. Two large classrooms, a 150-seat lecture hall and a seminar room will be devoted to the lecture-type atmosphere. Providing the student with the opportunity to execute experiments concurrently with class discussion, a combination classroom and laboratory will involve rooms of the building.

A new observatory and faculty offices will complete the newest addition to the Cedarville campus.

Financed entirely without government aid, the new Science Center is being constructed with gifts and pledges given to the Science Center campaign. To cover the total cost of the new Science Center and remodeling of the old building, a goal of \$650,000 was set two years ago. Since that kick-off date, funds now total \$480,000.00. An additional \$170,000.00 is needed before the total program is finished.

We are grateful to the many churches and individuals who have responded to our suggestion to give \$1,000 over a three year period and have brought us to the threshold of victory in this project. We trust the Lord will encourage others to help us reach our goal during the coming year.

EXAMINATION SCHEDULED

The responsibilities of these four educators will be to analyze the finances, to evaluate the faculty and staff of the college, to review the program and curriculum and to survey the physical plant of the school. After examination the committee will then recommend the school for candidacy for membership in the North Central Association if it finds the above areas satisfactory. Candidacy is an intermediate step in applying for full membership in the Association in three years. The decisions regarding the college standing will be made about the first of April.

FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

Dr. James T. Jeremiah, President



In a few weeks another new building will be under construction on the Cedarville College campus. This issue of the *Bulletin* presents many of the interesting "groundbreaking" details at Homecoming. It was a great day for all of us!

Our long awaited new, well-equipped science building will soon be a reality. In a Christian college we are concerned that our students become acquainted with the facts of science and learn to differentiate between truth and theory.

The dictionary defines a *myth* as "a person or thing having only an imaginary or verifiable existence." Thousands of young people in our time have lost their way in life because they have been taught a myth regarding the origin of the universe and the creation of man. Since they cannot be certain of their origin, they obviously cannot have assurance of their destiny. Consequently, they begin to live without concern or interest in either time or eternity.

We believe Christian young people have a right to hear the truth about origins. Without apology, therefore, this College in all of its departments stands for what is commonly called creationism; but, at the same time, we make clear the arguments advanced by the evolutionists. In presenting the Biblical position of creation, we do give many young people the opportunity to hear the other side of the argument or the view which is seldom presented honestly in the high schools and colleges of our day.

Sometimes we are lead to believe that the first two chapters of Genesis give the only references to creation in all of the Bible. The fact of the matter is that this doctrine of creation permeates both the Old and New Testament. Perhaps, for this reason, many non-creationists reject and sometimes ridicule the authority of the Scriptures.

The Psalmist wrote: "Of old hast thou laid the foundation of the earth and the heavens are the work of thy hands" (Psalm 102:25). Isaiah penned, "Thus saith the Lord thy Redeemer, . . . I am the Lord that maketh all things . . ." (Isaiah 44:24). Another prophet declared, "He hath made the earth by his power, he hath established the world by his wisdom, and hath stretched out the heavens by his discretion." The last book of the Bible records a praise meeting in heaven when the redeemed will say, "Thou art worthy, O Lord, to receive glory and honour and power: for thou hast created all things, and for thy pleasure they are and were created" (Revelation 4:11).

We are grateful to all of our friends who have made this new science building possible. This will enable many more students to study science under the direction of dedicated Christian teachers who, with the students, daily talk to the Creator in prayer as they study His wonderful creation.

"This is the Lord's doing: it is marvellous in our eyes" (Psalm 118:23).

SWORDBEARERS' CHALLENGE YOUTH

Discussion, involvement and challenge were synonymous with Cedarville College's fifth annual Swordbearers' conference held Saturday, November 6, on the campus. Over 1500 young people, from six mid-western states gathered for the day.

The conference, a yearly project of the college's Swordbearers' team, began with a morning rally, featuring speaker Bob Larson, a one-time rock and roll artist. He was won to the Lord through the influence of country-western singer Texas Tyler, and has spoken at Christian and secular colleges across the nation, averaging over 500 talks a year.

After the morning rally, the conference participants were divided into seminar discussion groups. The first group topic dealt with drugs and their effect on the physical and spiritual aspects of man. Youth and religion, the second topic, explored such things as the current Jesus movement in an attempt to find an understanding and reason for this new approach to the Gospel. The third group studied music, especially Christian rock and its relation to the Christian youth.

