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
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STUDENTS GAIN MISSIONARY EXPERIENCE



Communicating the reality and love of God to the people of the Central African Republic (above), Peru, Philippines, or Spain was the opportunity and challenge experienced by a score of Cedarville College students involved in the M.I.S. (Missionary Internship Service) program in these and other countries this past summer.

The College M.I.S. program, an extension of the Christian Service Department, provides an occasion for those students interested in missions to gain insights by actual first-hand mission field experience and responsibility. As part of the program, the student is not only afforded the opportunity on the mission field, but is responsible for gaining his own support through deputation work.

Once on the mission field this summer in such countries as France, Haiti, Liberia, Brazil, and those mentioned above, the M.I.S. students were vigorously involved in the actual work of the missions stations. Teaching Bible study groups, organizing a tract ministry, or canvassing an area with an interpreter, were just some of the tasks that acquainted students with mission work. Others actively participated in church services and evangelistic meetings while still others served in handling manual and secretarial jobs for the missionaries.

Participating in the M.I.S. program, junior, Phil McDonald, spent six weeks working with the missionaries of the Central African Republic. Some of his main duties included bricklaying and mechanical repairs, yet for Phil, the summer was more than just mixing mortar or tuning engines. It was a time in which he was able to secure a real perspective on missionary life. It was a time in which he learned appreciation of the many hours, often back-breaking, that are needed in running a mission station "decently and in order." Phil also observed that while one is making the transition from American life to that of living with people of a totally different culture, who speak a language alien to the American tongue, a sense of loneliness can evolve. This is surely a situation in which one learns dependence on God.

Also spending six weeks in the Central African Republic was senior, Donita Swisher. Besides preparing visual aids in the Sango language, Donita and another Cedarville coed, Kathy Strawn, helped missionary Patsy King and others with various mission responsibilities.

Donita, like Phil, gained more than a knowledge of how to run a mission station. She commented, "I learned just how great our God is. We came across many barriers, especially language, yet we were still able to communicate. God did have a purpose in sending me to such a distant location. Maybe it was to learn that He is bigger and greater than all complicated barriers."

Traveling from Lima, to Iquitos to Huanchay, Peru, senior Ron Sumner spent his M.I.S. summer in South America. Ron's mission jobs included regularly organizing and participating in church services and evangelistic meetings held in the ghetto of those cities. Although language was the biggest problem for him, he learned some of the language by being with the people and was able to communicate Christ through interpreters.

Seeing life as he did in South America and being entrusted with jobs that affected those lives, Ron learned a most beneficial lesson. He felt that though working for God under the circumstances in which he did, he learned to assume major responsibilities and work to carry them out effectively.

PASSING THE TORCH

November 1 marked the beginning of the Cedarville College "Passing the Torch" campaign. The goal that 800 friends will give \$10 a month for a year, providing a \$96,000 increase to the general fund, has been set.

We are encouraged by the response given the project by the College family. The "Passing the Torch" campaign was shared with the Trustees, faculty, and staff in mid-October. In two short weeks almost half of those individuals have joined in this program.

During Alumni activities on Homecoming Day, October 21, the 250 individuals gathered in the Alumni Center were asked to support this new challenge and responded with over \$250 in an impromptu offering. The preceding evening, Mr. Adrian "Buzz" Sweeney ('68) of Cherry Hill, New Jersey, and Mr. Stan Seevers ('64), Assistant Director of Development, Eastern Representative, presented checks totaling almost \$500 from alumni and friends in the Philadelphia area to the President, Dr. James T. Jeremiah.

The Development Department is joining with key alumni and friends as they seek to contact churches, fellow alumni, parents, and friends for participation in the "Passing the Torch" project. Campaign efforts which are now underway will cover 23 major areas throughout Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and New York where alumni and friends are concentrated. In Ohio, kick-off banquets are being scheduled.



It is planned that by the middle of November, the "Passing the Torch" program will have been shared with all those who are concerned for the growth and development of the college. It is prayerfuly anticipated that many will respond to the challenge to "Commit thou to faithful men who shall be able to teach others."

ALUMNI ANNUAL GIVING INCREASES 44.2%

A total of \$24,550.42 was contributed to the Alumni Annual Fund this past fiscal year which ended June 30, 1972. An unprecedented 508 alumni contributed an average gift of \$50.30. The Alumni Association now totals 2,359 members which includes 276 members from the class of '72.

An additional two per cent participation was achieved over last year's annual fund and 150 additional contributors made this year's fund the success it was.

Sharp contrasts have resulted since the organized annual fund began in 1966. That first year, 200 alumni contributed \$2,700 and each successive year saw additional participation and greater totals. In 1968 the Annual Fund really got rolling with an association membership of over 1,000 and the total raised over \$10,000. This was a 65% increase over 1967's effort. There were two classes that went over \$1,000 and also two that topped \$2,000.

For 1972, AAG VI congratulations are in order for the Class of '55 which came in first place in the class competition for greatest amount, highest per cent of participation, and largest average gift size. This class had a total of \$2,242.50 from twenty-two class members representing a 36.4% participation and average gift size of \$280.31. Second place honors went to the Class of '58 and Class of '66 who were tied. The classes of '71 and '70 also ranked well with each class topping \$2,000.

The Student Body Project, Walk-a-Thon, held last spring, was aided by several alumni class representatives. The total alumni effort raised almost \$10,000 for the Walk-a-Thon which raised in total \$40,150.25. The following alumni took a day off from their regularly scheduled duties to travel to Cedarville and walk for their respective classes. They were: Rev. Merlin Jones, '67, Mr. Ken Nichols and Mr. Jim Phipps, '68, Mr. Dan Caraway, '69, Mr. Dave Southwell, '70, and Mr. Randy Patten, '71.

All alumni walkers faired fairly well with the fast pace set by Sandy Entner. She had the majority of her class supporting her along with many personal friends. Classes of '71, '70, and '69 had very fine responses. A follow-up phone-a-thon was made by most of the alumni walkers to encourage additional support. A special note of thanks is in order to the many alumni who supported the alumni who walked for their Alma Mater.

It is significant to point out that there were, last fiscal year (1972), forty-nine alumni who contributed \$100 or more. This group's fine effort resulted in \$14,723.17. This includes three who gave over \$1,000 and six who gave between \$500 and \$999. The smallest gift to the annual fund was \$.50 and the largest was \$2,019.67. Each gift, regardless of the amount, is extremely needed in participation for the over-all annual fund. A goal of at least 50% participation would show that each alumni is concerned for the exciting future of their Alma Mater.

Each alumni who has made a gift since July 1, 1972, will be receiving as a token of appreciation a newly designed pressure sensitive Alumni Association decal for their automobile.

How much should you give to this year's annual fund? We wish we could tell you, but you alone can answer the question. Think of how much your own experience at Cedarville has meant to you. Pray about the gift and then give according to how the Lord directs. Be sure to make your gift of a size sufficient that you will care how it is used.