Initiated four years ago, with just fifty participants, the conference has grown to involve 1500 young people as well as involving over 100 Cedarville students. Serving as guides, counselors, and group leaders, the college students had responsibilities for approximately 30 seminar groups. The conference, which sought to challenge the group concerning the vital influences on their individual Christian experiences, ended with an afternoon rally with Bob Larson.

Beginning a new work and an exciting new ministry, Connie Barto ('64) recently completed missionary candidate school for the Sudan Interior Mission. Called to the field in Ghana, West Africa, she will be teaching religious education to teenagers in the public school.

Moving, teaching and canvassing have been the three central activities of John ('64) and Judy ('67) Bieglow on the field in Alaska. A new apartment right in the center of their work in Eagle River is their new home, which doubles two evenings a week as a Bible classroom. John and a fellow missionary have been canvassing and write that "it is difficult, but rewarding and a blessed ministry."

Home on furlough, Patricia Good ('64) spent time working in Bible school and camps, acquainting the children with all phases of her missionary work. She also had the opportunity to have a booth at the Erie County Fair in the International Building for the Republic of Niger. She comments, "there were countless opportunities for witnessing as we answered questions and explained why I was a teacher in the Niger." She returned to the field in the fall.

Missionary in Brazil, Betty McKeehan ('63), was elected treasurer of the Baptist Mid-Missions field conference of the Amazon region and was also chosen as one of the representatives from that region to attend the all-Brazil business meeting at Sao Paulo in April.

Working to establish Bible-believing churches in America, Don ('63) and Carol Middleton send many praises from Gibsonia, Pennsylvania. They write: 'A note of praise to God was the decision by the church to pay off the balance of the loan on our property. We had taken a \$5,000 loan through Church Buildings Committee for five years and have completed payments in two. While we are thankful for the place where we can hold services, it will be wonderful when we can have our own church building.'

"Help your country—build your church," was the slogan used by Norman ('64) and Evelyn ('64) Nicklas and their congregation in Sao Paulo, Brazil, as work began on their new church building, September 7. They write, "Our new building will hold about 250. The Lord willing, we should be able to enter the new building by Christmas. — What a joy to see the faith of our people in action."

ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR

To establish Bible-believing churches, and to survey communities in Pennsylvania, has been the responsibility of the 1971 Cedarville College Alumnus of the Year, Rev. Robert Rogers ('55). As the Missionary-at-large in Pennsylvania for the Fellowship of Baptists for Home Missions, Rev. Rogers and his wife, Barbara, have been a part of the FBHM organization, since 1956.

A native of Cleveland, Ohio, Rev. Rogers was graduated from Westlake High School in 1941 and then went on to specialize in jet and rocket propulsion technology at the Lewis Flight Laboratory in Cleveland. Responding to God's call into mission work, he entered Cedarville College where he was graduated in Pastoral Theology in 1955.

After graduation and ordination by his home church, Berea Baptist in Berea, Ohio, Rev. Rogers assumed his first missionary responsibilities in Lorain, Ohio, where in 1956, he organized the West Side Baptist Church.

Since his first successful church organization, Rev. Rogers was lead to be an integral part in the establishment of churches in New Jersey and Pennsylvania. Grace Baptist Church in Ramseu, New Jersey, and Bible Baptist Church of Plum Borough are visible realities of past efforts.

As God uses, He also temporarily lays aside. In the past several months, Rev. Rogers and his family have been claiming Psalm 103:1-3. "Bless the Lord, O my soul—who healeth all my diseases," as Rev. Rogers has been temporarily laid aside as the result of a coronary occlusion. Stricken while coming to Ohio to preach on August 1, Rev. Rogers and his family were lead to leave full-time mission work so that he may recover. They have moved to be near the FBHM headquarters in Elyria, Ohio, where he anticipates part-time office work.

In their hour of thankfulness, the Rogers' write, "Words cannot express how we praise the Lord—the lovely cards, letters, and calls filled our hearts with encouragement and rejoicing."

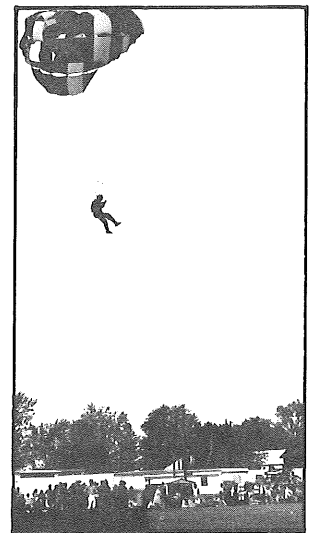

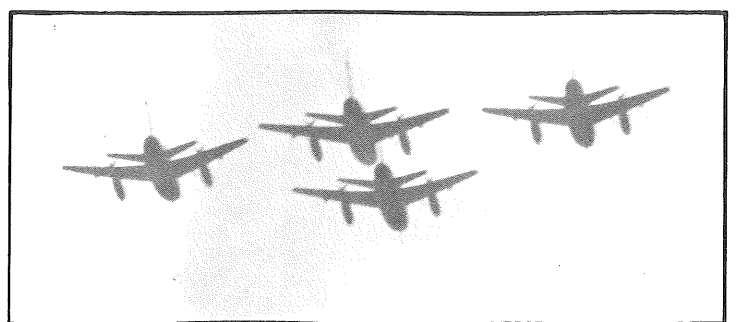
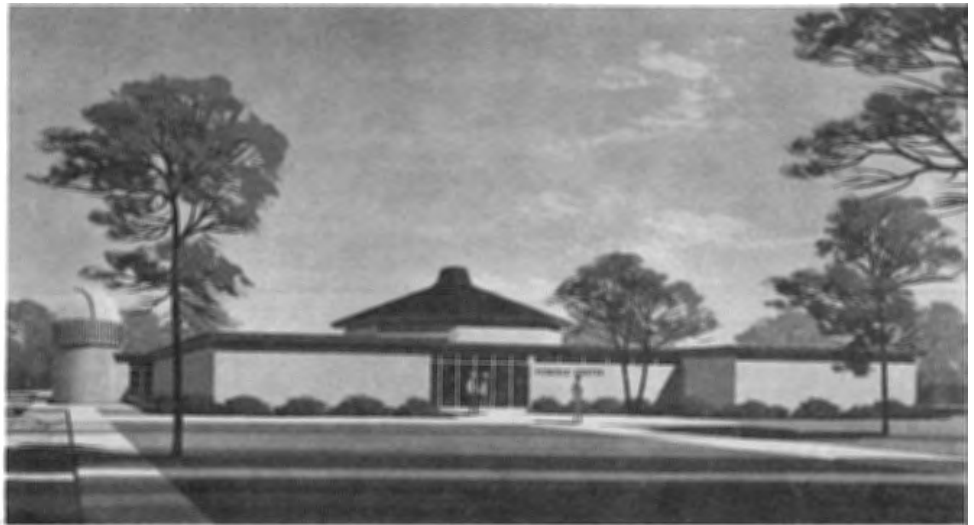

MID-OHIO CONFERENCE GAINS NEW FACES

Facing new conference schools and tough competitors, Cedarville College sports begin a new experience in Mid-Ohio Conference play.

Joining Cedarville and Malone College in the new MOC are: Rio Grande, Ohio Dominican and Urbana Colleges. Originally the MOC consisted of four football-playing schools including Bluffton, Defiance, Findlay, and Wilmington. The MOC was forced to reorganize as those teams left the conference to join a football league in Indiana, which resulted in the formation of Buckeye-Hoosier Conference.

According to Cedarville Basketball coach and MOC president, Dr. Don Callan, the Mid-Ohio will offer championships in basketball, baseball, golf, track, tennis, soccer, wrestling and cross country, starting with this present academic year.

The new schools of the Mid-Ohio Conference, Dr. Callan mentioned, all have similar programs, such as the aid program, athletic programs and academic program. In addition all the schools have basically the same student population.

Dr. Callan, commenting on the strength of the new conference, said that competition this year will be good. Ohio Dominican was last year's District 22 NAIA basketball champions and Malone gained the same honor in baseball. Rio Grande won the Kentucky Intercollegiate Athletic Conference title in basketball in 1970, and Urbana has been a consistent winner in basketball for several years.

The new Mid-Ohio Conference was officially formed in October.
